

Eddie Fisher Denies Being in Love With Elizabeth Taylor

Hollywood — (UPI) — Boyish Eddie Fisher, whose marriage to Debbie Reynolds once was considered "ideal" by Hollywood, denied today he was in love with raven-haired Elizabeth Taylor.

The singer admitted he was having a marital "misunderstanding" with Debbie but said it had nothing to do with his breakfast-midnight dates with Miss Taylor in New York.

"No, I'm not in love with Liz," Fisher said. "She's not in love with me. The problem between Debbie and me has nothing to do with Elizabeth. We are all good friends."

Elude Newsmen

Eddie and Debbie were both at their West Los Angeles home where late Tuesday they scaled a backyard fence to escape newsmen and photographers and take Miss Reynolds to a doctor because of her "nerves."

Fisher's agent said the couple's car stalled in the Westwood district when the battery died and they were forced to get out and push. They took a taxi home.

Both Fisher and Miss Taylor, widow of producer Mike Todd, returned Tuesday from New York where their breakfast, lunch and dinner dates and appearances in night spots produced speculation of a budding romance.

Goes Right Home

The singer, who earlier in the week had kept Debbie waiting at International Airport when he didn't come

home as scheduled, went right home. A few hours later the couple issued a statement they were having a "misunderstanding" but added, "We have nothing more to say."

Lovely Elizabeth had nothing much to say to newsmen either when she stepped off a Trans World Airline plane Tuesday night.

"I have nothing to say except hello," she told reporters.

Snaps At Reporters
Asked why she did not go to Europe from New York as planned, she said:

"I was only going to be gone for a couple of weeks and I used it up in New York. I am returning here to talk about a new picture. I have no statement to make about anything else."

And that was that. She was whisked away in a private car, apparently to her new home in Bel Air.

Earlier in New York, she snapped at a newsman who asked her if she were falling in love with Eddie Fisher — "that's a stupid question. I'm not going to dignify it with an answer."

Engine Failure Blamed for Crash

Anchorage, Alaska — (UPI) — Engine failure apparently caused the crash of a C-47 plane at Elmendorf Air Force base which killed 12 of 19 persons aboard, an Air Force spokesman said today.

The plane, en route to Fairbanks, was using a 10,000-foot runway and had just got into the air Tuesday when it suddenly veered to the right, crashed to earth and burned.

Air Force officials were preparing a list of the victims but so far had released only the names of the seven survivors.

They were:

