

No Cause for Alarm That Leaves Turn Brown

There is no great cause for alarm over the fact that the leaves in many of the oak trees throughout the valley are turning brown, County Extension Agent Cliff Cordy reported yesterday.

He said the extension office has received many calls from concerned residents of the area questioning the cause and cure of the change.

The browning results from infection by a fungus disease, Cordy explained. "We have always had a touch of it in the valley," he continued, "but the warm, humid weather we had earlier in the year caused a larger spread than usual this year."

"We don't anticipate any

particularly bad results from the fungus but it will weaken the trees," he said. No trees should die from the disease, according to the agent.

Cordy did warn, however, that if a tree is defoliated early and then leafs out again with the fungus, the disease could be very weakening. Owners should allow the stricken trees to remain as dry as possible this summer, he added.

"It is to be expected that by next year the situation will have returned to normal with mild cases scattered through the valley," Cordy concluded.

The Medical Roundup

KNOWING ONE'S ANCESTRY

Every so often I see a patient with some nervous disease of hereditary origin, or I

see two young people with some hereditary disease in both their families who realize that they should not marry, or I see the unhappy parents of a feeble-minded or blind child who want to know what their chances are of having a normal child if they try again.

Often, in such cases, I wish that the couple knew much more about their family history on the two sides. It would help so much in forming an opinion if they knew more about those "blackouts" or "fainting spells" that one of the grandmothers used to have. Were they really epileptic attacks or were they ordinary fainting spells?

Or what were those two "nervous breakdowns" that one of the aunts had? Were they definite depressions? Or what was the real story back of the strange death of an uncle? Was it a suicide, as his friends maintained, or was it an accident as the family preferred to call it? Was the man badly depressed before he shot himself? It is unfortunate that so commonly

the members of a family gloss over the fact that a relative had epilepsy or a depression or committed suicide. The result is that when a grandchild goes to a physician with a curious story of many short jitters spells each day, the doctor does not even think of the possibility that the child has epilepsy, and thus the correct diagnosis is missed.

A hundred years ago Sir Francis Galton, the founder of the science of Human Genetics, feeling the great need for better family records, published a couple of books that could be used by heads of families for the preservation of information about the health of their immediate ancestors. Unfortunately, Galton was so far ahead of his time that I am sure little was done with the books that he got out. I have in my library—as curiosities—copies of them.

Recently, I called attention in this column to record books that have been gotten out of this country, largely for the purpose of keeping records of the illnesses of the several children in a family. How often, when a young man is exposed to mumps does he wish he knew whether he had ever had the disease? It might make a tremendous difference in his future life if he didn't have them; mumps after childhood can have some disastrous results. Now, Charles E. Tuttle, the eminent book dealer in Rutland, Vt., has re-published a family record book which was brought out originally by William H. Whitmore in 1885.

I feel I should keep emphasizing my conviction that the most important facts that people can put into a family record are those in regard to the character, temperament and mental health of their known ancestors and near relatives, which must include uncles and aunts, nephews and nieces and cousins. It is of but slight interest to me to know that my father's grandmother was named Barbara; it interests me to know that she was well and strong in her eighties and it interests me even more to know that she was a woman of such great character and wisdom that people came to her from miles around to get her advice about their problems. It interests me much, also, to know that the scientific and mechanical and inventive interests that crop up here and there in my family showed up in an uncle of my father who, over a hundred years ago, was banding birds, and making watches for the fun of it.

So often in American when a physician wants very much to know something about the family nervous inheritance, the patient says, "I know nothing about my grandparents and uncles and aunts because they were all left behind in Europe." Matters are so much better in the Scandinavian countries where church and township records sometimes are available for the last several hundred years.

Now I can get the fast relief you need from nagging backache, headache and muscular aches and pains that often cause restless nights and miserable tired-out feelings. When these discomfort
