

# Drysdale Chalks Up Sixth Straight Win For Dodgers

 Wait 'til next year!  
 That old derisive Brooklyn refrain contains real promise for Los Angeles fans today if you're talking about "home town boy" Don Drysdale. He's a little too late to help the Dodgers much this year but he's proving the pre-season hoopla about his ability was true.

The 22-year-old native of Van Nuys, Calif., was picked to be the National league's No. 1 pitcher of the year. He can't win that honor because of a disastrous start but Tuesday night he fired his sixth straight victory to give the Dodgers a 4-0 win over the San Francisco Giants before a partisan crowd of 22,681 at the Coliseum.

Drysdale's six straight victories equal the highest string by a National league pitcher this year and they have finally squared his record at 11-11. At one time this year he stood 0-5 and at the July All-Star break he was 4-9.

**Giants Tie with Pirates**  
 Drysdale struck out six batters and walked only three as he beat the Giants for the third time this season and knocked them into a second-place tie with the Pittsburgh Pirates, who shaded the Philadelphia Phillies, 3-2, on Friday's 19th victory. The Giants and Pirates are each eight games behind the Milwaukee Braves, idle Tuesday night.

Th St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Cincinnati Reds, 4-2, in the only other National league game.

In the American league the New York Yankees beat the Boston Red Sox, 6-1, and stretched their first-place lead to 12 games over the idle Chicago White Sox. The Washington Senators shaded the Baltimore Orioles, 4-3, and the Detroit Tigers downed the Kansas City Athletics 6-1, in other A.L. activity.

Gil Hodges hit his 20th homer and Gino Cimoli his eighth for the Dodgers who beat the Giants for only the fifth time in 20 tries. Drysdale himself knocked in the final Los Angeles run. It was the 10th straight year in which Hodges hit at least 20 homers.

Fried pitched a seven-inning and struck out seven as he raised his season record to 19-13. He is bidding to become the first Pirate 20-game winner since 1950 and the club's biggest winner since Burrell Grimes won 25 games in 1928. Bill Virdon and Frank Thomas hit homers to highlight the Pirates' six-hit attack on Don Cardwell and Jim Hearn.

Bob Mabe posted his first major league victory for the Cardinals with a neat seven-inning performance. Five St. Louis players, including Stan Musial and Joe Cunningham, had two hits each to help hand 15-game winner Bob Purkey his ninth defeat.

**Mantle Has No. 38**  
 Rookie Zach Monroe pitched a five-hitter for the Yankees and had a shutout until Dick Gernert homered with two out in the ninth. Dave Sisler, a Yankee nemesis, battled evenly with Monroe until the sixth inning when Mickey Mantle hit his 38th homer and Yogi Berra followed with his 21st.

Washington relief ace Dick Hyde preserved Pedro Ramos' 13th win in the ninth after Albie Pearson gave the Senators the early lead with a three-run inside-the-park homer. The Senators' 55th win of the season equaled their 1957 total.

Herb Moford, 30-year-old curve baller, retired the first 15 batters and went on to down the Athletics on two hits-a double by Harry Chitt in the sixth and Bob Cerv's 30th homer of the year in the seventh. Gail Harris had three hits, including a homer, and Al Kaline also had three hits to pace Detroit's 11-hit attack.

# Home Run Ball Again Helps Phoenix Cause

 The old home run ball which has come to the rescue of the Phoenix Giants more than a dozen times this season helped them cling to their 1 1/2 game margin over San Diego today in the final lap of the Pacific Coast league scramble.

This time it was Tom Haller, the left-handed catcher who came through with a pinch-hit grand slam in the ninth inning Tuesday night to propel the Giants to an 8-7 victory over the Padres.

Homers also figured in the completion of a suspended game where Bill Glynn and Rudy Regalado banged one apiece for the Pads to give them an 8-6 win. This late inning explosion took place to wind up a game which was suspended April 20.

Haller's smash capped a tremendous comeback by Phoenix which was trailing, 7-1, as it entered the seventh inning. Then the Giants began to creep up on Jim Finnigan's second solo homer of the night and a two-run clout by Andre Rodgers who rang his homer total up to 30. This set the stage for Haller's game-winning off loser Dick Brodowski. Joe Margoneri, the fourth Giant hurler to work, got the win.

Pitchers Bill Werle of San Diego and Marion Fricano of Phoenix tangled during the fourth inning and were chased.

In other games, Salt Lake defeated Vancouver, 8-5. Portland drubbed Spokane 6-2 and Sacramento clipped Seattle, 7-6.

Don Urquhart, although belted for 10 hits, went the distance for the Bees to get his 14th victory. Salt Lake worked over four Mountie pitchers for 11 hits, including Jim McDaniel's 31st homer, two triples by Kenny Toothman and doubles by Urquhart and Sam Miley.

Vancouver rallied for three runs in the ninth but they came too late and could not save Russ Heman, who started the game, from defeat.

