Corrupt Charges Levelled at Hearing

The agreement between the district and Copco reportedly involves Copco's use of a large percentage of the district's water for a power station on the main ditch.

Once through the power station the water can be used for irrigation. But this arbitrary percentage, it is understood, limits the water which can be used for irrigation above the power station, specifically on the Hammel laterals. Mrs. Todd and her husband, Howard, own land served by the lateral.

Pays District
Copco pays the district for maintenance and improvement of the main ditch bringing water to the power station, it is reported. But, the Todds charge, the district receives no compensation for use of the water itself, which they say is denied by terms of the agreement to water-users above the Copco station.

Mrs. Todd said after yesterday's meeting that she began her investigation of the district's records in hopes of settling a dispute with the district over supplying water to their own property. She said her investigations had uncovered inconsistencies and eventually more serious violations in the district's operations.

One of the other charges against Flury, Mrs. Short, and the three directors, J. Harvey Stanley, Clarence J. Greb and Elbert M. Bigham, was that the board met for "specially adjourned" meetings of which the public was not notified. She asked that the district office post notice for all such meetings on a bulletin board.

Exempted From Penalty
She stated that some water-users were exempted from the 8 per cent penalty for unpaid assessments, and listed Greb, Flury and Mrs. Short as being among them.

She asked to know why the contract for constructing the district's present quarters at 117 West Main st., Eagle Point, was awarded in 1956 to the higher of two bidders, especially since no adequate plans and specifications were provided.

The district floated a bond issue in 1935 in order to pay back a loan from the Reconstruction Finance corporation. Mrs. Todd demanded to know what right the district had to levy high assessments on water-users in order to amortize the bonds years ahead of schedule. This, she claimed, was unfair to the water-users and bondholders. She said it was done without public consent.

Flury replied that Copco's financial support was responsible for the bonds having been paid off.

Furnishing Records
Mrs. Todd also charged the district officials with failing to furnish all their records for her inspection, and charged Mrs. Short specifically with operating as a notary public and as a laundry agent for her personal gain at the district office during office hours.

Mrs. Short dumped the contents of a baking powder can, including a dollar bill and a handful of change, on the table in front of the meeting and said this was her total revenue this year as a notary.

The meeting officially adjourned about 5:15 p.m. But about half an hour later, the district officials reconvened in order to pass the annual budget.

Mrs. Todd said afterward that she had furnished a set of her charges to the Jackson County district attorney, in hopes of a grand jury investigation, and that she planned to seek a court injunction against extension of the agreement with Copco. She also stated that she planned to run for election to a seat on the board of directors this November, against Greb.

UN Asked To Assure Outer Space Peace
United Nations, N.Y. — (UPI) — The United States formally asked the United Nations today to take the first step to assure peace in outer space.

President Eisenhower, through his envoy to the United Nations, asked the General Assembly to discuss a "program for international cooperation in the field of outer space" during its 13th regular session opening Sept. 16.

Henry Cabot Lodge, U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, had announced the "peace in space" proposal on Eisenhower's behalf at the American Legion national convention in Chicago Tuesday.
