

Forest Grovers Defeated Despite Strikeout Record

Stratford, Conn. —UPI— Despite a record strikeout performance by Louise Mazzuca, the Forest Grove, Ore., entry lost a 4-0, 16-inning decision to defending champion Fresno Rockets in the women's world softball tournament on Tuesday night.

Miss Mazzuca fanned 26 batters over the route and gave up 10 hits. Forest Grove got only four hits off Ginny Busick.

Stratford, Conn. —UPI— The host Stratford team will play Orange, Calif., tonight for the right to face defending champion Fresno, Calif., in the final of the Women's World Softball Tournament.

Fresno reached the title round again Tuesday night by outlasting Forest Grove, Ore., 4-0, in a 16-inning, 3½-hour struggle.

Marion Fox of the Toronto, Ont. team provided just as much excitement in the losers' bracket when she turned in her second no-hit, no-run performance of the tournament. Pitching against Atlanta, Ga., Miss Fox allowed only two players to reach base and struck out 12 as Toronto gained a 5-0 decision.

The defeat eliminated Atlanta from the tournament. Other teams eliminated were Quincy, Mass., and St. Louis, Mo. Lancaster, Pa., downed Quincy, 1-0, behind the one-hit pitching of Dolores Siegfried while Detroit knocked off St. Louis, 4-0.

AIR SERVICE RESUMED

Tony Anthony Fights McBride

Syracuse, N. Y. —UPI— Light heavyweight Tony Anthony, aware of the richer gravy served in the heavyweight ranks, steps out of his division tonight when he squares off against Archie McBride in a nationally televised 10-round bout.

Anthony, ranked second in the 175-pound class, has his eye on the unlimited division and its sparsely populated ranks. He hopes to make McBride, a Trenton, N.J., heavyweight, his fifth straight knockout victim of the year.

Since being stopped by Archie Moore in a light-heavyweight title fight last September, the 23-year-old New Yorker has knocked out Yvonne Durelle (7), Artie Miller (6), Orval Pitts (5) and Calvin Brad in the first round. All were light heavyweights.

Drag Strip Not Scene of Accident

Jerry Lausmann, president of the Southern Oregon Fencing association, said today that an accident last Friday on Avenue G, Camp White, occurred on a section of the road which is not used as a drag strip.

The association sponsors drag races on a half-mile section of the road, which is about two miles in length. The accident, in which two Medford teenagers were injured, occurred at the far end of the road.

The association sanctions only the organization's drag races, and at other times, persons traveling on the road are trespassing because it is a private road, he pointed out. Lausmann said many people apparently believe the association uses the entire length of the road.

Ocean Scoured For Survivors Of Plane Crash

Agana, Guam —UPI— U. S. Navy teams scoured the shark-infested waters west of Guam today in a hopeless quest for survivors of a C124 Globemaster that crashed with 19 persons aboard.

Navy authorities said only two bodies had been recovered of the seven crew members and 12 passengers aboard the four-engine Military Air Transport Service (MAT) plane.

No one in authority would say where the passengers boarded. However, it was speculated in the United States that they were on the plane when the flight originated at Canon Air Force Base, N.M., and were flying as support personnel for recent flights of F104s ordered to the Orient as a result of the Formosa crisis.

No Hope for Survivors
Though the search continued, there existed virtually no hope that any of the 19 had survived.

