

Geddes, Hatfield Get Most Votes in Straw Balloting

Paul Geddes, Roseburg, Republican candidate for representative from the fourth congressional district, polled four more votes than Charles O. Porter, Democrat incumbent, in a "straw" vote sponsored by radio station KMED in connection with the Kiwanis club sponsored county fair here last week end.

A total of 790 votes was cast for national, state and local officers, and on two issues which will appear on the ballot in the November election. George Stacey, Medford public accountant, counted and certified the ballots cast.

Geddes received 368 votes and Porter got 384, according to Frank Pinnock, news director at KMED.

Hatfield Gets 521

Mark Hatfield, Republican candidate for governor, received 521 straw votes, and Gov. Robert D. Holmes, Democrat, who is seeking reelection, polled 261 votes. Norman O. Nilsen, Portland, Democratic candidate for commissioner of labor, received 322 votes, and Lyle E. McCauley, Salem, Republican candidate, received 366.

In the fifth district senatorial race, Edward R. Durno, Republican candidate, received 433 votes, and the Democratic candidate, Gordon Hudson, received 324.

Robert B. Duncan and Mrs. Marijane Duncan, Medford, Democratic candidates for state representative, polled 444 and 284 votes, respectively, and Melvin Lattie and Mrs. Evelyn Nye, Medford, Republican candidates for representative, received 293 and 284, respectively.

County Races

In county races, incumbent Mrs. Bereth Hopkins, Republican, received 425 for county clerk, and Marvin Madden, Phoenix, Democratic candidate received 338. Chester Wendt, incumbent county commissioner and a Republican, polled 439 votes to Frank Christian's 309. Christian is Democratic candidate for commissioner.

Earl Miller, former Medford mayor, Republican, received 470 votes for county judge and C. Scott Hamilton, Democrat, received 279. Joe Walsh, Republican candidate for sheriff, received 455, and Earle E. Fichtner, Democratic candidate, polled 294 votes.

Two state issues appeared on the straw ballot. They were whether or not the death penalty should be retained and on increasing salaries of state senators and representatives from \$600 to \$1,200 annually. There were 447 votes cast in favor of retaining the death penalty and 268 against; 506 were in favor of increasing salaries and 226 were against it.

Umatilla Records Case of Polio

Pendleton - Umatilla county health officer Walter P. Browne Monday revealed that the county recorded its first polio case in more than 16 months.

Dr. Browne said the patient was a 29-year-old male resident of Pilot Rock. He will be hospitalized for five days before returning home.

Dr. Browne said the man had not been inoculated with Salk vaccine.

Meat Freight Rate Hearings Slated

Salem - (UPI) - Motor and rail freight rates on movement of packing-house products and meats from Midwest points to the West Coast will be investigated by the Interstate Commerce Commission at a hearing set for Oct. 28 at Denver, Colo. Oregon Public Utility Commissioner Howard Morgan said today.

C. W. Ferguson, director of rail transportation for the Oregon PUC, has been ordered to attend the October hearing.

"Recent drastic rail rate reductions on westbound dressed meats in the territory have grossly distorted historical rate relationships between dressed meat and livestock in such a fashion as to create the destruction of the West Coast packing house industry," Morgan said.

Korea Encephalitis Epidemic Spreads

Seoul - (UPI) - An encephalitis epidemic that has blanketed most of the southern provinces of Korea swept toward Seoul today. The number of cases reported pushed past the 1,000 mark.

The Ministry of Health said the death toll from the dread brain disease was 160 and was continuing to rise rapidly.

The U.S. Army warned all soldiers to take extra precaution against mosquitoes which carry the disease, and restricted the wearing of short-sleeved shirts at night.

Crash Survivors Still Hospitalized

Portland - (UPI) - Two survivors of a two-car collision which killed six persons near Troutdale early Sunday remained hospitalized here today.

Mrs. Irene Nelson, 46, Dallas, Tex., was in serious condition and James Harold White, 17, Yakima, Wash., was in fair condition. They were each thrown from cars involved in the two-car crash. "Knight On White Charger"

Burglaries in Area Being Investigated

Jackson county sheriff's officers today are investigating the burglary this morning of the Oregon State Motor association building.

Chief Criminal Deputy Joe Walsh said thieves broke in through a rear window of the building at 2360 South Pacific highway and took an estimated \$33.34 in cash from a file cabinet and \$3 in stamps.

Thieves also broke into the John S. Weisbrad realty office in the same building, forced open a file cabinet and took an electric hot plate.

Mrs. John G. Winters, Medford, reported to sheriff's deputies today that someone broke into a cabin owned by the Winters near Butte Falls and took articles valued at \$300. The burglary occurred some time between Aug. 19 and Aug. 22, she said.

Sacramento Man Appears in Court
