

# Yanks Lose Again; Senators Win 8-3

Roy Sievers' three-run homer led the Washington Senators to an 8-3 victory over the New York Yankees Saturday, the 17th loss in the last 29 starts for the slumping American league leaders.

In the only other day game in the American league, the Kansas City A's beat the Detroit Tigers, 6-2. In night games, Chicago was at Cleveland and Boston at Baltimore.

Sievers' blast, his 36th homer of the year, highlighted a six run rally for the Senators in the sixth inning of their game at Yankee Stadium. Only a ninth-inning triple play by the Yankees kept the Senators from adding to their victory margin. Camilo Pascual was the winner, although he needed relief after

giving up a two-run homer to Bill Skowron in the ninth inning.

At Detroit, three hits by Roger Maris and Hec Lopez led the A's to their win in a game interrupted three times by rain. Bob Grim gained the win with relief after sitting out one of the three rain periods.

# Phoenix Clinches Coast Loop Flag

The Phoenix Giants have finally earned the right to the pennant they have been flying all season.

The Arizonans downed Vancouver 10-8 Friday night to clinch the 1958 Pacific Coast league flag and put an honest claim on the pennant they inherited from the old San Francisco Seals, last year's PCL winners.

When the New York Giants came to San Francisco they bought the Seal franchise from Boston of the American league. This year's Phoenix

Giants—most of whom were at Minneapolis last season—thereby inherited the 1957 flag from the no-longer extant Seals.

The Giants staked Vancouver to an early five-run lead, then roared back with three home runs to nail down the title and move to within four homers of the all-time PCL mark of 204. The power-laden Giants had three games left with Vancouver in which to break that record—all of them at the Phoenix Municipal stadium, where home runs have been cheaper than nickel cigars.

# Medford Gridders Second Full Week; To Play Sept. 12

Medford High school gridders wound up their second full week of practices with a full scale scrimmage yesterday and looked to four more days of preparation for their opening ruckus of the season.

Black Tornado players will be hosts to the North Salem contingent here on Friday night, Sept. 12. The Medfordites will be out to even up for a 7 to 6 loss to the Vikings a year ago.

Head Coach Fred Spiegelberg had little comment after yesterday's Tornado scrimmage, which was a ragged one. But the lack of fitness was tempered somewhat by the fact that players were divided into rather even factions for the drill. And that situation cloaked the potential of the squad.

When North Salem high plays Medford here next Friday, the Vikings will have two gridders who competed against the Black Tornado as Ashland athletes. They are Ron Mickle and Billy Maurer. Ron, a quarterback, was on the Salem squad last year after transferring from Ashland. Maurer, an end, moved to the Capital city after the past school year. The two form a Viking pass combination and both may be in the starting line-up against Medford.

The yellows outpointed the Grays 20 to 18 in the 1 1/2 workout. Fullback Al Funston crossed the goal line twice and Halfback Dick Ragsdale once for the yellows. End Mike Murray made two out of three kick conversion tries. Fullback Skip Bennett tallied all three Gray touchdowns, one on a run from midfield. Despite miscues on the attack and some jolting tackles by defenders, offense, which got a head start in practice sessions, still was ahead of defense. Two pass interceptions were recorded by Halfback Ron Reich.

Spiegelberg reported yesterday that two men have been shifted from the backfield to bolster line positions. Mike Murray, who has been working at fullback after two seasons at tackle, is now at end. Lynn Knight has been switched to a tackle from full.

Squad adjustments, sickness and injuries currently leave three men at the fullback slot, Bennett, a junior, and Al Funston and Bill Charley, a sophomore. Fred Funston, senior quarterback and fullback, has been sidelined temporarily by a virus infection. Danny Sieg, sophomore, has a twisted ankle.

Bob Eckel, a guard, joined the injury list last week when he suffered a blow on the head.

Rangy Althea Gibson, seeking her second consecutive U.S. Wimbledon slam, meanwhile defied a cold and touch of virus to smash her way into today's final in the women's division against chunky Darlene Hard, the hard-hitting little blonde from El Monte, Calif.

Cooper, upset by Anderson in last year's final, reached the final round by stomping Aussie teammate Neale Fraser for the 15th consecutive time, 8-6, 8-6, 6-1. Anderson, the 23-year-old rancher who is battling Cooper for the next big offer to turn pro as well as this silverware pay-

# Powers' Homer Aids Pirates In Beating Braves 7-6

The Pittsburgh Pirates kept the barest flicker of life glowing in the National league pennant race Saturday when they beat the Milwaukee Braves for the second straight time, 7-6, on Johnny Powers' pinch-hit homer in the eighth inning.

The victory at Pittsburgh moved the Pirates into undisputed second place, 7 1/2 games behind the league-leading Braves who have 12 games left to play.

In other National league day games Saturday, the Chicago Cubs followed the pitching of Rookie Johnny Briggs to a 6-3 victory over the San Francisco Giants to drop the Giants to third place, and Bob Purkey's five-hit pitching led the Cincinnati Reds to a 10-2 win over Philadelphia.

Bob Friend, Pittsburgh ace bidding for his 20th victory, was rocked for five of the Braves' six runs, including fifth-inning homers by Johnny Logan and Ed Mathes. Relief pitcher R. G. Smith gained the win by holding the Braves scoreless the rest of the way except for Del Rice's blow tied the score at 6-6 and set the stage for Powers' winning homer.

At Chicago, Rookie Briggs blanked the Giants for eight innings and held them hitless for six. But then he gave up three runs in the ninth on three walks with two out and Willie Kirkland's double. Don Elston relieved to get the last out. A four-run rally in the second inning and Jim Marshall's two-run homer in the seventh accounted for all the Cub scoring.

Purkey's victory at Philadelphia was his 16th and he missed a shutout only when Harry Anderson hit a two-run homer in the third inning. Homers by Frank Robinson and Walt Dropo led the Red Legs' 13th attack as they handed the Phillies their fifth straight loss.
