Indian Arrowheads Whet Appetite of Collector

One kind of collecting that costs absolutely nothing consists of keeping an eye out for Indian arrowheads whenever you are walking through the countryside—particularly after a rain and especially along a dirt road or a ploughed field.

It's true that the average arrowhead sells for only a few cents, but it's also true that you might find one worth several dollars, to say nothing of a spearhead, knife blade, tomahawk head or other implement that might be worth very much more.

But an arrowhead is the commonest artifact left by the Indians, and though many thousands of them have been found, there are untold thousands still lying around—those that were lost over thousands of years ago.

The value of a find does not depend upon the size. It depends upon two other things instead—the quality of workmanship and the type of stone used.

The extent to which pupils are being prepared for advancement in mathematics, social studies, science, language arts, and physical education was explored and the state courses of study in each of the fields was discussed.

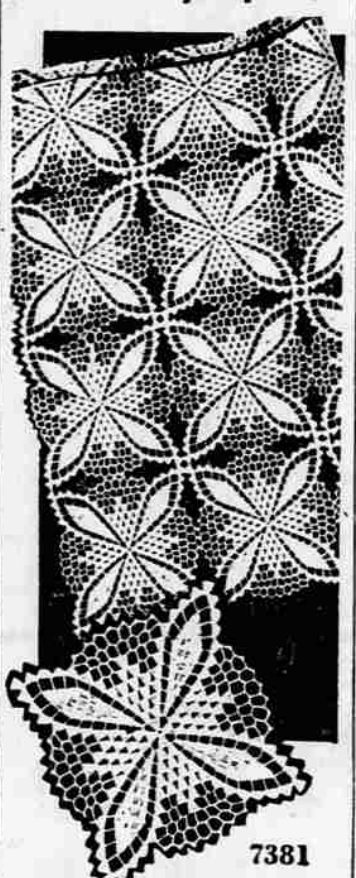

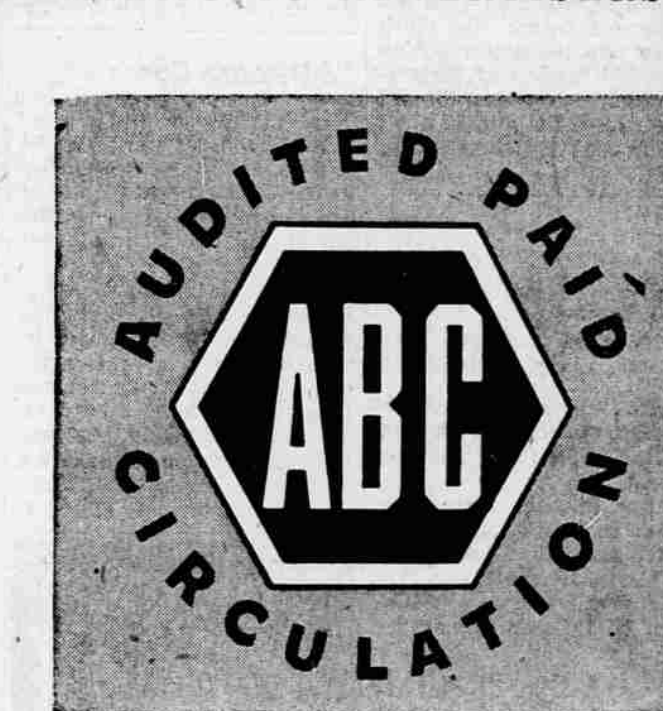
