Don Krieger and Bob Atkinson Jr., the final remaining Oregon hopes, were beaten Wednesday. Krieger lost to Jerry Pittman of Tulsa, Okla., 5 and 4, and Atkinson lost to Phil Rodgers of La Jolla, Calif., the national intercollegiate champion, on the 19th hole.

Tacoma had beaten the Oregon team 4-2 Tuesday night to gain the finals.

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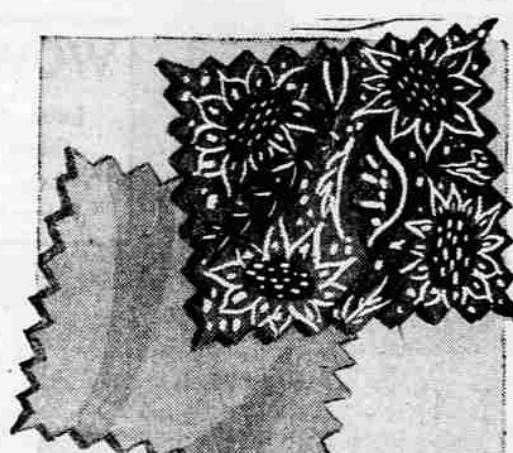
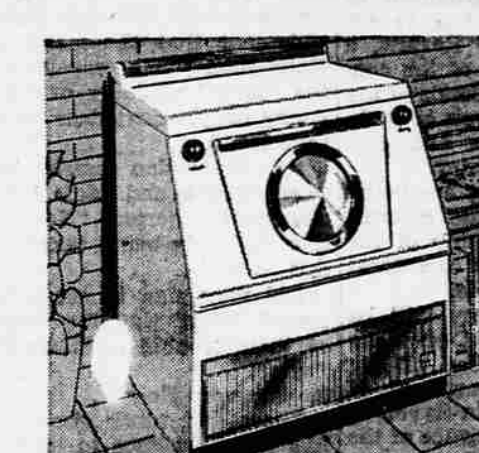
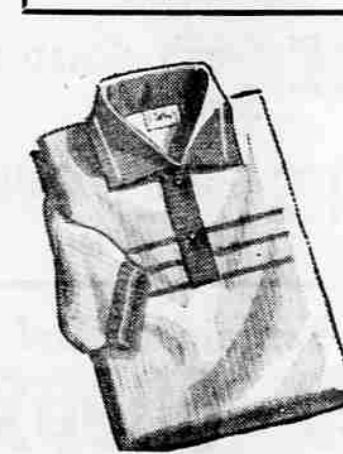
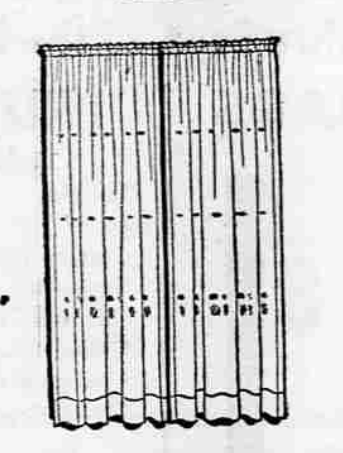
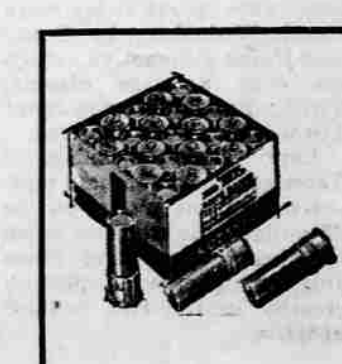
