Extension Unit Members Assemble in Jacksonville

About 250 members of home extension units in Jackson, Josephine and Klamath counties attended the annual meeting of District V held in Jacksonville Friday in the old Presbyterian church. It had been planned to use the downstairs meeting room, but because of the capacity attendance, the women moved to the church auditorium for the morning session.

Mrs. E. H. Ahlstrom of Josephine county, district 5 chairman, presided at the meeting. The invocation was read by Mrs. Leland Charley, Lake Creek, first vice-president of the Oregon Home Extension council. The pledge group singing was led by Mrs. Mariann Collins, accompanied by Mrs. Ethel Anderson both of Josephine county.

Professor Talks

Dr. Frank Haynes, assistant professor of social science at Southern Oregon college spoke to the group on "Equal Rights" or suffrage movement in Oregon. He said "The U.S. today is a woman's world. Women spend 90 per cent of the money and own most of the property."

Dr. Haynes added "Most women don't appreciate the freedoms and rights that we enjoy today and fail to realize the struggle that was made by women to gain these rights a very short time ago." He said it was fitting that "we pay honor to the women who fought for the privileges now enjoyed."

Dr. Haynes spoke of Mrs. Abigail Scott Duniway who was the leader of the suffrage movement in Oregon. She spent 41 years of her life in this endeavor before Oregon voted the suffrage movement to the state constitution.

Mrs. Duniway is considered particularly admirable as she was the sole supporter of a family of six children and her husband. Mrs. Duniway toured the northwest lecturing and also published her own newspaper.

Dr. Arthur Taylor, chairman of the social science department at SOC and a member of the board of directors of the Southern Oregon Historical society, in a short talk before noon noted some of the points of special interest to be visited during the tours in the afternoon.

Tours Made

After a picnic luncheon on the Museum lawn, the women were divided into groups to visit the museum, the jail, the old Catholic and Methodist churches, and interesting historical buildings on California and Oregon streets.

Dr. Taylor, Dr. Haynes and Mrs. Clara Garrett led the tours. The meeting was planned by the Jackson, Josephine and Klamath County Home Extension Advisory committees with the assistance of Misses Claire, Mary and Martha Hanley.
