In election years a lot of us are inclined to make cynical cracks about the congress of the United States. I think this is a good time to point out that here in Southern Oregon and Far Northern California we have no reason to throw bricks at the congress that has just adjourned. It enacted into law two measures that are of IMMENSE importance to our future.

One of them is the Oregon-California Klamath River compact. The other is S 3051—the amendment to the Klamath reservation termination law. The first reserves for use within its own two-state watershed the waters of the Klamath river. The second provides for a fair return for the Klamath Indians from their property and for continued sustained yield use of the Klamath forests.

HERE are the basic essentials for growth and development:

1. Water — without which all other resources are valueless.
2. Ample raw materials for manufactured products that are in demand.
3. Power.
4. Markets for the products to be produced.

IN OUR mythical State of Jefferson, we have these essentials in abundance.

We have more stored water than any other region between the Columbia river and Hoover dam.

Our vast forests, now coming increasingly under sustained yield management, which means keeping trees growing as fast as trees are cut, will provide the raw material for lumber and pulp and paper products.

Power, in volume to meet our needs, will be produced from our water after it has been used for agriculture and industry.

Markets for our products will be provided by the rapidly growing population of the 11 Western states.

We have WHAT IT TAKES to grow.

SO MUCH for what we have now.

There is a PLUS ingredient in our future. This plus ingredient is WOOD CHEMISTRY.

BY MEANS of wood chemistry, we will derive a wide range of useful products from the WASTE of plants making products out of wood fiber. Hitherto, these wastes have been costly nuisances. They have had to be DISPOSED OF in some manner or other. Otherwise, they will pollute the waters of our streams. The methods of disposing of them in use up to now have been expensive.

By the miracle of wood chemistry, these wastes will be converted into useful products. Their conversion will bring to our area a NEW INDUSTRY—the chemical industry. Petroleum chemistry is already one of the nation's leading industries. Competent authorities assure us that in time wood chemistry will equal petroleum chemistry.

THERE is this important difference:

The supply of petroleum can be exhausted. When the petroleum is all pumped out of the earth, there won't be any more. If we keep enough trees growing, the supply of wood—which is the basic raw material of wood chemistry—will NEVER be exhausted. Three grow out of the soil. They are a CROP.

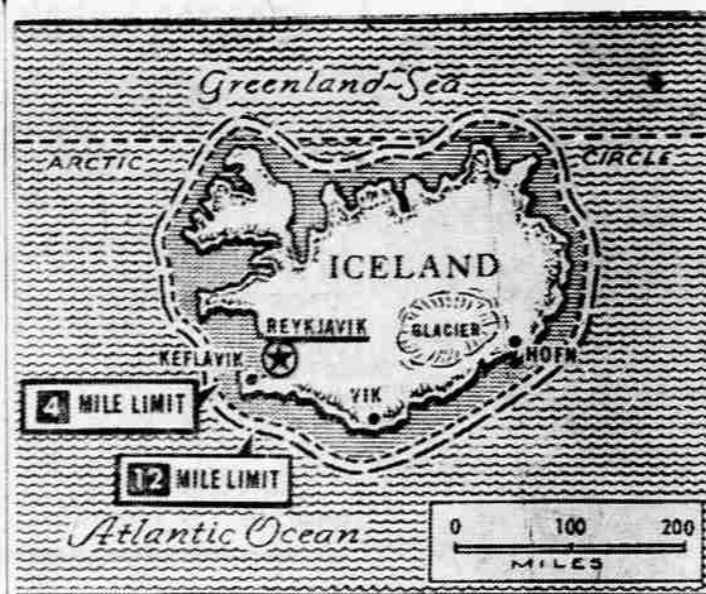
KEEP your eye on Southern Oregon and Far Northern California.

Skipper Escapes Explosion on Boat

Bellingham, Wash. — (UPI)—An explosion of undetermined origin blew up and sank the Marietta gillnet boat Survivor Tuesday morning off Lummi Island, but the impact blew the boat's skipper, Archie Jorgensen, into the water where he was rescued.

Jorgensen said he was fishing off the west side of Lummi Island at the time of the mishap.

Jorgensen, 19, was pulled from the water by a Bellingham vessel, the Johanna S. Other vessels, including a Coast Guard cutter, came to assist.

Mickey Hargitays Former Wife Asks For Child Support

Los Angeles — (UPI)—Muscleman Mickey Hargitay's former wife says he left her for Jayne Mansfield because the blonde actress promised to help his career in show business.

Mrs. Mary Hargitay, 29, testified Tuesday in Superior Court where she brought an action for \$415 monthly support payments to her 9-year-old daughter, Tina.

She said Hargitay, former Mr. Universe, told her his first love was show business and that Miss Mansfield had promised to promote his career.

Agrees to Divorce

Mrs. Hargitay said she agreed to a quiet divorce two years ago in Indianapolis when Hargitay promised he would support their daughter. She claimed her muscular former husband paid nothing toward his child's support in 1956.

She said Hargitay had paid from \$200 to \$250 monthly since January, 1957, but she felt that he was capable of supporting Tina in a better style.

Bench Warrants Refused

Miss Mansfield and Hargitay were not at the morning session. Their attorney, David Lipsky, said the actress was expecting a child and was not feeling well.

Attorney Max E. Gilmore, representing Mrs. Hargitay, said "that's too bad" and moved that bench warrants be issued for the arrest of the couple.

Judge Elmer Doyle refused to issue the warrants but asked Lipsky to have the couple in court late in the afternoon to hear a ruling continuing the case until Sept. 17.

They appeared as requested.

OSC Scientist Gets Cancer Work Grant

Corvallis — (UPI)—Dr. Robert W. Newburgh of the Oregon State College Science Research Institute has been granted a \$30,000 scholar award from the American Cancer society for a three-year program of research on biochemistry of cell growth, the school announced today.

Newburgh is the first Pacific Northwest scientist to receive the Society grant. His research will center around studies of cell metabolism and enzymic processes that occur during growth.

Sleeping Sickness Toll Mounts To 1,500

Tokyo — (UPI)—An epidemic of sleeping sickness claimed more than 100 lives in Japan and South Korea today, bringing the death toll to near 1,500.

Health officials in the two Asian countries said the disease has now stricken more than 6,000 persons, most of them children under 14 years of age.

Washington — (UPI)—A study of the first gorilla ever born in captivity shows that baby gorillas develop about twice as fast as human infants in respect to sitting, toddling, walking and standing.

A report released here on Tuesday by Drs. Hilda Knobloch and Benjamin Pasam-

ances from human development have been present from the beginning, but the similarities are perhaps greater than the differences.

The two scientists said their research has suggested the hypothesis that "the more prolonged the infancy, when one genus is compared to another, the higher the eventual attainment in terms of intellectual functioning."
