

# SHERMAN ADAMS SAID THROUGH

## U.S. Charged With 'War Provocation'



Only Formal Resignation Still To Be Arranged  
No Resignation, Hagerty Declares

Washington - (UPI) - An administration figure said today that in his opinion Sherman Adams for practical purposes was through as President Eisenhower's chief assistant and that only a formal resignation remained to be arranged.

Adams was represented by some of his prominent administration and Republican party colleagues as having come to the conclusion that his political effectiveness was seriously impaired by his relations with Bernard Goldfine, particularly as reflected in the dramatic Democratic victory in the Maine elections.

In Newport, R. I., White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty declared that Adams had submitted no resignation "in any shape, form or manner."

On Fishing Trip  
Adams was somewhere in Canada on a fishing trip. He left no forwarding address with the White House. One administration figure said he did not believe Adams would return to work at the White House—at least not longer than to clean up his desk.

"I think the question of a resignation is over and done with," he said. "I don't think he's coming back."

One Republican figure who has had an inside picture of the Adams controversy, told United Press International:

"I haven't been told anything formal, but my somewhat educated intuition is that this thing—Adams leaving—has been all set. It was just a matter of time. They (the White House) tried to work out the situation after the Goldfine hearings, but just could not, Adams can't make any talks, he can't give the Democrats hell without somebody yelling 'corruption' right back at him.

"Then came the Maine elections and in my opinion, that made up his mind."

Hagerty issued the denial in commenting on a story in the Laconia, N. H., Citizen that it had learned from a reliable Washington source that Adams had resigned.

Hagerty said the only part of the story that was "truthful" was that Adams was on a Canadian fishing trip.

### New Radio Tower Now Up for KDOV

Erection of a new 405-foot antenna tower for radio station KDOV began this morning, according to Vern Ludwig, secretary-treasurer of Medford Broadcasters, Inc.

Ludwig said that the tower should be up by this week end.

Original transmitting antenna of Medford's newest radio station crashed to the ground on Aug. 29 when a crop sprayer airplane struck a guy wire. The station has been operating since that time with an antenna wire strung between two power poles at the transmitter site a mile south of Medford.

Sections for a complete new tower arrived here Saturday from Oklahoma City, Okla.

A plane piloted by William E. Rosenbalm of Medford Air service, struck the antenna wire in the early morning accident. The plane reportedly was undamaged in the mishap.

### Lumber Unions, Three Employer Groups Settle

Portland - (UPI) - Two big lumber unions and three major employer groups late yesterday reached a settlement affecting some 75,000 workers in the Douglas fir belt of the lumber industry.

The agreement calls for a 7½ cent hourly wage increase. Union officials said it probably would end a current strike against several mills in Oregon and Washington by the AFL-CIO Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union.

Separate Negotiations  
The agreement was reached in separate negotiations by the LSU and the AFL-CIO International Woodworkers of America. The employer groups are the Lumbermen's Industrial Relations Committee, the Willamette Valley Operators and the Plywood Operators associations.

The 7½ cent hourly wage hike is subject to ratification by 50,000 members of the LSU and 25,000 members of the IWA.

The IWA had voluntarily gone without negotiating for a wage increase last spring because of the depressed lumber market but announced recently it would seek a 25-cent hourly hike because of improved market conditions.

The LSU, which struck several mills starting last week, originally sought a 31-cent hourly package wage hike.

Three Yet Unsettled  
The 7½ cent hourly increase would bring base pay in the industry to about \$2 an hour.

If union members ratify the agreements, it would leave only Weyerhaeuser Timber Company, Georgia-Pacific and Willamette Valley Lumber Company unsettled among the big firms which negotiate independently.

Members of the distribution division of the United Medford Crusade have been called to a training session Friday, Sept. 12, at 7 a. m. in the Jackson hotel.

Ray Mencke, division chairman, and his assistant, Bill Staten, have assigned section heads. They are Fred Sears, C. D. Larson, Ray Johnson, John Gustafson, H. S. Fly, and Paul Lea. They are obtaining solicitors to call upon the 311 firms allotted for the division. A goal of \$10,700.00 has been set for the division in this campaign.

## Medford High, Hoover Opening Dates Postponed

Medford High and Hoover elementary schools will open Sept. 22 instead of Sept. 15, it was announced today by School Superintendent Leonard Mayfield.

The one-week postponement is a result of delays in construction, Mayfield said, which were not within the control of the contractor.

Hoover is a new school. Work at the high school has included additions and remodeling.

All other schools in the Medford district will open as scheduled Sept. 15. Students at the new Wilson school will be "double shifted" at Roosevelt until the new building is completed in about a month, Mayfield said.

Sophomore day, scheduled at the high school for Friday, Sept. 12, will be postponed one week to Friday, Sept. 19.

