Atlantic City, N. J. — (UPI) — Miss Florida started an avalanche of gifts pouring down on the Miss America contestants today by presenting Miss California with a potted palm tree.

Miss California responded by giving all 51 of her fellow contenders for the 1959 Miss America title scarf clips in the shape of a mission bell, to remind them all that she hails from Riverside, home of one of the famous early Spanish-American missions.

Burst of Generosity
This exchange, between Sandra Lee Jennings of the Golden West, and Dianne Marie Tauscher, of the sunny South, at the six-day Miss America Pageant set off a burst of generosity among the girls to see which could make the beauty meet seem more like a birthday party than an all-out contest for the nation's most coveted beauty crown.

The winner will be chosen Saturday night. She will receive \$15,000 worth of prizes, a \$10,000 scholarship and year-long employment as Miss America that is sure to bring her at least \$50,000.

It has become a custom for Miss America contestants to exchange souvenirs of their home states.

Fall Temperatures Noted in Oregon

Summer isn't over yet but the weather picture in Oregon today looked more like fall.

The weather bureau reported a below-freezing reading at Bend of 30 degrees this morning and said a storm was expected to bring rain to the Northwest Wednesday.

Temperatures were chilly throughout the state. Redmond had a reading of 33 and Portland 49. At Toledo in western Washington the mercury dropped to 38.

Rain was expected on the coast by noon Wednesday and in the interior of western Oregon in the afternoon.

Eastern Oregon still reported range and grass fires during the Labor Day week end.

One blaze covered about 1500 acres east of Haines and another covered about 320 acres in the Richland area about 40 miles east of Baker.

Air Academy Classes Start

Colorado Springs, Colo. — (UPI) — Classes began today for 1,145 cadets at the U. S. Air Force Academy's \$135 million modernistic new campus north of this mountain-flanked Colorado city.

The cadet wing moved in over the Labor Day week end from the academy's temporary location at Lowry Air Force base near Denver, 70 miles to the north.

A formal review Monday officially inaugurated the new campus in the shadow of the Rocky Mountains and famed Pike's Peak.

The cadets, dressed in summer white with gold sashes and carrying swords, heard the academy superintendent, Maj. Gen. James E. Briggs, read a congratulatory letter from President Eisenhower.

Other messages came from acting Defense Secretary Donald A. Quarles, Air Force Secretary James H. Douglas, and Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Thomas H. White.

Twelve cadets collapsed in ranks because of the 85 degree heat. One of them fainted three times but all revived in time to participate in the final review.

Canyonville Crash Leaves Two Dead

Canyonville, Ore. — (UPI) — A Seattle man and a California man were killed in a three-car smashup on Highway 99 Freeway three miles south of here about 6:40 a.m. today and the brother of one of the dead men was hospitalized with serious injuries.

Dead were Chester Grywczynski, 26, of Seattle, and James Olin Martin, 19, Shafter, Calif. Grywczynski's brother, William, 21, was hospitalized here with shock, a broken ankle and other undetermined injuries.

Deputy Coroner Robert Ganz speculated that the older Grywczynski, driver of a northbound car, fell asleep at the wheel. His car swerved the fender of a car driven by Paul Coleman of Crescent City, Calif., who was unhurt in the mishap. The Seattle car then swerved into the Martin car.

No Fatalities on Washington Roads

Seattle — (UPI) — Washington state finished the long Labor Day week end without a single traffic fatality, the State Patrol reported today.

It had been predicted nine persons would be killed in holiday accidents on the state's highways.

Despite the spotless highway mark, at least eight persons met death in other accidents.

Six persons drowned and another was killed in a water skiing accident. A Spokane man died in a fire Saturday.

Legion Delegates Tackle Business Following Parade

Chicago — (UPI) — The 3,055 delegates to the 40th annual convention of the American Legion settled down to business today following a Labor Day parade.

High on the agenda for today's opening session was an address by UN Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge.

National Commander John S. Gleason Jr., took the salute from an estimated 50,000 Legionnaires and members of the armed forces Monday in a parade which lasted more than 10 hours.

Hot Issues on Tap

Two of the hottest issues facing delegates today as the business sessions begin were the matter of racial integration and proposed cuts in the strength of the National Guard.

The National Guard association has asked the help of the Legion in fighting a proposed cut in the size of the guard from 400,000 to 360,000.

Three resolutions are up for consideration on the integration question. Gov. Orval Faubus of Arkansas slipped into Chicago to confer with Legionnaires from his state on the problem, then returned to Little Rock.

After he departed a delegation spokesman said the governor "did not want to be a party to anything that might bring segregation into the Legion."

Strong Proposal

Among the resolutions on the matter was a strongly worded proposal presented by Ernest A. Rowton of Florida which called for action to prevent "further usurpation of power" by the Supreme Court.

The delegates were to hear an address by James Lucas of Scripps-Howard newspapers. Lucas, in his prepared text, analyzed the cold war situation and urged that the U. S. make it clear to the Chinese Communists that if an attack is made on Quemoy and Matsu we would be completely committed and there would be "no privileged sanctuary" as there was in Korea.

22 Disease Cases Reported Last Week

A total of 22 cases of communicable diseases were reported to the Jackson County health department during the week ending Aug. 29, according to Dr. E. Erin Merkel, public health physician.

Five cases of whooping cough were reported, three in Ashland and two in Medford. Three strep throat cases were reported in Medford.

Other diseases reported included chicken pox, Camp White and Medford; one each: pneumonia, Medford one; trench mouth, Ashland one; German measles, Medford four; measles, Medford one; mumps, Medford two; Ashland one; influenza, Medford one; and infectious mononucleosis, Ashland one.
