Visitors Here

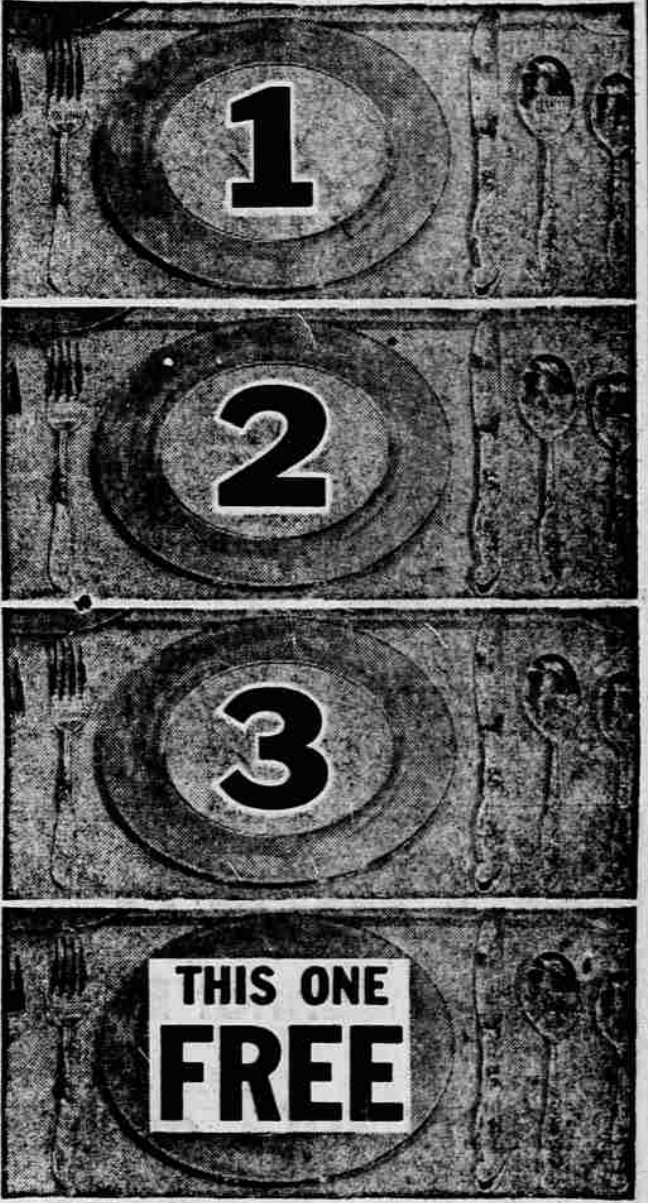