During the one-week delay at the two schools, the staffs will work on courses of study and instructional materials, make home visits, and prepare lesson plans, the superintendent said. This will "telescope" the last class time gradually into the rest of the semester. The two late-opening schools will have the same vacation and closing dates as all other Medford schools.

Students planning to attend the high school, and who are new to the Medford public schools, are requested to register any afternoon this week and next, and secure their schedules. Students already registered may not change their previous schedules until after school opens Sept. 22.

Students were reminded they may purchase their student body tickets prior to the first football game of the season this Friday.

## Negro Attorneys File Brief With Supreme Court

Washington - (UPI) - Negro attorneys told the Supreme Court today that "the very survival of the rule of law" depends on continued integration of Little Rock's Central High School.

They said in a brief filed with the court that the case affords the court an opportunity to "restate in unmistakable terms... the supremacy of all constitutional rights over bigots—big and small." Filed by NAACP.

The brief was filed by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People on behalf of Negro students seeking admittance to the all-white Central High School.

The Little Rock School Board, in a brief filed Monday, asked the high court to approve a 2½ year delay in integrating the school.

Government officials said the Justice Department will not submit a new brief but will stand on its earlier recommendation that the court order integration without further delay.

The views contained in the various briefs will form the basis for oral arguments which resume before the high court Thursday.

The Justice Department was prepared to mobilize U. S. marshals to help enforce integration in event of mob violence that could not be handled by local peace officers in Little Rock.

## Warplanes Over Red-Claimed Territory Aired

Artillery Blasts Quemoy's Again

Taipei, Formosa - (UPI) - The Communists blasted the Quemoy's with artillery again today and charged the United States with a "deliberate war provocation" in flying warplanes over Red-claimed territory.

They also were reported building up their MIG jet fighter strength by moving planes into a sixth new airfield on the mainland coast opposite Formosa.

Storm Stirs Seas  
These developments came as the winds of an approaching storm stirred up rough seas in the Formosa Strait and kept any further U.S.-escorted Nationalist convoys from reaching the Quemoy's.

However, NBC correspondent Cecil Brown told United Press International that U.S. military officials in Formosa had recommended to Washington that U.S. 7th fleet warships accompany Nationalist vessels to the Quemoy beaches instead of stopping at the three-mile limit. Brown said he got his information from an "unimpeachable source," and added that a decision—probably from President Eisenhower—is expected within the next 24 to 48 hours.

Any such plan would mean that American ships would sail to within easy range of Red shore batteries that face the Quemoy's from the mainland.

In Washington, a top military official, who is in close touch with operations in the Formosa Strait, said he knew of "no change" in present U.S. policy of conveying Nationalist ships to the three-mile limit while seeking to avoid any clash with the Chinese Communists.

Peiping Radio was fanning war hysteria at home and abroad with wild accusations against the Nationalists and the United States. One broadcast said the 600 million Chinese were being mobilized and "equipped with arms" to counter possible U.S. aggression.

At the same time Peiping indicated talks on the Formosa situation between the United States and Red China might start in Warsaw this week. It said Wang Ping-man, Peiping's ambassador to Warsaw, had been called home for instructions and returned today to the Polish capital.

## State Highway Commission Opens Bids

Salem - (UPI) - Bids on 18 highway projects were opened by the State Highway Commission here Tuesday.

They included three projects improving the Pacific highway in Lane and Douglas counties.

Natt McDougall, Portland, submitted the apparent low bid of \$1,126,788 on the largest project to grade 6.97 miles of the Linn county line-McKenzie river section of the Pacific highway from 5 to 11 miles north of Eugene.

White brothers, Walla Walla, was low at \$272,177 for 2.03 miles of grading and paving on the North Oakland junction-Sutherland section of the Pacific highway, 12 miles north of Roseburg.

Medford Firm Wins  
White brothers also was low at \$22,177 for 1.38 miles of grading and paving on the Comstock-Anlauf section of the Pacific highway 9 miles south of Cottage Grove.

Other projects included: Josephine: M. C. Lining and sons, Medford, \$106,512 for grading and paving on the North Grants Pass interchange with Pacific highway.

Josephine: Peter Kiewit Sons Company, Medford, \$329,936 for bridges over Rough and Ready creek, west fork of Illinois river and Elk creek on the Redwood highway.

Josephine: Ausland Construction Company, Grants Pass, \$21,655 for a 118-foot bridge over Grave creek on Josephine county road No. 5.

Funeral services will be held at Conger-Morris Funeral home at 2:30 p. m. Friday. The Rev. Joseph Munshaw, of the Eagle Point Bible church, will officiate. The Medford Elk's lodge of which Mr. Ashpole was a member, will be in charge of the committal in Jacksonville cemetery.

## En Route Radar Possible for Medford Airport

A navigational radar system is anticipated for the Medford municipal airport in "a year or two," a local source revealed today.

The radar system would serve as a navigational aid to prevent collisions in flight over this area in fog, it was explained.

