

Ecuador May Be Factor in Oil, Mineral Under U.S. Exploration

New York—UPI—Little Ecuador which straddles the equator and up to now has been noted for its bananas, cocoa, coffee and panama hats, may be a factor in oil and minerals under U.S. exploration.

And Ecuador likes the USA in contrast with some South American countries where recently Vice President Richard Nixon received bad treatment from Communist-inspired mobs.

Universal Mineral Resources, Inc., has contracted with Ecuador for large-scale development of the magnetite-titanium beach sands which stretch for more than 100 miles along the Pacific.

Several North American companies are vying for choice acreage in some of Ecuador's established oil basins. Ecuador already is producing 3,500,000 barrels of oil annually from shallow wells.

Among the companies active in exploration in Ecuador are Standard Oil of California through its Ecuadorian subsidiary, California Ecuador Petroleum company, Panapac Oil company, Carolina Oil company, and Anglo Ecuadorian Oil Fields, Ltd.

Universal's president, Lester Renard, reports that interest in Ecuadorian oil concessions

trebled overnight following the Middle East unsettlement. He said negotiations involving millions of acres are now under way with one major U.S. producer with the signing of a contract imminent.

Universal Mineral now has more than 8,000 square miles of oil concessions and applications approved by the government of Ecuador which, in an effort to attract foreign capital, now offers as favorable tax and currency regulations as can be found anywhere.

The Universal contract was negotiated by Universal Mineral Resources through its Panama subsidiary, the National Company, Ltd., with Kyanna Oil company of Kentucky.

The contract calls for the company to pay six per cent of the net dollar value of the ore concentrate removed to the Ecuadorian government for the first 10 years, 6.5 per cent for the next 10 years and 7.5 per cent from the last 10 years of the 30-year agreement.

The section leased by Kyanna comprises less than one third of the "black sand" shoreline held under concession by Universal Mineral. It is estimated that there are more than 200 million tons of recoverable metallic concentrate along these beaches.

Ecuador which hasn't as

much land as the state of Nevada, hopes the oil and mineral developments will help solve its economic problems.

In a speech recently in New York, Dr. Jose R. Chiriboga, Ecuador's ambassador to the United States said, "We feel that we are only at the beginning of our industrial expansion. . . . We have all seen what happened in Venezuela and we have every reason to believe similar developments are in store for Ecuador over the next few years."

The fact that oil and mineral concessions are going to U.S. companies is seen as highly significant.

President of Ecuador, Camilo Ponce Enrrique, said at the time of Vice President Nixon's visit that the Soviet had made offers of aid which included technical assistance and establishment of industries on long term credits and tiny interest rates.

Texas Town Tense After Chief Shot

Boyd, Tex.—(UPI)—Boyd's police officers were under orders to "stay out of sight" today while patrolmen and a deputy sheriff investigated why Police Chief Lee Cockrell was shot in the back Wednesday night.

"Stay out of sight until things quiet down," Mayor W. C. Horn warned Cockrell's two patrolmen.

Horn told United Press International he figured the mob of 200 that gathered after Cockrell was shot lauded the police chief's alleged assaults because "they thought he was too rough on them."

Cockrell rested in St. Joseph's Hospital, Fort Worth, today, while highway patrolmen took over the job of law enforcement in the small, seething north Texas town.

Joseph Earl Henderson, 21, one of the men said to be involved in the main street gun battle was being treated at an Azle, Tex., clinic.

Henderson and two companions, 23-year-old Warren Sautler and 22-year-old Orville Lee Peel, were charged with assault to murder. Peel and Sautler were free on \$5,000 bond each.

Wise County Sheriff Carl Ramsey said townspeople were still tense, although there were no new demonstrations this morning.

Nearly half the town's populace milled in Main st. after the shooting, praising those whom they thought shot Cockrell and hoping the police chief would die.

Rangers Find Body Of California Man

Jackson, Wyo.—UPI—Park rangers have recovered the body of a 43-year-old Stockton, Calif., man who fell to his death on a mountain ledge in Grand Teton National Park Wednesday.

He was Parshall A. Terry, who slipped and fell 100 feet to a lower ledge while jumping rocks.

A 12-man recovery team, led by Park Ranger John Fonda, found the body early Thursday about 1,000 feet from the peak of the 11,750-foot mountain.

Terry, according to Chief Park Ranger Russell Dickenson, was with his two teen-age sons and a brother-in-law, Francis Andres, of Rupert, Idaho.