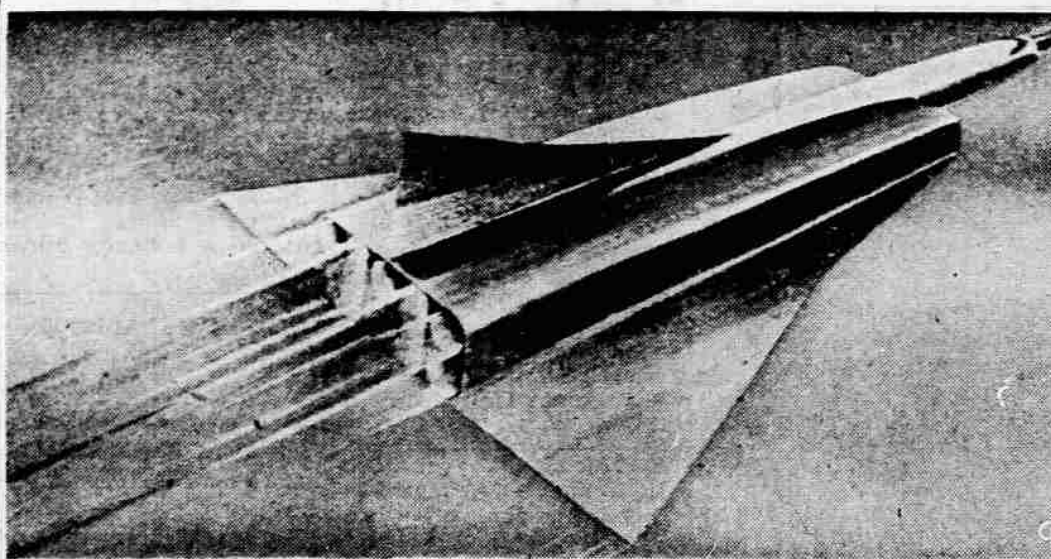

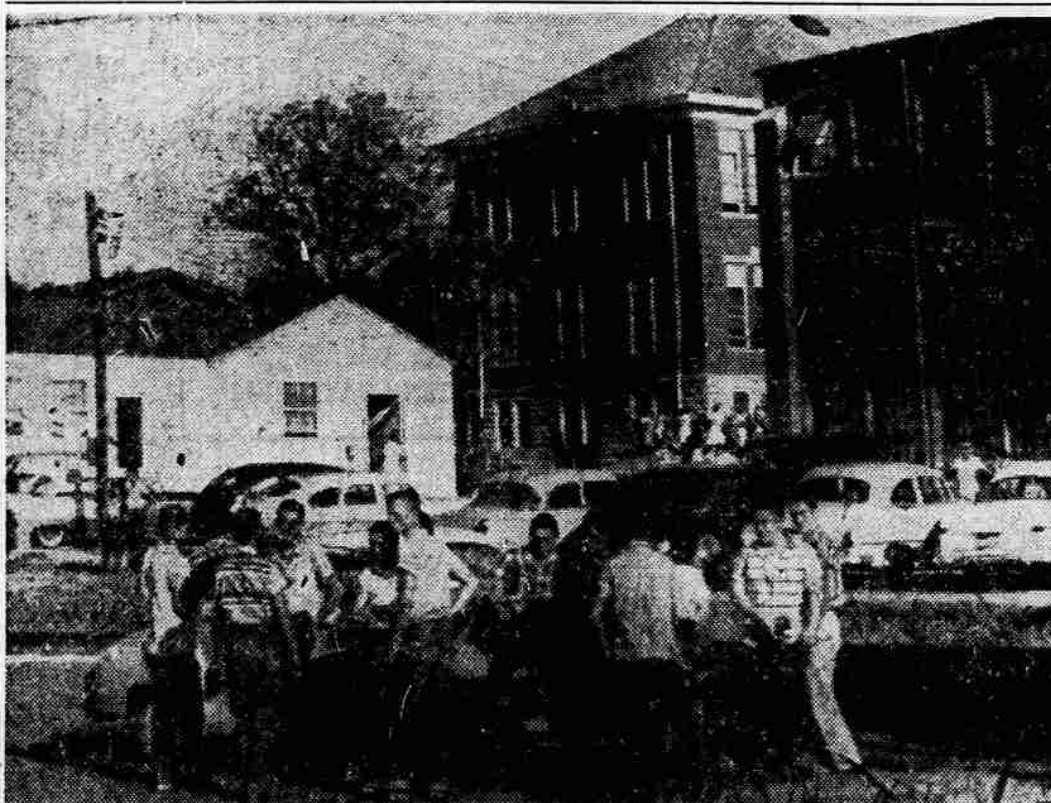

U.S. Atom Power Plants Said To Be More Efficient

Geneva — (UPI) — Scientific papers presented to the atomic power conference showed today the atomic power plant at Shippingport, Pa., is operating with far greater efficiency than larger plants in Britain and the Soviet Union.

Discussions have disclosed Britain has been having trouble with fuel elements in its first reactors at Calder Hall.

Elements Removed

Although they were designed to last for 10,000 to 15,000 "megawatt days," some of the British fuel elements had to be removed for examination and reconditioning after only 1,300 "megawatt days."

A megawatt day is the period of time needed to produce one million watts of electric power. The period of time may vary.

By contrast, the United States is getting 25,000 to 30,000 "megawatt days" from fuel elements at Shippingport. It expects to get 40,000 "megawatt days" from more concentrated fuels in the Army's package power reactor at Fort Belvoir, Va.

Russian Details Lacking
No specific details on Russian performance were available. But Soviet delegate S. M. Feinberg said the designs for the reactors at the power station in Siberia call for an efficiency only "a little higher than Calder Hall."

