

Black Tornado Gridsters Scuffle North Salem Here Friday Evening

Medford's football Black Tornado is blessed this fall with a tremendous asset many another school would like to boast—a wealth of depth.

There's been good competition in practices at almost every position. The situation, as expressed by head coach Fred Spiegelberg, is this: "If a fellow wants to make the team, he has to work every minute." If he doesn't work, there's someone else bidding for the job.

So far the Black Tornado aspirants have vied only against each other in the scrap for regular game assignments. The test under fire—the first real 1958 test of mettle—comes Friday night.

The Tornado opens its fall campaign at 8 p.m. tomorrow against the North Salem High Vikings in contention at the Medford stadium. And performances in the non-district hassle should go a long way in determining who'll be carrying the banner for the Tornado in other games to come. Lettermen Predominate

Lettermen and seniors predominate in starting roles as tentatively assigned for the Viking tangle. Spiegelberg has indicated that 10 lettermen, including seven or eight seniors, may be members of the starting offensive unit, while eight lettermen and seven seniors could get first defensive call.

Probables for offensive by the tutor are Jerry Anderson and Mike Murphy, ends; George Ice and John Frohnmayer, guards; Gary Winetroun and Don Harrison, tackles; Pat McLaughlin or Dennis Barr, center; Bob Pond or Jim Clark, quarterback; Gerry Lyons, left halfback; Ron Reich, right half, and Skip Bennett, fullback.

All but Anderson are lettermen. He, Frohnmayer, Bennett and McLaughlin are juniors and the others seniors.

Dennis Jensen and Anderson are billed for defensive ends. Winetroun and Harrison may be at tackles and Murray and Gary Heath at guards. Clark and Al Funston may have linebacker duties with Cal Dean and Reich at halfbacks and Don Peek at safety.

Peek, a senior; Funston, a sophomore, and Anderson are the non-lettermen. Dean and Jensen are juniors.

The Tornado makes its final practice preparations today for the North Salem hassle. Chances are that, while the drill will be light, it will be thorough.

Medford's squad likely will be intact except for Lowell Dean, junior letterman end, out for several games because of a hernia operation. However, Pete Rasmussen, senior monogram flankman, may see little if any duty because of a bum knee. Jim Fontaine, senior letterman tackle, has returned to the squad after a bout with a virus. The Tornado likely will make considerable use of their offensive blocking abilities.

No information was available today on the possible Salem starting crews. The Vikings are expected to take to the air against Medford with quarterbacks Ron Mickle and Tom Edwards doing much of the throwing.

Tony Monroe fired the low card Tuesday and Wednesday in the junior championship golf tournament of Rogue Valley Country club.

