

Braves Grab Doubleheader from SF Giants To Take Five Game Lead in National Loop

You can tear up those tickets for San Francisco, but don't worry because it'll still be a "California World Series" after all—between Los Angeles resident Fred Haney and Casey Stengel of Glendale.

Milwaukee's back-on-the-beam Braves took care of that little item Sunday when they booted five games ahead of the National League pack by thumping the faltering Giants twice, 4-3 and 6-0.

Oh, Haney wouldn't definitely admit his Braves were "in" yet today and Bill Rig-

ney likewise would not concede the Giants were licked, but whom do they think they are kidding?

Bob Throwbridge and Joe Adcock polled their talents to give Milwaukee its victory in the opener. Throwbridge pitched seven innings of hitless ball in relief for his first victory. Adcock drove in the winning run with a sacrifice fly in the eighth.

Hurls 43rd Shutout
Southpaw Warren Spahn registered the 43rd shutout of his career and 14th win of the season when he hurled a four-hitter in the nightcap.

The Pittsburgh Pirates, getting the finest pitching in both leagues, took the opener from the St. Louis Cardinals, 2-0, and led by the same score in the nightcap which was suspended in the fifth inning because of Pennsylvania's Sunday curfew law.

Bob Friend pitched the third straight shutout by a Pirate hurler to notch his 14th triumph in the opener. Rookie George Witt was working on a four-hit shutout in the nightcap which will be resumed with Pittsburgh batting in the bottom of the fifth on Sept. 16.

Alex Kellner, an American League discolor, scored his fourth victory for Cincinnati

by defeating Los Angeles, 3-1, in the nightcap following a 10-inning 8-6 triumph by the Dodgers in the opener.

Drysdale Gets Homer
Loser Don Drysdale helped himself to a 1-0 lead with a third inning homer in the nightcap and held that margin until the seventh when the Redlegs scored three runs. That ended a string of nine straight wins by the Dodgers over the Redlegs this season.

Pinch-hitter Elmer Valo and Jim Gilliam singled home the two runs in the 10th that won the opener for Los Angeles.

Ray Semproch scored his 13th victory in leading the Phillies to an 8-2 opening game decision but the Cubs bounced back to take the nightcap, 12-10.

Semproch drove in two runs as the Phils rallied for the five off Taylor Phillips in the third inning of the opener and Philadelphia looked as if it was going to make a sweep by coming up with five runs in the first inning of the nightcap. The Cubs, however, cut

Pole Sets Record in Dual Meet

Warsaw — (UPI) — American men won their track meet with Poland Saturday night, 119-97, but Jerzy Chromik thrilled 100,000 countrymen by setting a world record of eight minutes, 32 seconds in the grueling, 3,000-meter steeplechase.

Polish fans, jamming their new "tenth anniversary" stadium to its capacity for the second straight day, also watched their women come from behind in the final event to defeat the United States girls, 54-52. The U.S. women started the day with a one-point lead and clung to it until Ursula Figwer, Poland's javelin champion, speared them by winning that event with a heave of 167 feet, 10.8 inches.

The total attendance of 200,000 for the two-day meet was the largest ever to see a dual meet. The Yanks, who have trouble attracting more than their relatives for U.S. meets, drew 100,000 Russians at Moscow last weekend and are the most popular export the United States has sent through Communism's "iron curtain."

The American men, representing the world's No. 1 track power, handed Poland its first loss in 15 dual meets at home. But the Poles had plenty to cheer.

Before Chromik clipped 3.5 seconds off the official world mark of 8:35.6 held by Hungary's Sandor Rosnyoi, Zbigniew Makomaski pulled the big upset of the meet. He came from behind in the stretch to whip Tom Courtney, Olympic 800-meter champion from Irvington, N.Y., in the 800-meter run. The Pole set a national record of 1:46.7 and was only a second off the world mark of 1:45.7 held by Belgium's Roger Moens. Courtney, who led nearly all the way, was timed in 1:46.8.

Archie Moore Opposes King

Reno, Nev. — (UPI) — Archie Moore, the patriarch of professional boxers, goes after his 127th knockout and the KO championship of the world tonight when he meets Howard King for the fifth time in a 10-round bout at Moana Park.

Moore, a prohibitive favorite, predicted that he would stop the young Reno heavyweight. If he does, it will give him 127 knockouts as a pro and put him ahead of the late W. L. (Young) Stribling. Both are tied with 126 victims apiece.

