

Library Has Many Books for Young Adults, School Students

Medford High school students who find an extra week of summer vacation hanging heavy on their hands are invited to catch up on their reading.

It is a good chance to get one or two book reports tucked away until required, when students may be swamped with term papers or preparation for examinations, according to Librarian Miss Helen Webster. Or it is a good chance to get a little grade-boosting background information in current history or new developments in science.

Among the books recently added to the young adults' section is the year's winner of the Newberry award for the most distinctive contribution to young people's literature.

Harold Keith's "Rifles for Watie" is an exciting and superior story of one of the lesser known aspects of the Civil war, describing the western campaign and the part played in it by the Cherokee Indians.

Courageous Girl

Girls may prefer Anne Sayre's "Never Call Retreat," the story of courageous Pru Whipple journeying in her 17th year from Pennsylvania to Alabama with her Quaker family. At this time, just after the Civil war neither Quakers nor Yankees were welcome in the south.

If current history is desired, a book such as Frances Copeland's "Land Between" will give the background to make richer and more enjoyable all that is read in the news about the lands of the Middle East.

Television fans can really get behind the screen, learn how programs are put on the air, discover vocational opportunities in TV, learn all about color TV in the "Television Story" by John H. Floherty. Would-be fliers will find human interest and a wealth of incident in the trial-and-error record of aviation's achievements Richard Bishop relates in "From Kitty Hawk to Kitty Hawk." "The Junior

Airman's Book of Airplanes" is a good account of the military side of flying.

Farther Than Flying

Those who want to go farther than flying will take them are offered "Exploring Earth and Space," by Margaret Hyde, "The World in Space," by Alexander Marshak, a report on the latest findings of the Vanguard workers in satellite and rocket experiments; or if they prefer not to be bound even by fact, they may choose "Mystery of Satellite 7," a dramatic story of three teenagers who outwit saboteurs of a satellite project in Florida.

There's excellent background for a science course in the entertaining and informing "Building Blocks of the Universe," the story of the chemical elements, by Isaac Asimov; and it's good, easy reading, too. Appreciation for science is also stimulated by Sidney Rosen's "Galileo and the Magic Numbers."

Even dating can be more fun with the help of a little outside reading. Take "The Art of Dating," by Dr. Evelyn Duvall, for example, or Cecil Richmond's "Handbook for Dating." Both books offer helpful, common sense suggestions on dating procedures and etiquette. Dating and other subjects of interest to young adults are the subject of Mary Beery's "Young Teens Talking It Over." Also on your shelf is a favorite hand book of good grooming for girls, "Susan, Be Smooth," by Nell Giles.

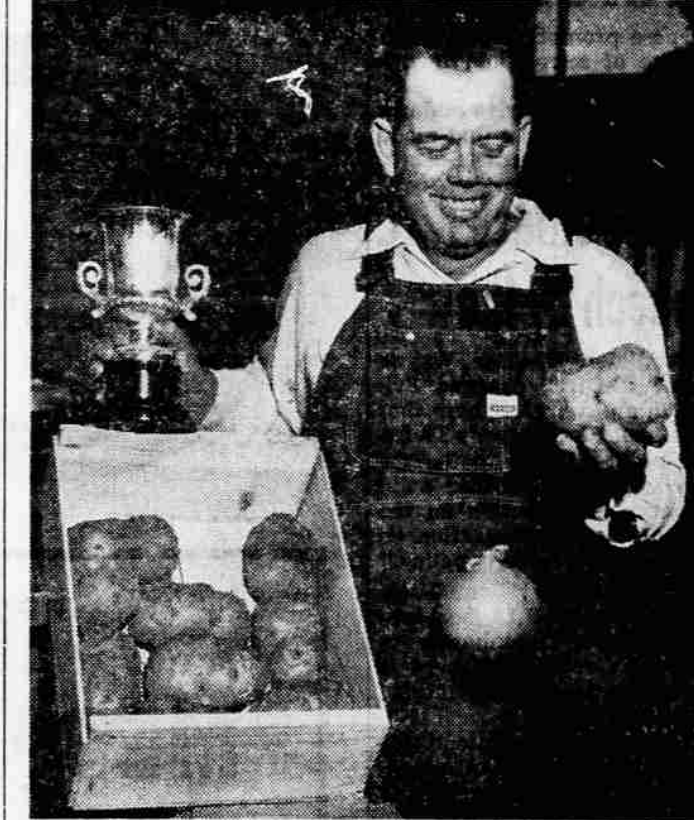
Phoenix Horse Club