**DiPietro Homers**  
 John Buzhardt of Portland also was socked for 10 hits but stayed on to win it with the help of Bob DiPietro's big bat. "Dee" smashed a homer in the fourth to tie the score, 1-1, which set things up for a four-run spurge in the next frame and dropped Hiel Patrick to his second loss.

Sacramento was trailing, 4-3, when the ninth opened then racked up four more runs of its own to squeak by Triples by Carlos Paula and Clem Moore highlighted the attack with Bob Roselli, Kal Segrist, and winning pitcher Joe Stanka coming through with clutch singles.

Seattle picked up two more runs in the ninth but John Kume took over for Stanka to save the 10th win for him. Max Surkong was charged with his 13th defeat.

# Clem Sets Arlington Track Mark

 Clem cracked a 26-year-old track record and Round Table pulled within \$50,000 of Nashua's all-time record for thoroughbred earnings in Monday's richest horse race.

Clem, carrying only 110 pounds, defeated Round Table by 3/4 lengths in the \$139,650 Washington park handicap at Arlington park. Clem's 1:34 clocking clipped two-fifths of a second off the track record for a mile set by Equivoque 26 years ago under 128 pounds.

Round Table, carrying top weight of 131, stumbled coming out of the gate but made a gallant stretch bid under Willie Shoemaker to take the \$25,000 second money. Round Table now has won \$1,240,114 for the Kerr Stable and is only \$48,451 behind Nashua's record \$1,288,565.

Clem paid \$21.80, 8.40 and \$5.00, for his first 1958 stake triumph. Nadir lost second money to Round Table in a photo finish.

**Guides Warhead**  
 Eddie Erarco guided Warhead, a 6-1 shot, to a five-length triumph in Belmont's \$30,250 Jerome Handicap. Piano Jim was second and Jester third. The winner finished the mile event in 1:37-1/5 and paid \$14.00.

Munch, a filly owned by the Tartan Stable, rallied to win the \$61,150 Atlantic City handicap by four lengths and provide jockey Howard Grant with his fourth victory of the day. Hillsdale was second and Lil Fella third in the mile-and-three-sixteenths turf event. The winner was clocked in 1:57 and paid \$17.80.

Bumpy Road, the bay gelding who set a six-furlong Rockingham Park track record of 1:09 recently won Monday's \$10,000 handicap at the New Hampshire course with a 1:10 clocking for the same distance.

The winter season would start Oct. 15 and Dec. 25, it was indicated.

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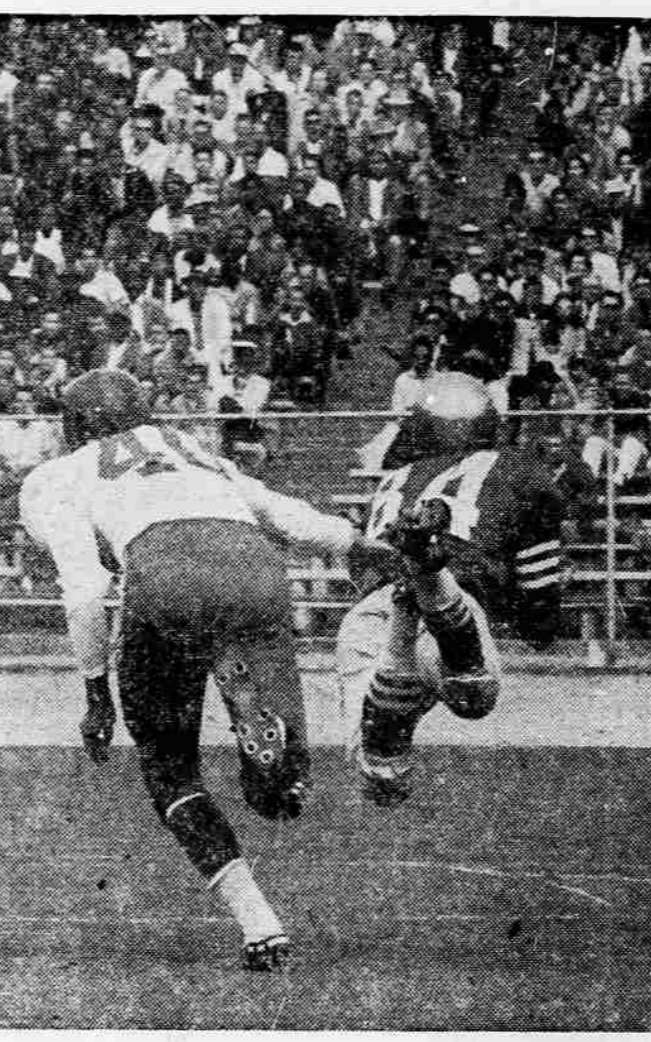
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**IMPRESSARIO BEST DOG IN SHOW HERE**
