

### Dairy Group OKs Series of Bills

Salem—(UPI)—The State Agriculture Department's dairy relations advisory committee Tuesday gave final approval to a series of proposed bills that would modify existing dairy laws.

The proposed changes will be presented at a meeting of the board of directors of Oregon dairy industries, Oregon dairy producers and northwest retail ice cream manufacturers for study and approval.

The meeting is planned tentatively for Sept. 30.

The advisory committee will recommend changes in laws relating to milk definition and standard of identity, breed milk, sampling of milk by milk tank truck drivers, frequency of sampling farm tank milk for butterfat testing, frozen dessert licenses, city surveys and sanitation inspection of producers' farms.

### Nevada Atomic Tests Scheduled

Las Vegas—(UPI)—The Atomic Energy Commission today slowed down its schedule for 10 nuclear tests on the Southern Nevada desert and said the first shot will not be ready until next Tuesday at the earliest.

A firm date for the initial test in which a nuclear device will be detonated from a balloon will probably be set Saturday, a spokesman said.

The second shot will not be detonated until after Sept. 20 and the third will not be ready before October according to the AEC.

The AEC had announced Tuesday that the first shot would be detonated Monday.

### Jackson Easily Outdistances Foe In Washington

Seattle—(UPI)—Democratic Sen. Henry M. Jackson easily won renomination in Washington's primary election Tuesday and will face William B. Bantz, a political newcomer, in the Nov. 4 finals.

Jackson, an ardent advocate of a nuclear and missiles buildup, overwhelmed Alice Franklin Bryant, Seattle grandmother who demanded an immediate halt of atomic testing.

With 4,576 of the state's 5,029 precincts reporting, the junior Washington senator polled 296,942 votes to Mrs. Bryant's 51,537. Bantz had 130,358.

Renomination without opposition was won by the five members of Washington's congressional delegation, Republicans Thomas Pelly, Jack Westland, Walt Horan and Thor C. Tollefson and Democrat Don Magnuson.

Russell V. Mack, a Republican member, crushed his only opponent, Forbus Williamson. A strong trend indicated that Mack would face Victor A. Meyers, secretary of state and Washington lieutenant governor from 1933-1953, in November.

Meyers was beating out Charles Savage, former congressman and John R. Riley, 31-year-old attorney.

Former congressman and U.S. Senator Hugh B. Mitchell, attempting a political comeback, held a modest lead over State Land Commissioner Bert Cole for the Democratic nomination for second district congressman with more than half the precincts reporting.

**Billy Rose Willing To Direct Centennial**  
Portland—(UPI)—Broadway showman Billy Rose said Tuesday he would be willing to direct the Oregon Centennial Industrial World Trade Fair next year for a million dollars.

Rose was contacted in New York by the Oregon Journal after reports that he had been approached about directing the centennial. Centennial officials here said there were no definite plans for hiring Rose.

New York—(UPI)—A "lifer" in the Illinois Penitentiary hopes to make \$21,000 during 1958. Legitimately.

Clyde Wagner expects to accumulate that much from royalties on the sale of 700,000 "Kong Safari"—a toy elephant that he invented in his spare time.

Roy Weightman of the Ohio penitentiary, is another inmate who has put his "time" to good use, inventing the "Spot-a-Stellite" game.

Others in the prison population make crossword puzzles. A few supply cartoonists with gag lines. Many write stories and articles.

Income from these projects ranges from \$1 to \$100 and higher, according to an analysis of "penitentiary pay dirt" in the current issue of Ohio Penitentiary News.