United Campaign Noted by Holmes

A proclamation designating September, October and November as United community campaigns time was signed by Gov. Robert D. Holmes today, officials of the Oregon United Appeal, Inc., announced.

The proclamation notes that 2,100 communities with millions of volunteers will conduct United community campaigns this fall.

Such campaigns raised more than \$412 million last year to support more than 27,500 national, state and local voluntary health and welfare agencies. Such agencies will serve more than 150,000 of Oregon's citizens, the proclamation concluded.

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Strip Teaser Makes Movieland History

Producer Edward L. Alperson filmed the sequence knowing Hollywood censors would kill the shot, but he holds high hopes it will remain in the picture for foreign distribution.

With the influx of Brigitte Bardot films from France nudity has become increasingly popular with movie-makers.

Hollywood, too, has relaxed its restrictions on expanses of epidermis. But not to the point of allowing Lili to frolic on the screen without so much as a G-string.

The scene used for "I, Mobster," was taken directly from Lili's night club act in which she disrobes to take a bath. However, her night spot nips are performed behind a mesh curtain, and she always manages to keep partially covered up.

Shocker To Oldtimers
Lili's movie strip was a shocker to oldtimers. Nothing like it had ever been attempted before.

Even Lili was surprised. "I've never disrobed entirely before an audience before in my life," she said. "I don't know what they'll do with the shots except to show them to their friends."

The crew and cast took a

different point of view. They enjoyed the sequence immensely.

Coughs, dropped wrenches and imperfect lighting necessitated retake after retake. On one occasion the camera accidentally ran out of film.

Electricians, grips, prop men and carpenters evidenced uncommon interest in the scene. They crowded around the camera, hung from overhead catwalks, climbed ladders and generally resembled the front row at Minsky's.

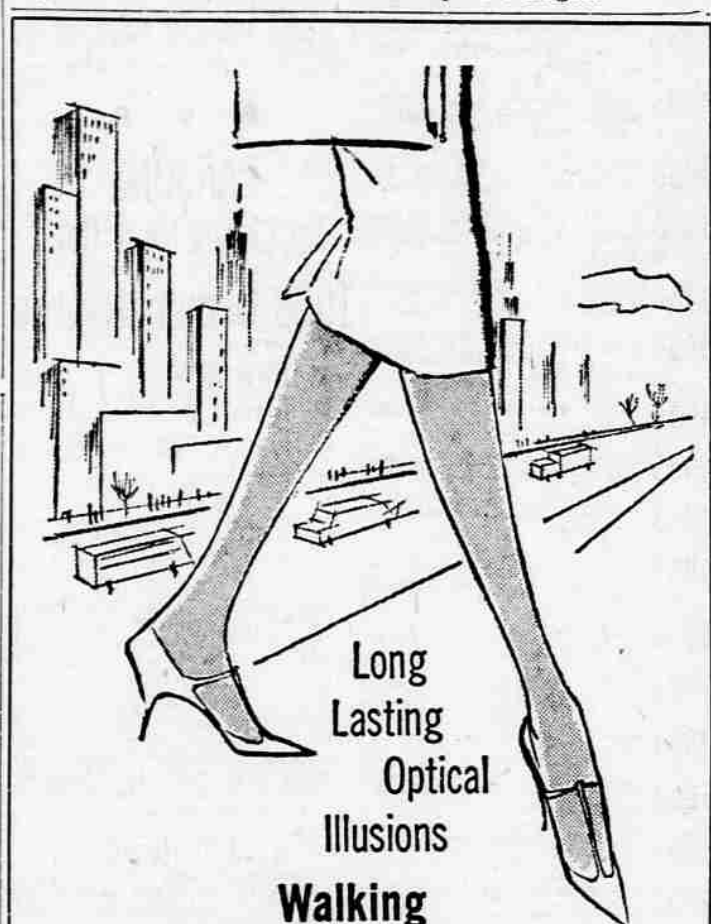
Lili Drops Towel

Director Roger Corman yelled, "that's it, print it." The crew broke into cheers and whistles. Lili, not the least embarrassed, smiled proudly and executed a curtsy.

Alperson believes American censors will stick with the action until the towel drops. Then it's Katy bar the door.

The sequence was filmed three times. In the first version Lili had a small towel draped around her waist. The second time the towel covered her from shoulder to hips.

On the third trip the second towel was missing.
