Rev. Meagher's Services Set

The Rev. William J. Meagher, 75, who died at Sacred Heart hospital Sunday night after a prolonged illness, will be buried tomorrow at Mt. Calvary cemetery, Portland, following a solemn pontifical requiem mass to be said by Archbishop Edward D. Howard at St. Mary's Cathedral at 10 a.m. The office for the dead will be recited at the cathedral this evening.

Because of his long residence in Jackson county, special permission was given to conduct a requiem high Mass in his honor at Sacred Heart church at 9 a.m. today with the Rev. William McLeod officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. John Ilg as master of ceremonies. Other members of the clergy assisting in the requiem mass choir and in conducting the rosary held the evening before included the Rev. Michael Fleming, chaplain of Sacred Heart hospital; Rev. Ernest Jackson, pastor of the Ashland Catholic parish; the Rev. James Dillon, pastor of the Myrtle Creek parish; the Rev. Lawrence, O.S.P. Camp chaplain; and the Rev. Vincent Kerwick, O.F.M. Cap., pastor of Roseburg.

Studied in Ireland

Father Meagher, who completed his priestly studies at Mt. Mellary, Trappist Monastery in Ireland, came directly to the Oregon diocese at Portland 45 years ago. He was immediately assigned as assistant pastor to the then small Medford parish, with mission duties that alternated included Central Point, Eagle Point, Grants Pass and Jacksonville.

Many old timers remember Father Meagher making some of his rounds by horse and buggy and later by motor cycle and still later by car. In 1913 he was assigned as regular chaplain at Sacred Heart hospital and that was his residence until his death. For many years he conducted regular Sunday services at the pioneer St. Joseph's Catholic church at Jacksonville.

During the depression he was appointed chaplain for the C.C.C. camps of southern Oregon. He had to close the Jacksonville church in order to give the required time to that office. The Jacksonville church was restored and reopened under Father McLeod's direction recently.

Father Meagher was said to be able to repair or reconstruct almost any mechanical device. His perfect small model of a railroad engine sat on a mantle in his room and was viewed by many railroad trainmen and other mechanical experts.

Interested in Wireless

He and the late Dr. J. J. Emmens were among the first in the valley interested in wireless and radio and Father Meagher constructed his own radio upon which he received programs from as far away as Japan and Australia, much to his delight and that of his friends.

Father Meagher suffered a heart attack five years ago and this followed by other complications, left him in frail health. However, he was able to conduct his duties as chaplain until he suffered a stroke three years ago.

One Eel Equals About 300 Volts

Detroit — (UPI) — One eel equals about 300 volts and about 1,000 watts—and in Detroit's Belle Isle aquarium it all adds up to an electrifying show.

Curator Lee Finnerman has started three daily exhibitions starring his three eels, some wires and a row of electric lights. Finnerman said the eels' tails carry the negative charge and their heads the positive charge.

When aquarium aides, well protected with rubber gloves, place metal contacts on the head and tail of an eel brought into position beneath the row of 24 neon bulbs, the bulbs begin flashing.

Finnerman said he'd like to but can't step up the number of performances. The electric organs of the eels can only supply so much power before they have to be rested and allowed to recharge.

Forest Industries Plan Fair Pavilion

Portland—Plans to allocate \$250,000 to erect a forest products pavilion and to build and maintain exhibits at Oregon's centennial exposition and international trade fair were announced this week.

Announcement of the project came from A. A. (Tony) Laumann, KOGAP lumber industries, Medford, chairman of the finance committee, and Roy Gould, president of the Diamond Lumber company, Portland, chairman of the forest industries centennial committee.

The 24,000 square-foot futuristic type wooden structure will rise from the center of the centennial exposition grounds. It will be used as a pavilion to display the use of forest products in modern living. After the fair the building will be donated to the Oregon 4-H clubs as a permanent structure.

The committee hopes to begin construction on the pavilion this fall, Gould announced.

Cost of the buildings, and grounds, complete and ready for displays is estimated at \$105,000. An additional \$145,000 is budgeted to build the exhibits inside and outside the building and to staff and maintain the exhibits for the 100 days of the centennial exposition.

Financing is expected to come from pro-rated contributions from various forest products firms in Oregon. Fund-raising plans and committees will be announced in a few days, Laumann said.

The building is believed to be the first to use seven parabolas or conic sections.

Water will be drained off the roof at six points and fall into moats at the edges of the covered area, a spokesman explained. Wooden bridges will carry foot traffic over the moats into the building.

A tree farm demonstrating the forest industry's program to provide continual tree resources will be constructed next to the building. Various sizes of trees will be planted to show various stages of growth.

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Invitation Lack Intrigues Solons

Washington — (UPI) — The "case of the missing invitation" continued to intrigue Senate friends of Rear Adm. Hyman G. Rickover today.

Rickover, so-called "father" of the nuclear submarine, wasn't invited to last Friday's White House ceremony at which it was announced the nuclear submarine Nautilus had journeyed between the Pacific and Atlantic oceans under the North Pole.

A number of senators have been hopping mad about it. Sen. Clinton P. Anderson (D-N.M.), vice chairman of the Joint Congressional Atomic Energy committee, announced he would introduce a resolution calling for a special Congressional Medal of Merit for Rickover.

Anderson, in a Senate speech Monday night, deplored the failure of the President to invite Rickover. The White House had said there was not enough room to include Rickover on the invitation list.

"It was more likely due to limitations in space within the Navy for a man who is and has been outspoken in his criticisms of the old outmoded Navy concepts," Anderson declared.

Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.) said the President's failure to invite Rickover to the ceremony was "nothing short of shocking." He described the White House explanation as a "lame excuse."

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Stock Market Runs Into Tight Money

New York — (UPI) — The stock market ran into a tight money roadblock today and backed away from the new 1958 highs set Monday.

Interest rates on short-term funds have been rising recently, partly reflecting Federal Reserve action in reducing the amount of money available for such loans.

Leading auto stocks were lower, depressed somewhat by signs that contract talks in that key industry may be nearing a showdown. American motors countered the trend. It added a small fraction.

Aircraft and steel stocks leaned toward the downside. Copper stocks showed losses running past a point in Kennecott and Phelps Dodge at their lows. Chemicals featured on the downside, with
