

Strike Possible For Airlines Men

West Coast airlines, Inc. station personnel are overwhelmingly in favor of a peaceful withdrawal should strike action become necessary, according to a vote taken by the Air Line Agents association, International.

Purpose of the strike vote, said Victor J. Herbert, ALAA president, is to enable station personnel of West Coast Airlines to conclude an employment agreement which will allow them to obtain and enjoy the same rates of pay, rules and working conditions paid by other companies in the air line industry.

After receiving a refusal to arbitrate from West Coast Airlines, the National Mediation board on July 23 ended the mediation. The 30-day cooling off period ends on Aug. 23.

At the same time Herbert announced that strike ballots have been circulated among station employees of Pacific air lines and an early shut-down appears imminent.

"It is believed," remarked Herbert, "that Pacific air lines has embarked upon a union busting campaign."

Both airlines use the Medford municipal airport.

"I didn't care who won until the boys came into the ring," she said. "But look at that Roy Harris. He's just as cute as he can be. I hope Patterson doesn't hurt his face."

At about the tenth round Kim was near tears as she watched gore coursing down her hero's battered face.

Tony Curtis, a few rows away, was yelling for a knockout. He was one of the

few Hollywoodites rooting for the champ. Bing Crosby sat with his son Philip and band leader Phil Harris. The Groaner, a long-time fight fan, seemed bored by the proceedings. But Harris took the opportunity to spar for a few moments with ex-champ Max Baer, neither of whom could have lasted a round with Shirley Temple.

Eddie Fisher and Debbie Reynolds had front-row seats. "Down in front," little Debbie howled when photographers jumped up to take pictures.

"I'm from Texas," she said proudly, "so you know who I'm pulling for. Both gosh, Roy sure is taking a beating."

Ray Danton was on hand, too. His wife, Julia Adams, stayed home. "The last time I took Julie to the fights one of the boys had his mouthpiece knocked out and it landed right in her lap," Ray explained. "I haven't even been able to talk her into watching the fights on TV since then."

Quinn Does Research Producer-director-actor Anthony Quinn was there doing research for his next movie, a fight film.

Rory Calhoun, who stars in a new TV western series titled "The Texan" this fall, was hollering for Harris. After the fight he said, "maybe we ought to change the title to 'The Arizonan'."

Also at ringside were Walter Pidgeon, Bob Evans, Howard Keel and Joe E. Brown. Director-producer George Stevens was fascinated by the Texas contingent, some of whom were wearing all white cowboy outfits and teggallon hats.

"If I'd tried to put my actors in those kind of costumes for 'Giant' nobody would have believed it," he observed.

Oregon's Guard Gets High Rating

Salem —The Oregon Army National Guard continues to lead the eight western states comprising the Sixth Army area in superior ratings for annual armory inspections, according to word from Maj. Gen. Thomas E. Rilea, Oregon adjutant general.

"This is the third consecutive year our Army National Guard has led the field," General Rilea said. "We are very proud of their enviable record."

According to the Sixth Army letter, a tabulation of the percentages of the overall ratings awarded within each state for the fiscal year 1958, showed Oregon leading in "Superior" ratings with 21.8 per cent. Second place winner was the Washington Army National Guard with 18.2 per cent.

National Guard units are inspected each year by a regular Army inspector general assigned by the army commander. The rugged inspection includes the unit's training, past training, unit administration, supply and maintenance of government property. Each category is rated separately with "Training" accorded the greatest weight.

The Sixth Army area includes the States of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, California, Arizona and Utah.

Navy Said Launching Rockets from Planes

Editor's note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual report. The Family Council does not give advice; it merely reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Flora S. — The younger kids bother my boy friends and me. Mrs. F. S. — They are normal kids — you can't keep them down.

Flora S. — I am nearly 17 and a senior in high school. I am having an awful problem with my younger sisters and brothers and my mother. I have a steady boy friend and he visits me nearly every night so he can help me with my homework. My younger sisters and brothers then start acting up, making noise, sitting on my bed, making remarks. When I tell my mother to make the kids stop, she says she doesn't like the idea of me getting help with my homework from Larry. It's gotten so he doesn't want to come over to my house any more. He wants me to come over to his house, but my mother makes a fuss about that too.

Mrs. F. S. — Although Larry got out of high school last year and therefore thinks he knows something, I happen to know that he got through school by the skin of his teeth and I think Flora was doing a lot better before she got him to help with her homework. I told her to do her homework by herself, but then she spends half the evening talking to him on the telephone, so it's no use trying to keep him to help with her homework.

The younger kids can be pesky, but they do get all excited about having a visitor in the house every evening. They are just normal kids and you can't keep them down when something is going on.

The Council: In a well regulated household both young children and adolescents accept discipline easily if they

also receive justice. From both accounts, it appears to us that there is a lack of both discipline and justice in this home.

Flora has a right to receive her boy friend without fear of intrusion and embarrassment from her younger sisters and brothers. She should also accept discipline from her parents when they say they don't want Larry helping with her homework.

Flora should not be seeing her boy friend every night of the week and the homework excuse is not a good one. Homework is given for the express purpose of making the student wrestle with certain problems on his own.

Flora should realize she is depriving herself of a valuable experience when she doesn't learn independence in this respect. The library should be her only source of help with her homework.

Mrs. F. S. seems unable to lay down the law as to the telephone. There should be a time limit on telephone calls. If Flora will not respect this limit, she should lose her telephone privileges.

It appears to us that Mrs. F. S. is using the younger children to make things unpleasant for Flora and Larry. This can only result in the chaos this family seems to be suffering from.

Where is Mr. F. S. while all this is going on? It sounds as though a firm masculine hand is needed somewhere in this picture. The younger children should learn that if they want their rights respected, they must treat others with courtesy. We don't go along with the theory that "normal kids" can't be kept in line when they understand the rules of the household and the reasons for those rules.