Rose City Cops Sectional Toga

Portland — (UPI) — Rose City won its second consecutive Little League sectional title by tripping Montaville at Parker field Saturday by a score of 3 to 2.

The win earned the Rose City nine a berth in the divisional tournament at Victoria, B. C. August 8-9. Rose City won the divisional title last year, but lost in the first round of the Western Regional play at San Francisco.

Ken Venturi Golf Leader

Chicago — (UPI) — Ken Venturi was going away today toward his biggest purse, the \$9,000 top prize in the \$50,000 Gleneagles' Open.

The 27-year-old San Francisco pro boasted a 10-hole stroke lead on the field going into the last round of the 72 hole tournament, 10 strokes under par with an even 200 for his 54 holes, attained by three sub-par rounds of 65, 67 and 68.

Only three other players in the field of 60-odd survivors who will go the last 18 today have the same record, always under par for the event. The closest of these, Don January, Eastland, Tex., and Jack Burke Jr., Klamath Lake, N.Y., trailed by three strokes at 203. The fourth, Gary Player, Johannesburg, South Africa, has 204.

Californian Nabs Four Nat Titles

Topeka, Kan. — (UPI) — The three-day National Women's Senior AAU swimming and diving championship splashed to a close Sunday with a 16-year-old California blonde—Sylvia Ruuska of Berkeley—claiming an unprecedented fourth individual title.

The curvaceous Miss Ruuska became the first swimmer to win four gold medals in this competition since Ann Curtis did it in 1948. Miss Ruuska swam to a first in the 200-meter butterfly in 2:43.6 for a new American record Sunday.

Earlier she paddled to the 400-meter individual relay crown and won the 1,500-meter and the 400-meter freestyle events.

Cone Breaks Mark
But another cute blonde also stepped into the championship limelight. She is 18-year-old Karin Cone of Ridgewood, N.J., who broke the recognized world record in the 100-meter backstroke preliminaries Sunday with a 1:12.2. The previous world mark set in 1956 was 1:12.9 set by Judy Grinham of Great Britain at the Melbourne Olympics.

Another American record was set when the Santa Clara, Calif., swim club sailed to its fourth straight team championship by winning the 400-meter medley relay in 5:00.9. Chris von Salza, Jean Wilson, Dorey Ramson and Susan Honig swam on the winning relay team.

Paula Jean Myers of Encino, Calif., turned in another sensational performance as she won the platform diving crown to make a sweep of all three diving events. Miss Myers scored 285.20 to run away with the event.

Golfer Venturi Now Holds Lead

Chicago — (UPI) — Ken Venturi held a two-stroke lead on the field midway through Gleneagles' \$50,000 open golf tournament Saturday. Venturi scored his second straight sub-par round, a 67, for a 36-hole total of 132, eight under par.

His closest pursuit came from Don January, Eastland, Tex., who came in with a 66 Saturday, sinking an 80-yard wedge shot for an Eagle two on the 18th hole and 134 total score.

Behind this pair there was a three-way deadlock at 135 between Ted Kroll, Sarasota, Fla.; Doug Sanders, Miami Beach, Fla., and Jack Burke Jr., Klamath Lake, N.Y., at 135. Bunky Johnson, Abilene, Tex., and Gary Player, Johannesburg, South Africa, were tied at 137, three under par.

The hottest round of the day went to Billy Casper, Apple Valley, Calif., with a six under par 64. It was the best round so far in the tournament and one stroke off the course record held by Tony Holyguin, Chicago. But Casper was far off the pace. Since he had an 80 on his first round, his total of 144 left him 12 strokes behind Venturi.

Next best round of the day was credited to Ernie Vossler, Midland, Tex., with a 65, which left him with a 140 total, tied with Joe Conrad, San Antonio, Tex., for 18th place.

JUNIOR CHAMP
St. Paul, Minn. — (UPI) — Buddy Baker of Florence, S. C., ousted Douglas Lindsay of Bethesda, Md., 2 and 1, Saturday to capture the 1958 USGA junior golf championship.

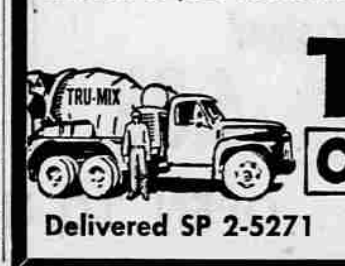
