Registration Set For YMCA Classes For Fall, Winter

SP Rate Reduction Hearings Resume

San Francisco—(UPI)—The Interstate Commerce commission resumed hearings today on a petition by the Southern Pacific railroad to cut lumber freight rates between southern Oregon and southern California and Arizona.

Those objecting to the cuts were to testify today. They included water shippers and northern California lumber and trucking interests. The hearings began here Aug. 18.

The commission shifted the hearings to Portland, Ore., last week to hear testimony from shippers and wholesalers. Most of them said they would ship more by rail if the ICC approved the cut.