U.S. scientists said the fact American reactors used "enriched" instead of natural uranium fuel contributed to greater efficiency. But they said better designing of reactors also played a part in achieving superior performance.

Tree Wires Should Be Clearly Visible

Kent, Ohio — (UPI) — Planters are reminded to attach pieces of cloth to the wires they use for bracing their young trees this fall.

The reminder comes from tree expert Martin L. Davey Jr., who suggests as an alternative enclosing the wires in pieces of old hose.

The braces, which consist of wires running from tree trunks to ground stakes, help keep the trees erect until they have developed root networks to anchor them into place.

But Davey warned that the wires could easily trip an unwary passerby unless they're made clearly visible.

Wife Supplied Tip Leading To Arrest Of Kidnap-Slayer

Fort Collins, Colo. — (UPI) — Authorities said Tuesday the wife of Floyd J. Robertson Jr. supplied the tip that led to his arrest for the kidnapping of pretty Marjorie Schneider, 18.

The 23-year-old father of three signed a 500-word confession admitting he abducted, raped and shot the young blonde stenographer because "I couldn't stand to see someone have a good time."

Sheriff Ray Scheerer of Larimer county said Darlene Robertson, 22, supplied the report that led to her husband's arrest early Monday.

Terrified Family

Robertson terrified his own family with a rifle just a few hours before the kidnapping of Miss Schneider early Sunday from a car parked in a lovers' lane west of here. He used the same gun to shoot her three times in the head.

Robertson said "it all started" when he stormed out of his home after an argument with his wife, which ended when he took his rifle and shot two family pictures off the wall.

He said he stopped for a "couple of swallows of whiskey," had a bowl of chili and some beer, and then drove around aimlessly. He said he drove to the lovers' lane where he spotted the parked car. In it were Miss Schnei-

der, her boy friend, Ellsworth E. Farnik, 21, and another Fort Collins couple.

He said he started shooting at the car with the rifle as the two couples huddled on the floor. He said after taking their billfolds he ordered "the blonde one" to come with him.

Ordered To Strip

The Fort Collins repairman then said he ordered the girl to drive about 30 miles up into Poudre Canyon and stopped when the car had a flat.

"I ordered her to strip and told her what I was going to do," he said. "We had relations."

Robertson said when he stepped out of the car to fix the flat tire, the girl began running down the road. He said he called to her to stop and then picked up his rifle and fired.

"I am an expert shot and when I fire a gun I hit what I aim at," he said in the written confession.

Library Unsure On Count of Items

New York — (UPI) — The New York Public Library has estimated it owns 27,500,000 different items but admits it isn't the slightest bit sure of the count.

Officials describe the figure as an "educated guess," pointing out, for example, that they measured with a ruler to determine that there were 4,370,000 clippings, pamphlets, pictures, maps and other "miscellaneous" items.

The library also believes it owns 6,400,000 books, 67,000 photograph records, 34,000 film and microfilm reels, 8,000 microprint cards, 110,000 fine prints, 125 globes and 67,000 Braille and recorded books as well as periodicals and music for the blind.

The "educated guess" included another 270,000 pamphlets and other unbound scores, 3,020,000 broadsides,

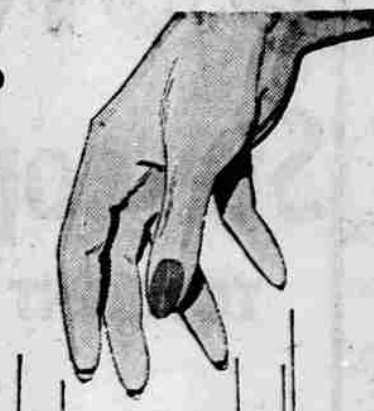

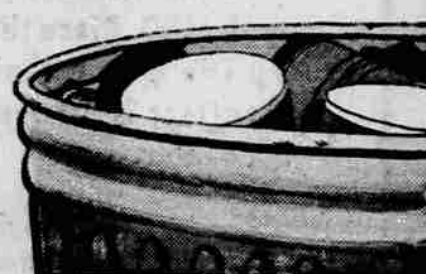
