

Warren Spahn Sets Record As Braves Beat Cards 8-2

Warren Spahn of the Milwaukee Braves moved into a special class by himself when he became the first left-handed pitcher in baseball history to win 20 games in nine different seasons by defeating the St. Louis Cardinals, 8-2, Saturday.

Spahn's nine - hit triumph over St. Louis put him ahead of Eddie Plank and Lefty Grove of the Philadelphia Athletics, each of whom won 20 games eight times. Right-hander Cy Young held the major league record with 16 separate 20-game seasons.

Milwaukee made it easy for Spahn by scoring five unearned runs in the fourth inning on three hits and three St. Louis errors, two of them by second baseman Don Blasingame. Larry Jackson suffered the loss that helped the Braves reduce their pennant-clinching magic number to "five."

The Pittsburgh Pirates tied two records while beating the Los Angeles Dodgers, 9-4. Dick Stuart equalled one mark by striking out six straight times, including four times Friday night, while Bill Mazeroski's two-run homer in the fourth inning was his 18th of the year and tied the high total for all Pittsburgh second basemen.

Makes Pitching Debut
Ralph Maueriello, making his major league pitching debut for the Dodgers, failed to survive the first inning as Pittsburgh routed him with three runs. The Pirates added

a pair of two-run clusters in the third and fourth off reliever Babe Birrer. Vern Law worked five innings for Pittsburgh and was credited with his 13th win. Bob Porterfield held the Dodgers hitless over the last four innings.

Frank Robinson drove in four runs with a homer and a double in the first two innings to help the Cincinnati Redlegs snap a four-game losing streak with a 9-2 triumph over the Chicago Cubs.

Alex Kellner, a Kansas City castoff, scattered 10 hits in bringing his N.L. record to 6-3. One of the hits off Kellner was Ernie Banks' 46th homer. Banks also drove in Chicago's other run, bringing his season R.B.I. total to 122. Jerry Lynch also homered for the Redlegs. Johnny Briggs was the loser.

Willie Kirkland's two-run homer in the eighth inning highlighted a five-run rally and Andre Rodgers hit one with the bases empty in the ninth to give San Francisco a victory over Philadelphia. Loser Seth Morehead nursed a 3-0 lead until the Giants erupted for five runs in the eighth. Harry Anderson hit his 23rd homer for the Phils in the ninth. Reliever Gordon Jones was the winner.

Roseburg's Indians Trim Ashland 31-0

Ashland — A big, strong hard-hitting Roseburg high football gang outclassed Ashland 31 to 0 at Roseburg Friday night.

The smaller Ashlanders never quit trying but were hurt by fumbles and penalties.

The Grizzlies of the Lithia city lost the ball on fumbles five times in the first quarter. On two of the occasions, Roseburg converted the muffs into touchdowns. The two fumbles were recovered by the Indians on the two and on the six-yard line.

A third touchdown for Roseburg was produced by a drive and a fourth came on a 45-yard pass play as the gun sounded ending the first half. A 45-yard run closed out the goal-making. Half-time score was 24 to 0.

Alan McKinnis of Ashland broke away for 60-yard run to the end zone in the third quarter but the play was erased by a clipping penalty.

Talent — Bill Skeeters ran 60 yards on the opening scrimmage play of the game here Friday evening and put Eagle Point high on the way to a 32 to 14 decision over the Talent Bulldogs.

Moss and Brooks Win British Tourist Race

Goodwood, England (UPI)—Stirling Moss and co-driver Tony Brooks led the Aston Martin team Saturday in a sweep of the three top places in the British Tourist trophy, the last event of the world championship of sports car manufacturers.

In his fourth victory in the 53-year-old event, Moss covered 353.32 miles in four hours, averaging 88.33 miles an hour.

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The Douglas county team scored twice on 50-yard runs off naked reverses and on 20 and 30 yard gains off tackle. Tim White went four yards for one Jacksonville TD and Doyle Branson passed to Wayne Cabler for 50 yards and the other. Ron Davis cracked over for both Redskins extra points.
