

Members Vote Dissolution Of Pacific Coast Group

Portland, Ore. — (UPI) — The Pacific Coast conference, born here 43 years ago, voted unanimously for its own dissolution Saturday with Stanford university submitting the resolution to disband a Washington State college seconding it.

The strife-weary loop, biggest college athletic combine on the West Coast, agreed to break up effective June 30, 1939, climaxing years of bickering and complaining

among its members. The announcement came as no surprise and the unanimous poll seemed necessary since Stanford, the school that had been "on the fence" over the idea of disbanding, said they were after all in favor of the move. WSC announced last week it would support a motion to dissolve the PCC.

Glenn T. Seaborg, Chancellor of University of California speaking for all the faculty

representatives at the special meeting, said the members "formally and finally" voted for dissolution.

Asked if there were any "tears shed," he said "No, but there was some feeling . . ." The motion to dissolve was made at 9:25 a.m. and was officially adopted four minutes later. "There was no debate," Seaborg said.

The conferees decided to take up the problem of dividing up the PCC assets, currently about \$175,000, at the winter, 1938 and spring, 1939 sessions. Seaborg said, however, they would probably tackle the Rose Bowl problem later Saturday.

The members passed by an 8-1 vote a motion for dividing up the assets "on the basis of existing conference formula," or 5 per cent to Idaho, and 11 1/2 per cent to each of the other eight members. Idaho voted against the motion, which was put forth by Washington and seconded by Oregon State.

There was no discussion of reorganization at the morning meeting, Seaborg said.

LA Dodgers Issue Release To Wooton

Derald Wooton, ex-Medford high pitcher who signed a bonus contract with the Brooklyn (now Los Angeles) Dodgers in 1932, returned here recently after being released by that major league organization.

Wooton, who had been with Des Moines, Ia., of the Western association for 1 1/2 months

Swoon's Son Runs Upset Victory

Chicago — (UPI) — Swoon's Son upset round table in the \$133,150 Equipoise mile at Washington park Saturday to climb into fourth place in racing's top money list with \$938,604.

Swoon's Son, with Jockey Dave Erb aboard, broke third in a field of 10 and was never worse than that position as he covered the mile in 1:34 4/5, only 2/5 of a second off the track record set by Equipoise for the distance in 1932.

A crowd of 27,474 watched Swoon's Son, fourth choice in the betting, score a half length victory over Bardstown in the final 70 yards of the Equipoise. Indian Creek finished third, half length back of Bardstown. Swoon's Son paid \$18.00, \$9.80 and \$6.00 for his triumph, the second straight year in which he has won the event. Round Table, who finished fifth, was out of the money for the first time in 14 races this year. He had won 11 and placed in two others.

GOLD CUP PUT ON LINE IN HYDRO RACE EVENTS

Seattle — (UPI) — The Gold Cup, emblematic of world supremacy in unlimited hydroplane racing, goes on the line at Lake Washington today as 16 super-charged boats take to the water in the 51st running of one of sportdom's most colorful events.

The favorite probably will be Maverick, Bill Waggoner's speed-wagon from Las Vegas, Nev. The Maverick, with Cowboy Bill Stead at the controls, set a qualifying record of 119.956 miles per hour while taking three laps on the placid lake waters.

The Maverick already has won two major events this year, including the Mapes Cup at Lake Tahoe, Calif.

Vicki Van Hook, 14, reigning national junior girls, overall champion, ran up an apparent world mark in her class Friday during opening events of the Western Regional tournament of the American Water Ski association at Gardener lake.

The Long Beach, Calif., lass who has been western regional overall winner three straight years, ran up a 146 1/2-point total to win the girls' trick riding laurels. Vicki also took the slalom in her division.

Joe Balcoa and Carol Van Wyk, both of Stockton, Calif., competing in the veteran's and women's classes, respectively, for the first time in a regional meet were slalom victors Friday. Other slalom champions were Fred Pendlebury, San Diego, Calif., junior boys, and Doug Kotlar, Burbank, Calif., pee wees.

Randy Paragay won pee wee tricks on Friday.

In the trick's event Miss Van Hook won out over second-placer, Martha Ann Williams, also of Long Beach, by 218 points. Miss Williams had 1228 1/2. Vicki had a 43-buoy count in her slalom division. Colleen Dodge, Sacramento, Calif., and Miss Williams each rounded 38, with Miss Dodge taking the run-off for second.

Balcoa, 1955 regional overall champ in the men's class, four times regional runner-up, and one-time holder of the world distance skiing mark, made 38 buoys to pace the veteran's slalom. He beat out Wally Pallack, Sunnyvale, Calif., Floyd Vance, Sacramento, Calif., and Al Eames, Antioch, Calif., each with 37.
