

Dodgers Maintain Hex on Milwaukee With 2-1 Victory

Okay, so the Dodgers won't be in the World Series, and if they keep fiddling around they can lose it up for Milwaukee, too.

The Braves can't understand it. They hold a season edge over every club in the National league except those drafted Dodgers, who now have beaten them 12 out of 18 times this year.

Walt Alton's crew clinched the season's series Wednesday night with a 2-1 victory over the Braves that sliced their lead to 5½ games. It was the Dodgers' third straight win over Milwaukee and entrenched them a bit more solidly in fourth place.

The Braves staked Warren Spahn to a one-run lead in the first inning when Hank Aaron doubled to score Eddie Mathews. But the Dodgers bounced back with a pair in the fifth on Joe Pignatano's homer, a walk and Norm Larker's triple.

Drives in Eight Runs

Willie Jones had his best night of the season by driving in eight runs in Philadelphia's 12-2 victory over St. Louis, and San Francisco nipped Cincinnati, 4-3. Pittsburgh won the opener of a double header, 4-2, while Chicago scored a 5-1 triumph in the nightcap which was called because of rain in the bottom of the fifth.

The Yankees ended a four-game losing streak and all talk of possible panic with a 7-1 win over the Indians; the Tigers gained a 7-1 decision over the Senators to break a five-game losing streak; Baltimore beat Kansas City, 4-3, and the White Sox won their seventh straight by defeating the Red Sox, 10-8.

Jones did all his damage against the Cardinals with a pair of three-run homers and a two-run double. Stan Musial tied Mel Ott's National league record for total extra bases at 2,165 when he doubled in the first inning.

Pinch Single Wins

Bill White, just back from the Army, came through with a two-run pinch single in the

sixth to give the Giants their victory and hand Brooks Lawrence his ninth straight defeat.

Dick Stuart's 11th homer with one on helped the Pirates to their opening game victory over the Cubs. Chuck Tanner ripped off three straight hits against loser Bob Friend to pace the Cubs in the abbreviated nightcap.

Yogi Berra pulled the Yankees out of the doldrums when he drove in three runs with a pair of homers off rookie Gary Bell of the Indians.

Leaves Sick Bed

Al Kaline came out of a sick bed to knock in six runs with a pair of three-run homers that beat the Senators. Bob Nieman contributed a home run, triple and a single that accounted for three of the Orioles' four runs in their victory over the Athletics.

Jim Landis' two-run homer in the seventh inning brought the surging White Sox from behind and made it a happy 50th birthday for manager Al Lopez. The victory was the White Sox' 20th in their last 26 games.

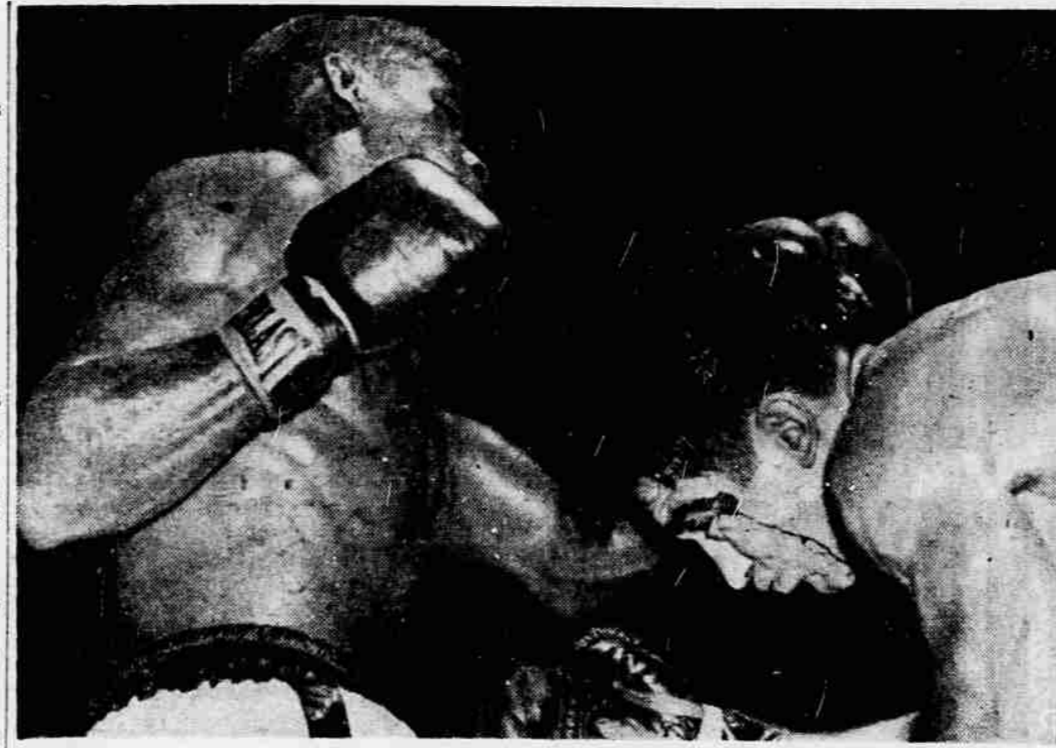

Sports Anti-Trust Bill Proposed by Sen. Dirksen

Washington —(UPI)—A plan to save minor leagues from extinction will be placed before the convening Congress next year by Sen. Everett M. Dirksen (R-Ill.).

