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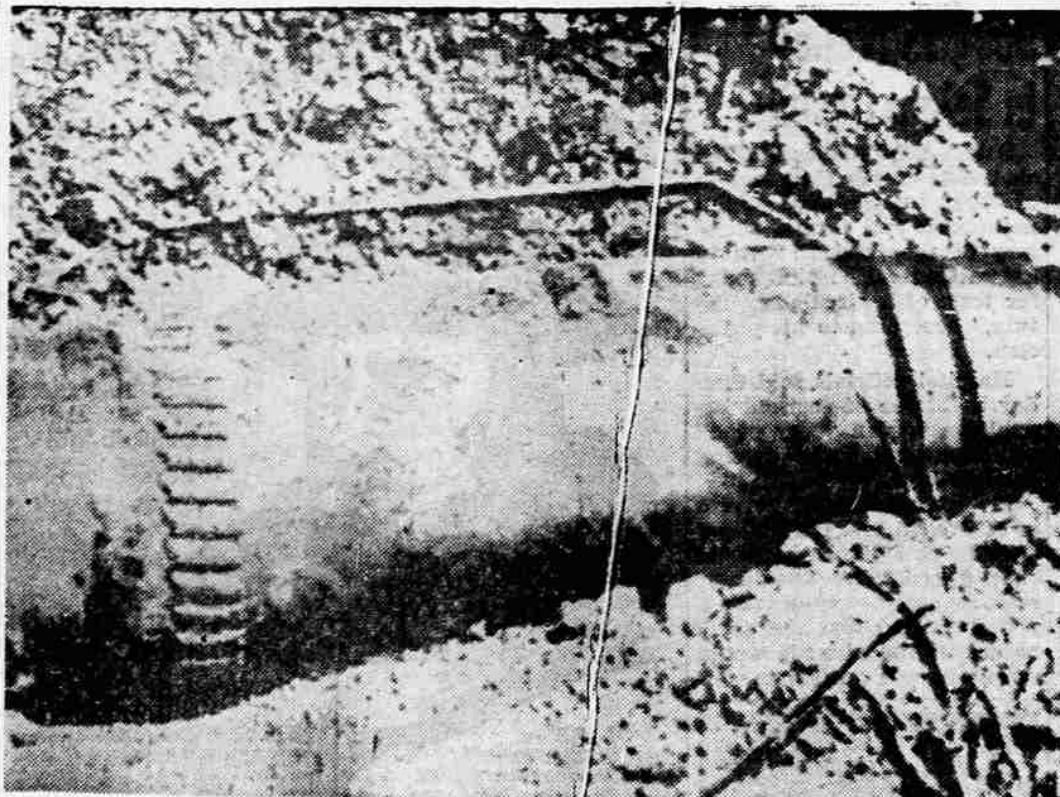

Body of Transient Found in River

Portland—UPI—The body of Robert LeRoy Thompson, 34-year-old transient, was found Sunday floating in the Willamette river near the west end of the Steel bridge here. Police said they believed he was a murder victim.

The body was found by Kermit Smith, a tugboat captain, about 6:15 a.m. The victim had four deep slashes across his forehead and one ear was severed. Detectives said they were exploring a theory that Thompson was a member of a drinking party under the bridge Saturday night and that a fight ensued, resulting in his death.

PT&T Rate Boost Hearings Slated

Some Oregon Log Closures Lifted

Sprinkles of rain fell in western Oregon today and rising humidities prompted the State Forest Department to lift its logging closure restrictions along the coast from Lincoln county south to the California line.

Douglas, Coos and western Lane counties also were opened.

The rest of western Oregon, except for Josephine and Jackson counties, the southern tip of Douglas county and the floor of the Willamette valley, remained closed.

The Dalles had a temperature of 99 Sunday while Astoria on the coast had an unusually high 87. Eugene had 98, Pendleton 96, and Portland, Medford and Roseburg 95.

Crossing Closure Topic of Meeting

A committee report on the proposed closure of the Clark st. railroad crossing is scheduled for the Medford planning commission's meeting at 7:30 p.m. today in the city hall council chamber.

A petition opposing the closure, bearing over 200 signatures, was filed at city hall this morning. Opposition appears to be based on convenience for local residents and for logging trucks. The crossing's use by emergency vehicles and its potential use when and if the Jackson County Housing authority area tract on West Jackson st. becomes a park and recreational area.

American Telephone ran up more than two points on active trading in the communications issues. Eastman Kodak rose more than three points to a new high.
