Fruit Picker Held On Slaying Charge

Hood River - (UPI) - A 48-year-old Arkansas fruit picker was being held in the Hood River county jail on a murder charge following a slaying of another worker Sunday night.

The suspect, Enos Chaudoin, Jonesboro, Ark., has been staying at the Bill Vollmer ranch at Barksdale.

The victim, Bror Linus Karlson, 54, listed his home as Portland.

Sheriff R. L. Gillmouthe said the shooting occurred in front of Chaudoin's cabin on the Vollmer ranch. Chaudoin said he offered Karlson a drink after Karlson and two companions followed Chaudoin to the cabin after apparently recognizing him on the street in Parksdale.

Chaudoin is alleged to have fired point blank with a .22 caliber revolver while Karlson drank from a bottle of wine. Karlson was struck in the chest and arm and died soon after.

State Institutions To Receive Share Of Education Money

Washington—Over \$1.5 million annually has been authorized in federal aid for Oregon institutions of higher education under the newly enacted national defense education act, the administration informed the office of Rep. Edith Green (D-Ore.).

Just when funds will become available on this scale has yet to be determined, for Congress passed the education bill in the closing days of the session without appropriating enough fully to implement the program. It did appropriate \$40 million to allow state education institutions "to start tooling up" between now and when Congress returns next winter.

Another large aspect of the education program is for aid in purchasing equipment used in teaching science, mathematics or foreign languages. Oregon will be entitled to \$634,370 a year for four years, Mrs. Green was advised. Under the initial allocation, however, Oregon's share will run \$172,186 until Congress appropriates more money.

Dependent on Congress
Other aspects of this same program for strengthening education in these three fields will result in authorizations for Oregon totaling about \$82,000 a year.

Under the vocational education program, Oregon will get \$153,405 yearly. And under the counseling, testing and vocational guidance program, Oregon will be entitled to \$152,000.

All of these amounts are dependent on annual appropriations from Congress, which might not in some years measure up to the full authorizations in the new act, especially if an economy wave puts the lawmakers into a mood to cut and trim the federal budget.

But in any event, a program of general federal aid to higher education is now in the works for the first time—and Oregon institutions will be able to take advantage of it, for the benefit of their students, within a few months.

They were driven by Joseph Smith, 33, of 806 Hueners lane, Jacksonville, Tommie Putnam, 19, Grants Pass, and William Henry Buchanan, 28, of 116 Oak st., Medford, police said. No serious injuries were reported.

Dead was Ronald James Hardin, 16, North Plains. He was killed outright Sunday afternoon when the car he was driving apparently went out of control and hit a stump about one mile north of Hillsboro on Glencoe Road. Two others were injured in the one-car crash.

On the Fourth of July, the last long holiday week end, Oregon recorded only one death to be listed among the safest states for traffic.