The outspoken Senate leader outlined his own sports anti-trust bill Wednesday and expressed hope for a January passage of the measure.

Dirksen said his bill would rescue minor leagues from the threat of unrestricted major league television and broadcasting by imposing a 75-mile blackout during home games. This in turn would safeguard professional baseball, football basketball and hockey from costly anti-trust law suits.

His bill is almost a duplicate of an earlier measure which passed the House and died in a Senate judiciary sub-

Drag Races This Sunday

Virg Akins Scores KO

Chicago —(UPI)—Virgil Akins who scored his sixth straight knockout as welterweight champion Wednesday night, said today he is "finally ready for the big money."

Akins, of St. Louis, Mo., made his first appearance since winning the title in June and scored a 10th round technical knockout over Charley (Tomestone) Smith in a televised non-title match at the Chicago Stadium. But he absorbed a beating before his 10th round rally pulled it out of the fire.

Akins, cut over both eyes, was a constant target of Smith's long, flicking lefts and a store of solid rights until the end came for the Los Angeles battler.

Tucson, Ariz. —(UPI)—Don Morano of Belleville, Ill., took a surprising three-stroke lead into second round play of the 13th annual 72-hole Jaycee International Junior Golf tournament today.

Morano tallied five birdies Wednesday to put together halves of 33 for a 66 on the par-70 El Rio Country club course.

The favored Buddy Baker of Florence, S. C., fired a 37-32-69. The USGA Junior or champ shot a 32 on the back side to make up for early trouble when he bogied three of the first seven holes.

Complaint Filed Against Drug Firm

Portland —(UPI)—Suit was filed here Wednesday against a drug firm making tranquilizer pills by the parents of a youth who consumed three or four bottles of the drug after watching a television program.

John B. Cramer seeks a Circuit Court judgment of \$100,250 from Carter Products, Inc., through its Wallace Laboratories division. Also named as a defendant was the Pioneer Broadcasting company.

The Cramer complaint claims that the 11-year-old boy saw the Milton tranquilizer pills described on a television program and accepted an invitation to write for literature and samples through the mails. Cramer declared in his complaint that the boy received six bottles of the drug and used three or four of them without his parents' knowledge. The complaint alleges serious physical and mental injury resulted.

Darien, Conn. —(UPI)—Barbara Romack of Sacramento, Calif., seeking to regain the National Women's Amateur golf championship she won in 1954, faced the stiffest test of the six U.S. Curtis Cup players who tee off today at the Wee Burn Country club in the fifth round of the tournament.

Miss Romack met Jessie Valentine of Scotland, the last surviving member of the British Curtis Cup team. Two rounds were scheduled for today to narrow the field down to the four semifinalists.

The five other U.S. Curtis Cuppers, headed by the tournament defending champion, Joanne Gunderson of Seattle, Wash., all were favored to extend the formful pattern of the event thus far. Miss Gunderson's fifth-round opponent was Rosemary Neundorff of Toronto.

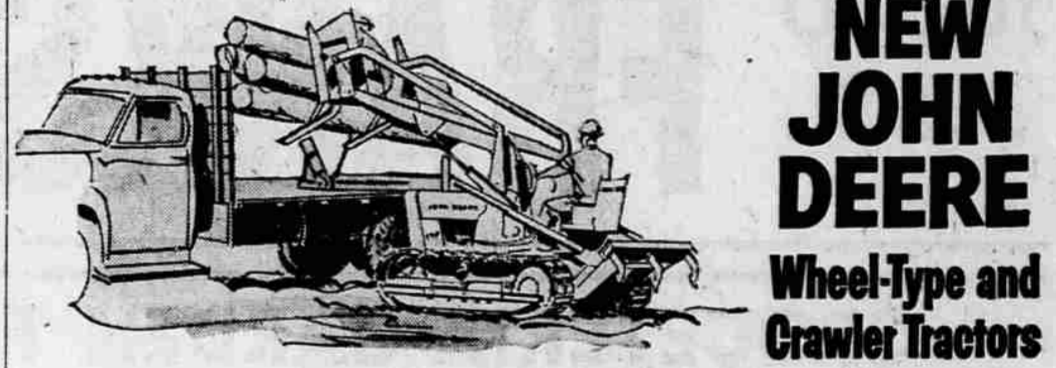
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
