

Actress Hospitalized After Rebuff by Husband

Hollywood —UPI— Actress Wanda Hendrix, hospitalized in "deep shock" after her millionaire husband rebuffed her reconciliation attempt, was under observation today at Cedars of Lebanon hospital.

The film star, former wife of actor Audie Murphy, collapsed Wednesday in the office of her attorney and was rushed by ambulance to the hospital. Oxygen was administered on the way.

Dr. Lee Siegel, studio staff physician for 20th Century Fox, ordered her placed under sedation and instructed

a private nurse to watch over her. Later, she was reported resting comfortably.

Result of Failure
Miss Hendrix' lawyer, Oscar R. Cummins, claimed the collapse was the result of her failure to convince her estranged husband, millionaire sportsman James Langford Stack Jr., that they could save their marriage.

Cummins said he had arranged a conference telephone call between the actress, Stack and his attorney in Reno, when Miss Hendrix' repeated attempts to talk to her husband had failed.

"Wanda made a plea to her husband that they make another try at saving their marriage," Cummins said.

He quoted the beautiful film star as saying to Stack: "We can make a go of it."
"We're not discussing emotion," the attorney said Stack replied, "We're here to talk legal talk."

With that, according to Cummins, Miss Hendrix screamed and slumped in her chair, ignoring attempts to talk to her. Dr. Siegel was called.

Miss Hendrix and Stack were wed June 26, 1954.

Road-E-O Finalists Tour White House

Department to Act Quickly in Case

Washington —UPI— A Justice Department spokesman said today the government will act "expeditiously" on the House of Representatives' citation of Bernard Goldfine for contempt of Congress.

The House listened to a small but stormy debate Wednesday and then voted 369-8 to cite the Boston millionaire for his adamant refusal to answer 22 questions about his business affairs before the House influence-investigating subcommittee.

If brought to trial and convicted, the gift-giving friend of Presidential Assistant Sherman Adams would face a maximum sentence of one year in prison and a \$1,000 fine or both.

The Justice Department spokesman explained the department's first step would be to "evaluate" the citation and the testimony that brought it about to see whether the case merited presentation to a federal grand jury. If the matter is turned over to a grand jury, he said, the jurors would decide whether Goldfine should be brought to trial.

In Boston, Goldfine's attorney, Samuel P. Sears, said that "we will fight this, of course." He said the House cited Goldfine because members "had to back up their committee."

Record Quantity of Albacore Delivered

Astoria —UPI— Albacore in record quantity was delivered to an Astoria cannery Monday.

The Radar, a Seattle boat, delivered 11 tons of tuna. Several other boats docked with nine-ton loads, and several reported six to seven-ton deliveries.

Fishermen reported that the albacore was being taken from Cape Blanco north to Neah Bay with the main concentration off the coast slightly south of Newport.

Rickover to Miss Launchings of Two Atomic Submarines

Washington —UPI— Rear Adm. Hyman G. Rickover said today he will not attend two forthcoming launchings of atomic submarines. He made his plans known amid indications that a snub to his wife may be involved.

Rickover said "I am just too busy" to attend the christening of the Sea Dragon at Portsmouth, N. H., Saturday and the Triton at Groton, Conn., Tuesday.

Asked about news reports

quoting Mrs. Rickover as criticizing high Navy officials for their treatment of both him and herself, the admiral commented: "You can't control your wife."

Mrs. Rickover was quoted in news interviews as being miffed that she was not asked by the Navy to christen the Triton even though the firm which built the sub suggested she preside at the ceremonies.

Father of Subs

Her husband is known as "the father of atomic submarines."

There were congressional charges that Rickover himself was snubbed last week when he was not invited to White House ceremonies celebrating the voyage under the North Pole of the atomic submarine Nautilus.

The Navy this week publicly apologized for omitting him from the guest list. Rickover has frequently clashed with Navy "brass" in his zeal for the nuclear underwater craft.

A current controversy centers around the fact that unless Rickover is promoted to vice admiral, he must retire from the Navy next July 1. He has been passed over twice by Navy promotion boards. A group of 21 senators introduced a bill Wednesday urging that he be given a special medal for his work on nuclear power.

Mrs. Rickover was quoted as saying "Navy brass was out to hurt my husband for his independent and free spirit." She reportedly assailed "stupid windbags" in the higher echelons and claimed she was deliberately bypassed in the Triton affair.

Asked if his wife had ever been asked to christen a Navy vessel, Rickover replied: "No."