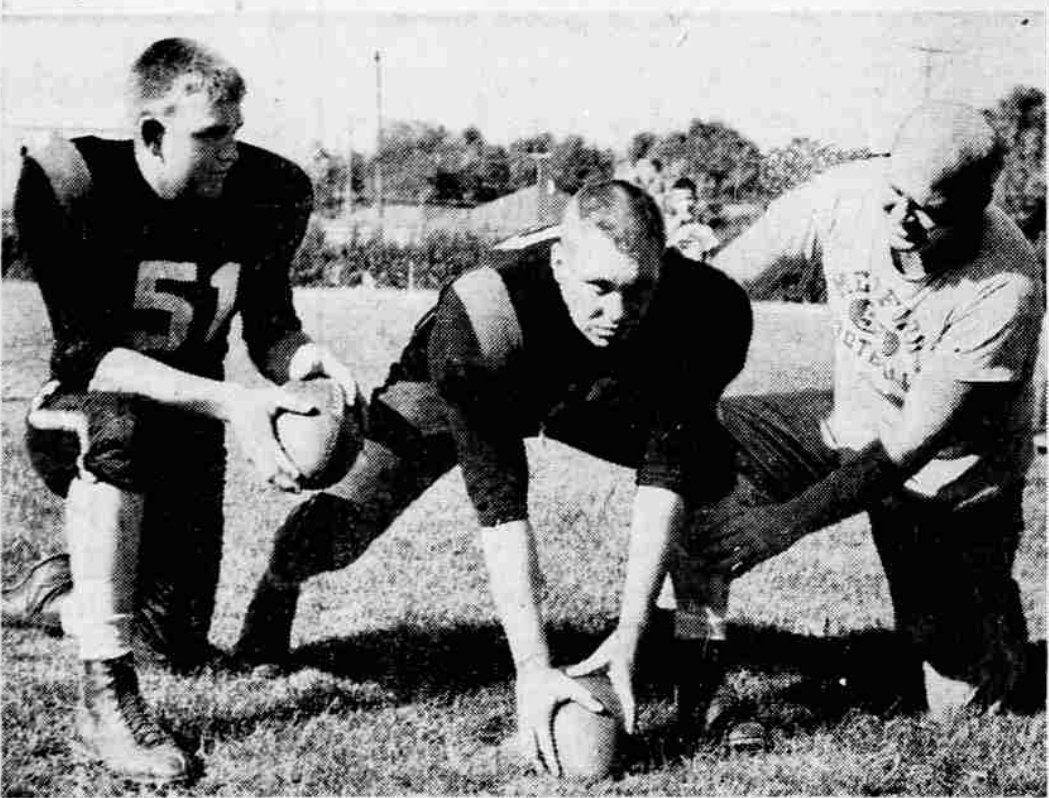
Monroe shot 73 and gained for a 136 gross total and raised the laurels for the junior boys division.

Friend Chalks Up 20th Win Of Season for Pittsburgh

The "magic numbers" were 5 for the Yankees today, 8 for the Braves and 20 for Bob Friend of the Pirates.

Sure, the Yanks and Braves each took a step closer toward their respective pennants Wednesday night, but the hard-working Friend managed the biggest step of all when he became Pittsburgh's first 20-game winner since Murry Dickson in 1951. Friend posted his 20th triumph against 13 losses by defeating the San Francisco Giants, 6-4, in 10 innings.

Before the game started, Pi-

rate first baseman Dick Stuart playfully pasted a sign on Friend's locker bearing the number 20.

"You shouldn't have done it," Friend said, fearing a jinx.

"Don't worry," Stuart said. "I'm gonna hit a couple for you tonight."

Comes Through
Stuart hit only one homer, his 15th, but it was a two-run wallop off Marv Grissom in the 10th that put Friend in the charmed circle.

The Braves reduced their pennant-clinching combination to eight when Juan Pizarro beat the Redlegs, 3-0.

The Cardinals turned back the Cubs, 3-1, and the Phillies won their first home season series from the Dodgers in 20 years with an 8-6 decision.

In the American league, the Yankees whittled their magic number down to five by beating the Indians, 8-3. Kansas City clipped Baltimore, 4-2; the White Sox stopped the Red Sox, 7-2, and Washington nipped Detroit, 5-4.

Pizarro struck out eight and held the Redlegs to three hits in registering his sixth victory. He also drove in one of Milwaukee's runs against loser Bob Purkey and scored another to help the Braves maintain their N.L. lead at 6½ games.

Roberts Wins 15th
A five-run third inning rally at the expense of Don Drysdale paved the way for Robin Roberts' 15th victory although he needed relief aid from rookie Ron Erickson in the ninth. Roberts contributed a two-run single during the rally.

A four-hit pitching effort by Wilmer Vinegar Bend Mizell gave the Cards their triumph over the Cubs. St. Louis capitalized on errors by Jim Bolger and Carl Neuman to score two runs.

The Yankees ruined a "Back The Indians" night for 50,021 fans who turned out in Cleveland with their victory over the Tribe. Tony Kubek doubled home two runs in a three-run sixth inning rally that put New York in front, 5-0.

Hector Lopez of the Athletics snapped a 2-2 tie when he socked a two-run homer off Jack Harshman in the eighth inning.

