In addition to the cost of the tractor itself, members also discussed the fact that implements now owned by the chapter would have to be replaced in a larger size to fit the new tractor.

Gold Hill Library Extending Hours

The Gold Hill branch of the Jackson county library will extend its opening hours, beginning Sept. 2, to include Friday as well as Tuesday evenings, according to Mrs. Jewel Routh, librarian.

The schedule will be Tuesdays, 2 to 5 and 7 to 9 p.m. and Fridays, 2 to 5 and 7 to 9 p.m.

Mrs. Routh reported increasing use of the Gold Hill library with the expansion of its book stock from 545 cataloged volumes July 1, 1951, to the present collection of 1,014 volumes. Each month 60 new titles are brought to Gold Hill from the Jackson county library headquarters in Medford and exchanged for 60 titles no longer needed by Gold Hill readers. They include current new publications as well as standard older works, books for children and teen-agers as well as for adult readers, and both factual books and fiction.

An average of 250 volumes have been circulated each month during the past year, to a total of 71 registered borrowers. Borrowers' cards issued by any Jackson county library agency, including the headquarters library in Medford, will be honored in the Gold Hill library. All Jackson county readers are especially welcome to use the Gold Hill library while the Medford Public library building is closed for repairs the first two weeks in September, Mrs. Routh said.

Barnhart Low on Microwave Station

A Medford contractor, Howard Barnhart, 722 Dakota ave., was low bidder on a contract for construction of a Pacific Telephone microwave station in Douglas county, according to J. H. Creager, telephone manager here.

Creager said Barnhart was awarded a \$27,825 contract to build a microwave radio relay building and tower footings at Kenyon mountain.

The 25 by 27-foot, one-story building will be of concrete block construction. It will be framed for expansion on one side.

The relay station on Kenyon mountain is one of several to be constructed as part of a joint Pacific Telephone-West Coast Telephone company project establishing a relay system between Roseburg and Coos Bay.

The system is tentatively scheduled to be in operation early in 1960.
