

Hammar skjold, Nasser Discuss Mideast Tension

Cairo — (UPI) — United Nations Secretary General Dag Hammar skjold and President Gamal Abdel Nasser of the United Arab Republic discussed Middle East tensions in a 4½-hour session ending at 1 a.m. today.

Previously Hammar skjold had met for 8½ hours with U.A.R. Foreign Minister Mahmoud Fawzi in an attempt to reach agreement on the role the United Nations should play in helping to oversee peace in the Middle East.

First Meeting
Thursday night's meeting of Hammar skjold and Nasser was their first since the U.N. diplomat arrived here early this week. There was no word on a further meeting.

Hammar skjold's specific task is to get the U.A.R. and Jordan to come to terms so British forces can be drawn from the desert kingdom. He also hopes to work out arrangements whereby American troops can leave Lebanon.

The Arab-sponsored resolution in the United Nations seemed to point the way to the easing of Middle East tension, but since then Cairo and Damascus radio attacks on Jordan and King Hussein have continued and tension has not lessened as much as hoped.

Two Questioned In Knife Deaths

New York — (UPI) — Two men were held for questioning today in the knife slayings of Dr. Melvin Nimer and his wife, Lore Jean, in their home early Tuesday.

The men were taken into custody in a rooming house where they live five blocks from the Nimer's home on Staten Island near the Public Health Hospital where Nimer worked. They were identified as:

Keith Hitchcock, 27, said to have jumped ball in Brooklyn last January on a charge of assault in the St. George Hotel; and Walter Leroy Nagel, 26.

Police said Nagel had no police record but was unemployed and was booked for vagrancy after detectives indicated they were not satisfied with his account of his activities on the murder night.

The Nimers, originally from Utah, came here in July with their three children, Melvin Jr., 8, Gregory, 2, and Jennifer, 5 months.

The parents were awakened early Tuesday by the screams of young Melvin, who had awakened to find a white-masked intruder attempting to choke him. First Mrs. Nimer and then her husband went to Melvin's aid. They were viciously slashed in hand to hand fights with the intruder. Both died shortly afterwards.

Two Escape Cavein of Ditch

Portland — (UPI) — Two workmen were injured, one seriously, Thursday when a six-foot-deep trench in which they were laying electrical conduit caved in beneath the new Safeway store being erected in the Lloyds center in Portland.

William E. Anderson, 30, was reported in serious condition at Emanuel hospital suffering from chest injuries.

A fellow worker, Raymond M. Ross, 26, Troutdale, was completely buried by the cave-in. Quick work by other workers uncovered him. Ross also was taken to Emanuel hospital, but was released after treatment.

Another worker, B. E. Jennings, 45, was buried waist-deep by the sandy soil, but suffered no apparent injuries.

Firemen administered oxygen to Anderson during the rescue.

More Than 13,000 Drivers Convicted

Salem — (UPI) — More than 13,000 drivers were convicted of violating traffic laws in Oregon during August, the Department of Motor Vehicles reported today.

License suspensions, based either upon mandatory provisions of the law, court recommendation or discretionary action by the department, totalled 767 for the month.

Some 182 licenses were suspended on the basis of too frequent convictions or accidents — a new record for a single month.

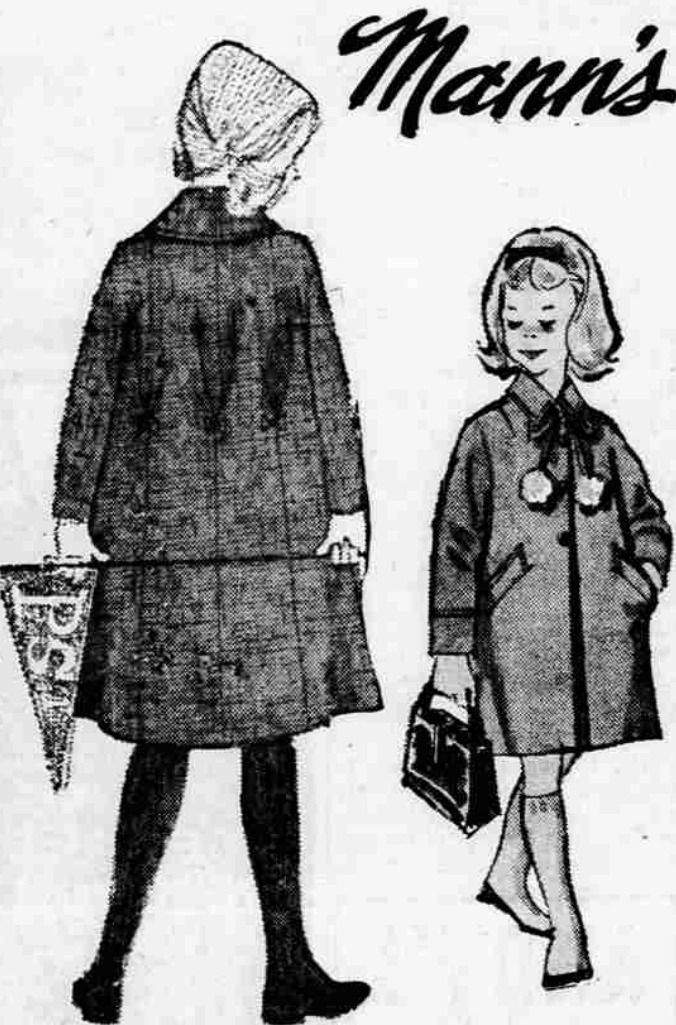
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