Southpaw Billy Pierce of the White Sox racked up his 16th win with an eight-hitter over the Red Sox. Chicago clinched the game with a five-run rally in the eighth inning. Clint Courtney drove in four runs with a double and homer to lead the Senators to their come-from-behind victory over the Tigers. Charley Maxwell gave Detroit a 4-0 lead with a grand-slam homer in the third.

Oregon's Webfoots Using Man-in-Motion in Attack

Eugene, Ore.—UPI—Coach Len Casanova of the University of Oregon said his Ducks looked much better Wednesday than they looked Tuesday—simply because they couldn't have looked worse. Casanova said quarterback Dave Grosz and Paul Grober were passing well, but weren't getting enough protection. The coach also praised sophomore halfback Dave Grayson for his running and blocking.

Eugene—UPI—Coach Len Casanova of Oregon, never one to let opposing football coaches know what to expect next, is adding a new—or old—twist to his T-formation offense this season.

Casanova, who won a co-title in the Pacific Coast conference last season with the help of an unbalanced line and the no-huddle attack, is working his Webfoots on the man-in-motion.

Casanova said the return of the man-in-motion was just another example of cycles which football offenses follow. "The T-formation first was played 40 years ago, then it died and didn't come back until 1940. As fast as the de-

fense caught up with it, coaches kept adding new tricks to stay ahead."

The element of surprise must play a big role in offensive plans, says Casanova. And he believes he and his assistant have come up with a new wrinkle or two which will make the man-in-motion valuable again.

Potential Carrier
"The old way of using the man-in-motion was to run him in front of the remaining backs as either a faker or to get him in the blocking pattern for a particular play."

Casanova said, "Now we are going to use him not only as a faker and blocker, but also as a potential ball carrier on any number of situations."

Backfield Coach Johnny McKay said Oregon hasn't used the maneuver for about eight or nine years. "We think it will put added pressure on the defensive end and wing-back, who have become pretty good at stopping the option plays off the split-T," McKay said. "The more things they have to defend against, the better our chances are going to be of getting one of our fast backs loose."

Hobbled Comet Gridders Open at Cottage Grove

Central Point—It will be the crippled Comets of Crater high when the gridders of the Central Point school take the field against Cottage Grove Friday night in the Willamette valley community.

Various ailments and summer jobs have kept players from practices and a good number of players who'll see duty have injuries which will

keep them from performing at top efficiency.

Poor turnout at drills has continued to hamper the Comets since practices began. Those on hand at evening drills have averaged around 25, excluding freshmen, and only 15 or 16 have been present for morning workouts.

Coaches, nevertheless, are satisfied generally with the progress made by the youths who have been present regularly. The players that will be able to see service have been doing rather well for this stage in practice sessions, according to head man Leonard Warren. Backs have been running well, the tackling is good and downfield blocking is particularly advanced, he said. Except of the absentee situation, Crater drills are farther along than usual, the mentor said.

Possible starters for the Cottage Grove game are Tom White and Harold Twedell, ends; Dave Brown and Doug Davis or Glenn Cote, tackles; George Hunt and Larry Ryonson or Bruce Keyes, guards; Bill White, center; Wayne Allen, quarterback; Bob Fowler or Loyal Higinbotham, left halfback; Allen Barnes, right half, and Kerman Bennett, fullback.

Wayne Allen has been hobbled by a pulled groin muscle and Fowler has worked little this week because of an ankle sprain. Allen Barnes also has a bum ankle and Bennett is hampered by a foot bruise.

John Burns, counted upon for work at end and in the backfield is down with infectious mononucleosis and is probably lost for the season. Don Gillaspie another letterman and a back hurt his knee on his job and has been at only one practice. Jim Eldred, an end, has a bum shoulder, and Tom Turner, a guard, has missed workouts because of a pear rash. Byron LaCasse, who may play some at a tackle, has a bum knee.
