

Porter Supports Proposed Freight Rate Reductions

Eugene — Congressman Charles O. Porter this week said he supports the proposed Southern Pacific freight rate reductions from Oregon to California and Arizona points.

But in doing so he rejected as improper suggestions from his critics (including his Republican opponent in the November election, Paul Geddes of Roseburg) that he should have taken a more active role in current proceedings.

"The decision isn't mine to make," Porter said in a statement prepared at the suggestion of an Oregon editor. "I have pressed the Interstate Commerce commission for an early decision, but I have made no presentation to them, for they have ready access to the facts necessary for their decision."

Congressional Pressure

"Moreover, I do not approve of congressional or White House pressure on a quasi-judicial body in connection with a case to be decided on its merits, and where there is no question of the propriety of the procedure," Porter added.

As far as the proposed rate reduction itself is concerned, Porter said, "In my opinion (it) should be approved. Of course," he added, "I regret the effect on the burgeoning barge traffic from our coastal ports, but it seems clear the economic benefits to southwestern Oregon are far greater than the losses. It is my hope that further harbor improvements and a revived lumber market will compensate barge shippers and permit further expansion. Certainly I shall continue my efforts to make Oregon a maritime state."

In conclusion, Porter outlined where he felt he could be of help, as a member of congress, if the occasion arose, when he said, "If any constituent of mine has reason to believe that the ICC procedures are not proper, or that I can help present necessary evidence, or that existing law needs repeal or revision, then I shall be very glad to hear from him. No one has yet made such allegations to me."

OTI To Admit All Applicants

Salem — (UPI) — Any student who can meet admission requirements must be allowed to enroll at Oregon Technical Institute, State Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton said Wednesday.

The state legislature previously had set a 1,000-student maximum for the institution located near Klamath Falls.

OTI Director Winston Purvine said that 1193 applications for admission have been received by OTI from persons who meet academic and other personal requirements for admission.

The concluding paragraph of the opinion reads "... the important fact is that there is no statute which, either expressly or by implication, authorizes the rejection of applicants for admission to Oregon Technical Institute who are otherwise qualified merely because a certain quota or limitation has purportedly been reached."

The State Board of Education, which is holding a four-day session here, authorized Purvine to accept all qualified applicants in light of the opinion. Purvine also was authorized to hire whatever staff the current budget will allow to meet the need.

Purvine said that he thought one additional mathematics-English instructor could serve the expected influx of students.

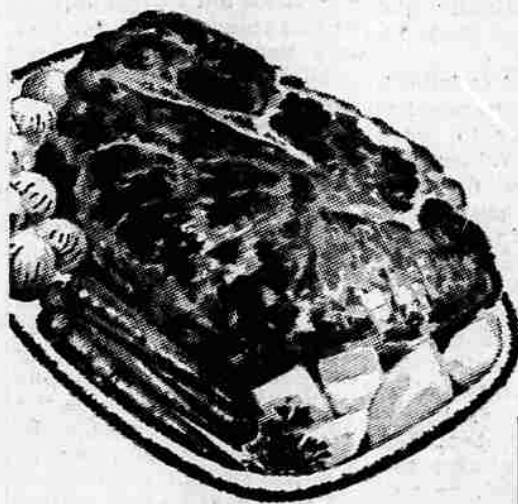
