School District Boundary Change

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The Family Council

Editor's note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual report. The Family Council does not give advice; it merely reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Vernon S. — Why must I stick to a bad mistake?
Diane D. — I don't want to break up a home.

Vernon S. — I have been married six years and have a 3-year-old child. Our marriage has been stormy from the beginning and seems to be getting worse all the time. My wife and I are incompatible in every way.

About a year ago I became involved in an affair with a girl in the office where I work. She is everything I want in a wife—pretty, sweet, intelligent and truly sympathetic. I am very serious about wanting to marry her. I am sure that I can get a divorce. To my complete surprise, the minute I mentioned divorce, Diane clammed up and wouldn't have anything more to do with me. I have explained that she wouldn't be responsible for the breakup of my home. That was done years ago. My religion doesn't outlaw divorce. Why must I stick to a bad mistake?

Diane D. — I didn't really understand what I was letting myself in for when I first started going out with Vernon. He is an attractive man and I was flattered by his interest. I mistook this for love.

Well, now that I am confronted by the possibility of marrying him, I just don't know what I really want to do. I certainly don't want to be responsible for breaking up anyone's home. I'm not that kind of girl. In spite of what Vernon says, I feel I would be responsible.

I feel Vernon wants to show me he wasn't trifling with my affections. I realize he is very sincere and wants to do the right thing. I guess I have been foolish, but I feel that I really wasn't cut out for the role of the other woman. I don't see myself going through with this thing.

The Council: Both Vernon and Diane are quite dishonest with themselves about their motives, and have gotten themselves into a tangle of deceit.

As we see it, Vernon is essentially interested in getting out of his marriage and was trying to use Diane as a steppingstone. If he sincerely loved her, he would not have involved himself in an affair with her. He would have taken steps to extricate himself from his marriage and asked Diane to marry him when he became free.

If he had done this Vernon would have gotten a yes or no answer and would not have

been left in his present quandary. He had expected to get out of his marriage on the strength of his involvement with Diane, but now he is left nowhere because he has made no real decision about his marriage unrelated to Diane.

As for Diane, we are most distrustful of her protestations of refusal to be "the other woman" or to break up a home. It is quite unlikely that a girl who so involves

herself in an affair with a married man is deeply concerned about such niceties. We doubt very much whether she ever sincerely believed she was in love.

This has been a very shabby relationship and Vernon and Diane ought to face it. They have tried to use one another toward selfish ends and both probably have a bad after-taste. Vernon should try to come

to terms with his marriage. If he finds he can't, after an honest effort, he should take on the responsibility for extricating himself. He should not try to use some woman for that end.
