Don Drysdale equalled a home run record for pitchers and Gil Hodges broke his own record for grand slam homers Saturday in leading the Los Angeles Dodgers to a 10-1 victory over the Milwaukee Braves.

The win was the 14th for Pierce, who missed a shutout when Bill Skowron homered for the Yankees in the seventh inning.

Little Loop Title Won By Mexico

Williamsport, Pa. —UPI— The "Mighty Mites" from Monterrey, Mexico, headed for New York and a visit with Casey Stengel's Yankees today after their precedent-shattering victory in the Little League World Series.

In other American League games, three home runs sparked the Cleveland Indians to an 8-1 win over the Boston Red Sox; Al Cicotte's relief pitching helped the Detroit Tigers to a 5-1 victory over Baltimore; and Bob Martyn drove in all of Kansas City's runs in a 3-1 decision over the Washington Senators.

Pierce, who fanned five, bested Whitey Ford of the Yankees in a southpaw duel when the White Sox scored four runs in the seventh inning to take a 7-0 lead. Boone, with a homer and a single, drove in four runs during the game.

The Monterrey team captured the admiration of the 12,000 spectators by winning the title although having only one holdover player from the squad which won the championship last year.

Rocky Colavito, Minnie Miñoso, and Randy Jackson slammed homers to lead the Indians to their victory at Boston. With this support, Cal McLish scattered nine Boston hits to gain his 13th victory.

Cicotte, who relieved Foytack with the bases loaded and two out in the fifth inning, held Baltimore scoreless the rest of the way on two hits. The Tigers had 11 hits off four Oriole pitchers but four of their runs were unearned with the help of errors by Brooks Robinson and Bob Niemann.

Martyn drove in two runs in the third inning and another in the eighth to give the Athletics their victory at Washington. Bob Grim of the A's pitched a six - hitter to earn his third win of the year.

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West Big 4 Formed By Busters of PCC

San Francisco —UPI— A new athletic conference to replace the dying Pacific Coast conference was born here Saturday when four Pacific Coast schools banded together in the new Athletic Association of Western Universities.

The new conference, which will be known popularly as the "Western Big Four," is composed of California, Washington, UCLA and USC.

Chancellor Glenn T. Seaborg of California, spokesman for the new conference, outlined the rules which govern the new association as a news conference.

"We have set no limits on the size of the conference," he said, "but any school which meets our standards may apply for admission."

Regulations stated that it will take a unanimous vote by the members for the admission of a new school. It was indicated that Stanford probably will seek admission in the near future although no representative of the university was present at Saturday's meeting.

"We are very hopeful Stanford will enter the conference soon," Seaborg said. "We cannot say when and we cannot actually say they will."

Seaborg will represent California in the new conference. Representing the other members will be Don Wollet, Washington; Bradford Booth, UCLA, and Hugh Willett, USC.

July 1, 1959, Start
The Western Big Four will officially come into being on July 1, 1959—one day after the final burial rites for the PCC. The four schools are committed to remain in the PCC until its official dissolution June 30, 1959.

Seaborg said there was no discussion of the Rose Bowl in organizational meetings of the new league. He pointed out that after 1960 commitments for the Rose Bowl game will be handled by Pasadena's Tournament of Roses committee.

"We have no commitment, understanding, official or otherwise, with the Rose Bowl people," Seaborg said. UCLA and USC, supported by California and Washington, forced a bust up of the PCC last year when they served notice they were pulling out.

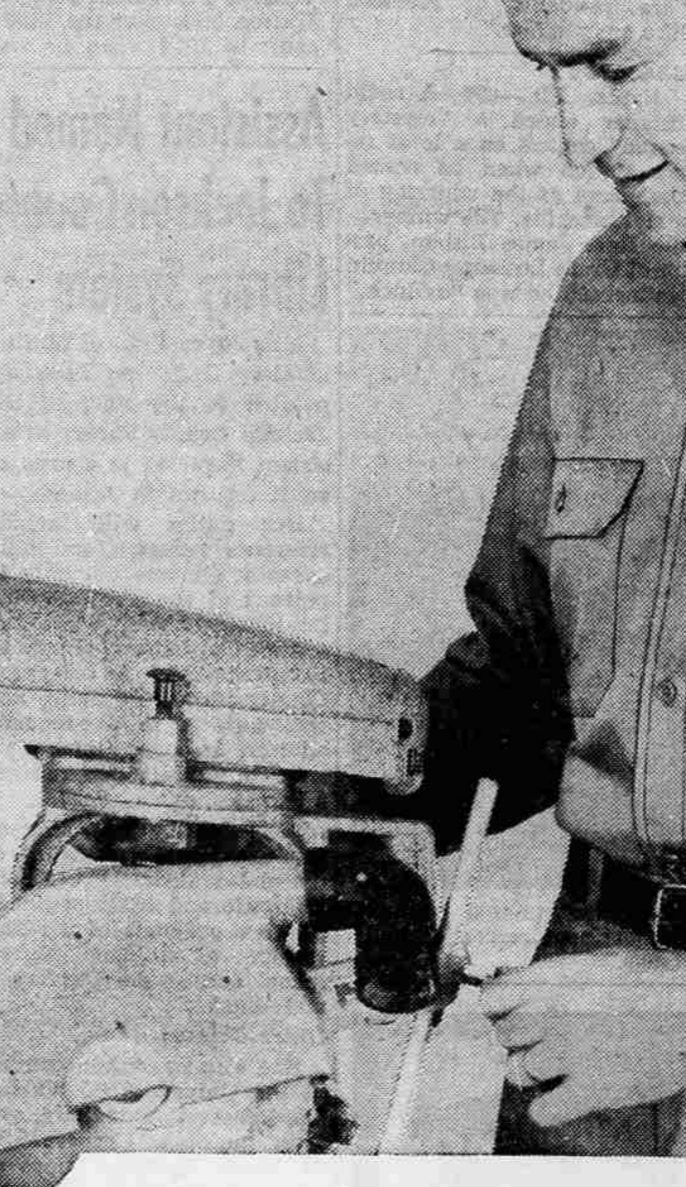
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Indians Racked 3-0 By Portland Beavers