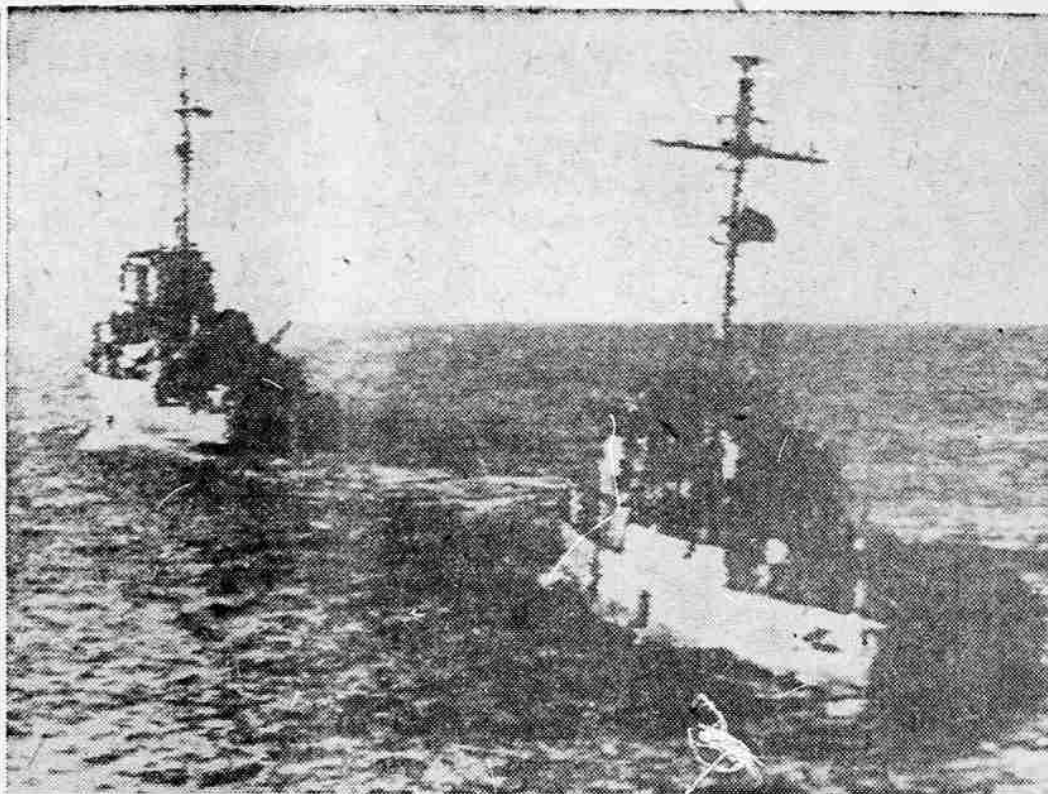
The plane from Travis AFB in California, went down in the ocean 40 miles west of Guam Tuesday after taking off from Agana for Clark AFB in the Philippines.

The U. S. Navy destroyer Bridget arrived here Tuesday night with one body recovered from the scene. A helicopter returned another body.

Lt. Cmdr. James B. Allen of San Diego, Calif., the executive officer aboard the Bridget, said he knew of only two bodies recovered so far. Earlier reports saying three and later seven bodies had been recovered were called erroneous.

Search teams privately believed none of the other persons aboard the plane would be found because of sharks.

TV Quiz Producer Tells of Gambling With Contestant

New York —UPI— The producer of the quiz show "Twenty-one" gambled \$18,500 that contestant Herbert Stempel would come out a winner, they acknowledged today.

The gamble was on advances paid to Stempel while he was still risking his winnings each week against other contestants. It paid off. He wound up winning \$49,500. But Stempel has now charged that the show was "fixed" and that he was forced to lose to Charles Van Doren.

Canceled Checks Shown
The show's producers, Dan Enright and Jack Barry, turned over two canceled checks representing the advances, \$8,500 and \$10,000, to the district attorney's office, which is investigating fix charges against this and other television quiz shows.

Enright said Stempel told him he needed money and would have to quit the show if he didn't get it.

"I gave it to him without questioning him, because at that point the show needed him," Enright said. "He was the first contestant who had remained on for a number of weeks in a row. He was establishing an identity for the show and we couldn't afford to lose him."

Portland Declared Becoming Ugly City

Portland —UPI— Portland, once a beautiful city, is getting uglier all the time.

That was the gist of remarks made to the Rotary club Tuesday by Lewis P. Crutcher, professor of architecture at the University of Oregon.

Crutcher said billboards were blocking views, parking lots were located where parks should be, automobiles were driving out the people, and sidewalks were cluttered with unsightly news and magazine stands and wares of merchants.

He said the situation was not hopeless and that trees could help restore the beauty here.

Buenos Aires —UPI— Lady Beecham, wife of conductor Sir Thomas Beecham, died Tuesday of a heart attack. She was 50.

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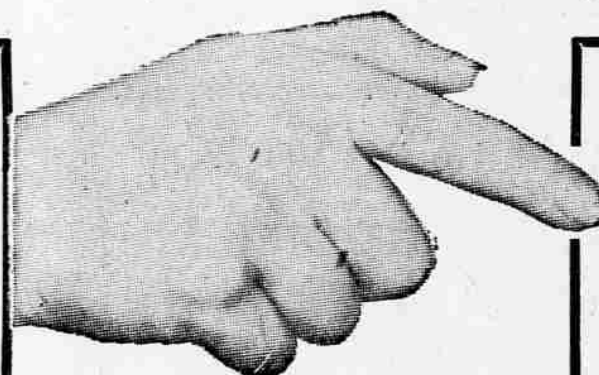
