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Ski Bowl Work Said Behind Schedule

Yreka, Calif.—Construction of the Mt. Shasta Ski Bowl lodge is about two weeks behind schedule, the builder told stockholders of the corporation Monday night. The completion deadline for the lodge and ski lift on the slopes of Mt. Shasta is Oct. 15.

A spokesman for the Heron Construction company, builders of the lift, expressed optimism over chances of completing the lift by Oct. 1, and the contractor building the lodge, Carl R. McConnell, said he still hopes to be able to turn the building over to the corporation next month.

A Thanksgiving ski festival is scheduled as part of the promotion plans for the bowl this winter, according to Chapman Wentworth, a member of the board of directors. He also said that a national ski meet is scheduled for the bowl two or three weeks before the winter Olympics at Squaw

valley.

When completed, it is anticipated that the lodge will remain open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. during the winter, and from 6 a.m. until 11 p.m. in the summer, the directors said. The lift is to be in operation from 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. during the winter, with no schedule set for the summer yet.

Chemical Meet Slated for OSC

Corvallis—Due to the ever increasing number of toxic agricultural chemicals—complex in formula, and the resulting accidents and diseases caused by improper handling of these hazardous materials—the state industrial accident commission is sponsoring a state-wide conference at Oregon State college, Oct. 7.

The conference will be presented in cooperation with the Oregon state board of health, the governor's farm safety committee, and the Oregon State college extension service. The purpose of

the meeting, which will last all day, is to acquaint those engaged in the manufacturing, compounding, distribution and application with the hazards involved in these toxic agricultural chemicals.

The complete program will be made public next week, the accident commission announced. The conference is designed to stimulate interest on the safe handling of toxic chemicals. It is being conducted not only for the benefit of the chemical industry, agricultural spray applicators and distributors, but also for

the general public who are using the products without a thorough understanding of their toxic effects. A large attendance is expected, a spokesman said.

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
