Las Vegas, Nev.—The most Rev. Bishop Robert J. Dwyer, warning Roman Catholics against the trend toward nudity and indecent entertainment along the famed Las Vegas "Strip":

"There is no vacation from the Ten Commandments."

Hollywood—Actress Marilyn Monroe, expressing happiness at the dismissal of a contempt of Congress conviction against her playwright husband, Arthur Miller:

"I'm very happy for my husband, but I am even happier for the truth and justice that do exist in our country."

Newport, R.I.—Capt. Karl Anderson, skipper of the tanker Graham which collided with another tanker and exploded, causing the death of 15 crewmen and injuring 36 others:

"It's an awful thing to think about. All those men dead and all that damage."

United Nations, N.Y.—U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations Henry Cabot Lodge, indicating this country's position in the forthcoming General Assembly discussion on the Middle East:

New Yorkers Face Jaywalking Fines

New York — (UPI) — Metropolitan dwellers, accustomed to living dangerously, faced punitive action today for infractions of the city's new anti-jaywalking laws.

the right of way to vehicles when crossing against red traffic signals or in mid-block. The price will be \$2.

HILTS Funeral Services Held

Hilts—Funeral services for Ben O. Capello were held Wednesday, Aug. 6 at 10 a.m. from St. Joseph's Catholic church in Yreka with the Rev. Thomas Boland officiating. Interment was in the family plot in St. Joseph cemetery.

A Rosary was recited Tuesday evening in Girdner's funeral chapel.

Mr. Capello, 71, retired Fruit Grower's Supply company employee, died Sunday in Siskiyou County General hospital, after a series of heart attacks over the past several months.

He was born in Italy on May 20, 1887, and came to the United States in 1910, first settling in Yreka. In 1911 he moved to Hilts, where he was employed until his retirement in 1952. After his retirement, he and his wife, Lucia, made their home in Mt. Shasta until her death in 1955. He has made his home in Yreka since that time.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Norma Ellis of Yreka, and Mrs. Alba Atkins now of Japan; two sons, Frank Capello of Hilts and Anthony Capello of Medford. A son, Angelo F. Capello was killed in action during World War II.

Lumber Firm Sued Over Bad Water

Grants Pass — (UPI) — Three lawsuits were filed in Circuit court here against the Bates Lumber Company of Oregon charging that the company supplied contaminated drinking water for three employees at its plywood plant at Merlin, west of here.

The complaints, all of which charge that the plaintiffs became ill from drinking the water, were filed by Charles Jackson, Leroy Wilson and Chester Patterson who ask a total of \$475,000.

The three men contend that numerous tests and analyses disclosed that the water at the Merlin plant was contaminated.