Klamath Falls and Red Bluff, Calif., surveys are being made for installation of such a system there some time this year, the source stated. A micro-wave communications system will tie in airports there with air traffic control centers at Seattle and Oakland, Calif., it was explained.

Both Klamath Falls and Red Bluff airports will require additional crews of nine men each to maintain continual radar operations, it was reported.

Approach Lighting Ready  
The newly installed approach lighting system at the Medford airport will be ready for final inspection this week. The high intensity lighting will assist the pilot in landing during low ceilings and poor visibility, a Medford airport official said.

## Eisenhower Plans Address To Nation

Newport, R. I. - (UPI) - President Eisenhower will return to Washington Thursday to make a television and radio report to the people on the Formosa situation, the White House said today.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said it would be "a major report to the American people, and for that matter to the world on the situation" in the Formosa Strait as it exists there.

The address on the Formosa crisis will be carried "live" on all four of the nation's major broadcasting networks Thursday night.

The American Broadcasting Company, the Columbia Broadcasting System, the Mutual Broadcasting System and the National Broadcasting Company said they will carry the talk on radio from 10 p. m. (e.d.t.) to its conclusion.

ABC also will carry the speech "live" on television. NBC and CBS said they will televise a rebroadcast at 11:15 p. m. (e.d.t.).

Mrs. Conner, who was taken to the hospital by Medford ambulance, told officers that she was hit over the head with a flashlight.

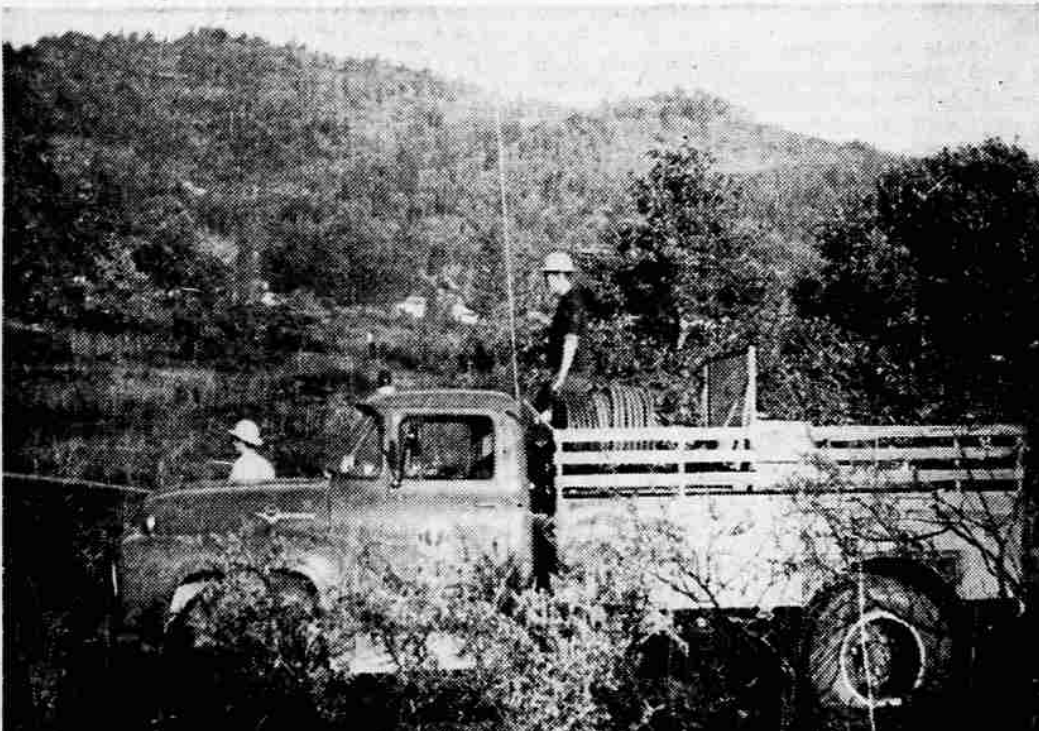
## New Teachers To Get Welcome

## Gov. Holmes Takes Steps To Assist Small Businesses

Salem - (UPI) - A program of direct assistance to Oregon's small businesses - including the possibility of putting the state into the small business loan business - was announced today by Gov. Robert D. Holmes.

The governor said he had designated the Department of Planning and Development as

the legal agency to apply for an outright grant of \$40,000 a year for counseling in the small business assistance program.

Asks For Study  
At the same time the governor announced he had asked for a study directed toward preparation of bills for the 1959 Legislature which would permit Oregon to take advantage of other assistance provisions under the Federal Small Business Administration.

These include enabling acts through which the state could give loan assistance to small businesses.

The \$40,000 grant from federal reserve bank funds of SBA was provided by the small business investment act of 1958 and is available to each of the states. It will not be repaid.
