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French Police, Communists Tangle As Crowds Await De Gaulle Speech

Paris — (UPI) — Fighting between Communists and police broke out in the Place de la Republique tonight just before Gen. Charles de Gaulle was to present his new constitution to the people of France.

De Gaulle was scheduled to make a major speech explaining the outlines of the new constitution he will set before the nation in a referendum

Sept. 28. Just 30 minutes before he was to arrive at the Place de la Republique, located in the slum area of eastern Paris, a crowd of 10,000 left-wingers began converging on the northern end of the historic giant square.

They were chanting anti-De Gaulle slogans. Some of the nearly 10,000 riot police in the area promptly

moved into action against them.

Police Charge Crowd

As the riot police charged into the crowd, the noise of the uproar completely drowned out a speech being made by Andre Malraux, one of De Gaulle's top ministers and one of France's most famous authors.

On one street leading into the square, Communists were carrying yellow banners. Police tore them down.

The crowds jamming the streets turned them into a rolling human sea.

Most had come to hear De Gaulle tell how he hoped to get public approval for a new deal for France. Others — mostly Communists and other left-wingers — were there to cause trouble.

Demonstrators Scattered

A giant crowd of Communists and left-wingers converged on the Rue Turbigo leading into the northern end of the square. As they neared the square itself, they suddenly flashed yellow cards saying "no" to De Gaulle. Then they threw them on the street and charged.

The first thin line of police broke apart under the onslaught.

But in back of them were groups of steel-helmeted Republican Security Guards, some of the toughest riot police in Western Europe. The guards charged into the leftists and the fighting broke out in earnest.

Then motorcycle policemen drove into the crowd and scattered them for the time being.

The Communist demonstration had been anticipated. De Gaulle hopes to win approval for his new constitution which will give France a strong government. But the Communists are opposing him. And today they had called on Parisians to turn out and give him a thundering "no."

Republic Anniversary

Today was the 88th anniversary of the proclamation of the Third Republic following the collapse of Napoleon III in 1870. De Gaulle chose the date to show he wanted to safeguard rather than destroy the republican regime in France.

The cabinet gave final approval to the constitution Wednesday after almost three months of work. It drastically increases the power of the

executive branch of government and decreases the power of the National Assembly.

The new constitution will go before the public on Sept. 28 when a national referendum will adopt it or reject it. De Gaulle was considered certain to win approval and was generally expected to be elected the first president.

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Oklahoma Court Upholds Television Of Courtroom Action

Oklahoma City — (UPI) — The Oklahoma Court of Criminal Appeals has upheld television coverage of courtroom proceedings.

In an opinion Wednesday, the court upheld the 15-year burglary sentence of Edward Lee Lyles, 27, who claimed television cameras in the courtroom prevented him from having a fair trial.

Television pictures were taken in the courtroom before the jury was selected, although some members of the panel were in the room during the recess in which the films were shot.

Rights Said Violated Lyles contended the pictures violated his constitutional rights as well as Rule 35 of the American Bar Association's canons of ethics.

But the high court, in an opinion by President Justice John A. Brett, said the canons were only a set of principles subject to modification to meet the condition of changing times and had no force of law.

"A trial is a public event," the opinion said. "And what transpires in the courtroom is public property. Those who see and hear what transpired can report it with impunity. There is no special prerequisite of the judiciary which enables it, as distinguished

Girl Survives Heart Surgery

Portland — (UPI) — Thanks to science, a mechanical monster and a team of skilled doctors, a seven-year-old girl today can look forward to a normal life.

The doctors performed a delicate, difficult open-heart operation on the girl Wednesday morning in the University of Oregon Medical school hospital in order to correct a hole that had been in her heart since birth.

During the operation, which was witnessed by newsmen, photographers and television cameramen, the girl's heart was stopped for five and one-half minutes as the surgeons opened the heart and sewed up the hole between the two main pumping chambers of the girl's heart.

A disc oxygenator heart-lung machine took over the job of supplying her body with blood and oxygen during the operation.

Doctors said the girl was doomed to an early death and childhood as an invalid because of the leaking heart. Now after a few days on the critical list the girls faces a new normal life, doctors announced.

The operation was the 15th the hospital has performed to correct heart defects which could not be touched unless the heart could be stopped.

Britain Ponders Placing Limits On Immigration

London — (UPI) — The British government today considered limiting immigration of colored persons in a move to end further race riots.

The riot-torn Notting Hill district was quiet Wednesday night but police arrested 19 men in the northwest London district of Marylebone, charging them with fighting, obstruction and failing to heed orders to move on.

Hints at Change

Prime Minister Harold Macmillan strongly hinted Wednesday night Britain's open-door policy permitting unrestricted immigration of colored persons from other Commonwealth nations and colonies would be changed.

"The government has for some time been examining the results of this country's time-honored practice to allow free entry of immigrants from Commonwealth and colonial countries," a statement from 10 Downing st. said.

"This study of policy and its effects on employment will continue. Her majesty's government does not think it right to take long range decisions except after careful consideration of the problem as a whole."

Rain, Dogs Credited Rain and a strong force of police and police dogs were credited with staving off new clashes between whites and negroes in the Notting Hill district.

The area had been the scene of fights and stabbings for four straight nights because of racial pressures resulting from competition for housing and jobs. The district is heavily populated by non-whites, many of them new arrivals from Britain's colonial areas.
