BUCKLE UP

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Negro Youth Being Questioned In Slaying of New York Couple

New York — (UPI) — An 18-year-old Negro has been picked up in Farmville, Va., for questioning in the killing of Dr. Melvin Nimer and his wife, Lou Jean, the New York World-Telegram & Sun reported today.

The couple's 8-year-old son, Melvin Dean, is under psychiatric examination after allegedly telling police that he killed his parents in their bed with a kitchen knife. Previously he had said a masked prowler choked him and killed his parents when they came to his aid.

The newspaper said Mrs. Nimer had told police before

she died that she and her husband had been in answer to young Dean's cries and had been stabbed by a full-grown man wearing a white hood.

Her story apparently substantiated the one first told to officers by the youngster.

Transcript Printed

The newspaper gave no indication of what led police to the Virginia youth, whom it identified as William Fletcher Jr. It said he had been staying with his mother in a rented Manhattan room, miles from the Nimer's Staten Island home, and had "disappeared about two days ago and returned to Virginia."

The newspaper printed a transcript of Mrs. Nimer's questioning by a detective as she lay dying in the Public Health hospital after the stabbing early Sept. 2. Her husband had died moments after reaching the hospital, apparently without making any statement.

Q. Can you tell anything she was asked.

Mrs. Nimer mumbled: "A mask... a mask..."

Q. Can you tell anything else?

A. A hood... a hood...

Q. What kind?

A. White.

Same Size As Husband

Q. Slits in the eyes?

A. Yes. Covered full head.

Q. How tall?

A. Tall as my husband, same build.

Q. Why did you get up?

A. Heard boy scream.

Q. Where did you see the man? Hallway?

A. Yes.

Q. What did you do? Put on the light?

Mrs. Nimer was unable to answer. She lapsed into unconsciousness and was taken to the operating room where she died, apparently without speaking again.

Boy in Hospital

Richmond County District Attorney John N. Braisted Jr., who Wednesday night announced that young Dean had told officers Saturday, and twice since, that he was the murderer, said Thursday that Mrs. Nimer had described her husband's size. Braisted said he considered it possible that she had seen her husband going down the stairs and mistaken him for an intruder.

Braisted and top police officials revealed late Thursday, a few hours after Dean had been sent to Bellevue hospital for mental examinations as a material witness that they were exploring out-of-town a new lead which did not involve the boy.
