Roseburg Doctor Survives Crash

Rupert, Idaho—UPI— A Roseburg, Ore., doctor yesterday had only minor head lacerations to show after washing out the landing gear of his plane when he was forced to crash-land in a field near here Friday.

Dr. Leland F. Van Allen, 45, was flying a four-place Navion from Ryan, Mont., to his home in Roseburg, when the fuel line became clogged.

He set the plane down in a field nine miles east and a half mile south of Rupert, hitting a dike in the field and ripping off the landing gear.

Dr. Van Allen managed to walk away from the wrecked craft.
