

TORNADO POLISHING FOR VIKING RUCKUS HERE FRIDAY EVENING

Black Tornado gridman of Medford high today finished the heavy work for their North Salem game and will complete the preparations with a light workout Thursday.

Medford and the Vikings will have an 8 p.m. kick-off time at the local stadium on Friday as they launch their respective 1958 campaigns. The tussle is, of course, a non-counter since the Tornado competes in District 6 A-1 and North Salem in District 8.

Medford head mentor Fred Spiegelberg stated that a scrimmage of about 15 minutes duration was planned for this afternoon as the Tornado worked to add polish to its attack and strength to its defense.

The Tornado switched to a one-per-day practice schedule on Tuesday after two appearances on the drill field on Monday. Pass defense has been getting some particular attention from day to day.

There are indications that the Vikings from the Capital city have geared an aerial offensive for the new season and have the hands to make it click. Adding to the possibility that Salem will take to the air against Medford is the fact that passes worked well against the Tornado last fall when the Viks nipped the southern Oregon club 7 to 6.

Fontaine Out
Medford's squad has had its

troubles with the flu bug, or some sort of virus, and the latest victim is Jim Fontaine, senior tackle. Fred Funston, senior back, is back with the squad after his bout with illness and may see quite a bit of service, at least on defense, against North Salem.

Pete Rasmussen, senior end, who hurt his knee in drill is now "hobbling around," Spiegelberg reported. He's not likely to see action this week, according to the coach.

The Friday night tussle here should be a help in the determination, as the season progresses, of the comparative strengths of clubs about the state. Medford and North Salem are listed among top contenders in their respective districts.

In another Friday game, Grants Pass, with a high pre-season rating in District 6, plays Albany of District 8. Three other District 6 clubs meet teams of District 5 this week end. Klamath Falls plays Marshfield, Crater goes against Cottage Grove and Ashland meets Roseburg.

One Week Left To Apply for Hunt Permits

Portland—Elk and deer hunters are advised that they have only one more week to get their applications in if they want to be included in the drawings for controlled and management area tags and permits. Filing deadline for all unit and controlled hunts is Sept. 15.

Hunters are also reminded that these applications must be received by the game commission by 5 p.m. on that date. Applications received after that date will not be allowed in the drawings.

Hunters are also reminded the filing deadline includes all elk units and controlled elk hunts and a remaining controlled deer hunt. In addition, the game commission is accepting applications until Sept. 15 for deer management units except those already filled. Filled units include Green Springs, Klamath, Interstate, Silver Lake, Fort Rock, Deschutes, Paulina, Metolius, Grizzly, Ochoco, and Clatsop. The Applegate and Maupin units have only a few permits available, and nimrods are urged not to apply for these units.

All other management units still have a good number of permits available.

Drawings for all hunts will be held at the game commission's Portland office on September 22 beginning at 10 a.m. Drawings will also be held for deer management units that are oversubscribed.

Grid Charges Surprise Briggs

Seattle—(UPI)—University of Washington Athletic Director George Briggs Tuesday expressed surprise at charges leveled at the school by Bakersfield Junior college which accused the UW of using "highly unethical" methods in recruiting a Waco, Tex., football player.

When informed of the charges by United Press International, Briggs stated he had heard nothing of such charges.

Briggs said the University of Washington has been interested in Jackson and had contact with him and that he was offered the full athletic assistance program allowed by the Pacific Coast conference.

"My first reaction to the charge," Briggs said, "would be that encouraging junior college and high school stars to attend a college is not illegal and it doesn't seem to me as though the University of Washington has broken any rules."

Deer and Geese Given Protection

Washington—(UPI)—Rare deer will continue to scamper in Florida and scarce Nene Geese will continue to flock in Hawaii as a result of a series of conservation bills passed by the 85th Congress. Congress appropriated funds for the establishment of a national refuge to protect the rare deer in Florida and the geese in Hawaii.

In addition, Congress passed other measures considered "vitaly-important" for the conservation of land and wildlife in the United States. They provide for:

- Acquisition of wetlands to assure that wildfowl will continue to migrate.
- Research by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife service on the effects of chemicals used in controlling pests.
- A ban on the withdrawal of more than 5,000 acres of public land for use by the Armed Forces without Congressional approval, and the observance of state hunting and fishing laws on military reservations.

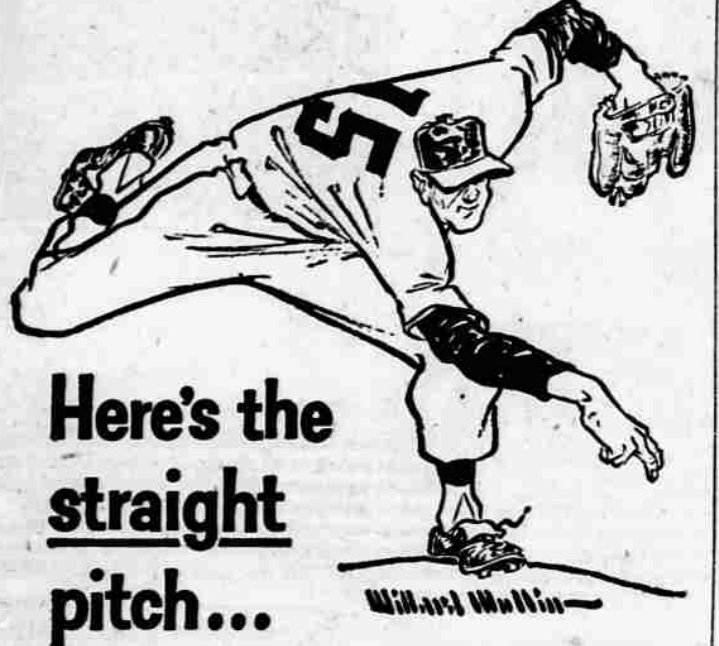
