## Gov. Holmes Investigating Snake River Dam Situation

Salem - (UPI) - Army Engineers have accepted Gov. Robert D. Holmes' invitation to meet with him next Tuesday as part of an investigation of fisheries and river control problems at Oxbow dam on the Snake river.

However, Tom Roach, president of Idaho Power Company hasn't yet acknowledged the Governor's request that he also show up, according to the Governor's press

secretary, Tom Wright. Col. Allen F. Clark Jr., division engineer at Portland for the U.S. Corps of Engineers, notified the Governor that he would be on the east coast next week, but that his executive assistant, Roy W. Scheffel, could attend the meeting.

Col. Clark also said that the Corps of Engineers did not grant permission to Idaho Power to reduce the flow of Snake river to 2,000 second feet, although the request was received.

**Barge Operator Included**  
Columbia river barge operators also asked the Governor if they could be represented at Tuesday's meeting to present statements that action of the power company in reducing the flow of the river had serious effects on navigation on the Snake and Columbia rivers.

### Fast Pace Faces Governor Holmes In Coming Week

Salem - (UPI) - A virtual mile-a-minute pace faces Oregon's chief executive next week with several major conferences, board meetings and over 7,000 miles of travel on his schedule.

Gov. Holmes will average about 45 miles each hour of the 168-hour week with most of the traveling included in a one-day trip to Washington, D. C.

In-state travel will include visits to Portland, Sweet Home, Roseburg, Astoria, Willamina, his home town of Gearhart, Woodburn and Hillsboro.

Only the Hillsboro and Willamina stops carry the political campaign label and the Willamina visit will be to make an education speech to a bipartisan audience.

The Governor's scheduled trip in a new West Coast Airlines Fairchild Turboprop plane has been canceled pending "some work on the aircraft."

Sunday evening, the Governor will leave for Washington, D.C., and conferences in the Pentagon.

### Don't Fly Jets, WCA Pilots Told

Chicago - (UPI) - The Air Line Pilots Association (AFL-CIO) has advised pilots of West Coast Airlines not to fly the line's new turbo-jet aircraft until an agreement with the airline is reached.

ALPA President C. N. Sayen said Friday night that he had wired pilots to strike if the airline attempted to take any action against pilots who refuse to fly the new planes.

The pilots have been free to strike since Aug. 18 when the Railway Labor Act cooling-off period expired after the breakdown of contract negotiations.

West Coast Airlines employs 88 pilots. The airline, with headquarters in Seattle, serves Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

## Tuition Payments Authorized for 599 High School Pupils

Tuition payments of 599 high school students from the nine elementary school districts in Jackson county were approved by the county non-high school board at a meeting last week.

Total tuition payment approved was \$260,432.25 to the nine high school districts, including Grants Pass High school.

The board also approved the appointment of James Walker to replace D. H. Barber, Trail, representing Zone 2. According to county school officials, Zone 2 of the non-high district ceased to exist when consolidation of the of the Shady Cove and Elk-Trail schools with Eagle Point became effective July 1.

As a result the county boundary board rezoned the county, and in doing so, Griffin Creek school district was taken from Zone 4 and placed in Zone 2. Walker represents Zone 2 on the non-high board. The action was necessary to ensure five members on the board, officials stated.

The board also heard a report from Jim McDonald, director of audio-visual aids and public relations for the county school office on the National Defense Education act of 1958.

McDonald said the act has several sections which could benefit education substantially in Jackson county. He said monies were available for the purchase of equipment suitable in use for providing education in science, mathematics, and modern foreign languages. Some money is also available for minor revision of science laboratories. The money is available on a matching basis, either from the state or local level, to match federal money available, he said.

Bruce Hitt, assistant county superintendent, reviewed Public Law 874 operation to the board and its relationship to the non-high districts.

Attending the meeting were James Walker, Edmund Ramsay, John Chitwood, Nora H. Blair, all board members, and Alf B. Melkold, superintendent and secretary to the board.

"Al Vey of the Oregon Fish Commission, Phil Schneider of the Game Commission, and John Davis of the Water Resources Board were on the job investigating all of this information." He said, "I have no reason to doubt that the Idaho Power Company bypassed federal and state regulations for a certain period last week and shut off the flow altogether with full disregard for the public interests."

This is a serious matter that concerns each union family in this community. If you are now using Gilman's milk in your home, please call Gilman's Dairy (NO 4-2640) and cancel your deliveries until they have been taken off the "Unfair List" of the Central Labor Council.

This action by you will help maintain good wages and working conditions for all working people in this area.

WE WANT TO DEAL FAIRLY, HONESTLY AND OPENLY WITH OUR EMPLOYEES, OUR CUSTOMERS AND WITH THE TRADE UNIONS IN OUR COMMUNITY. WE BELIEVE THAT CHRISTIAN MORALITY SHOULD BE CARRIED INTO BUSINESS! WE WISH TO MAINTAIN OUR REPUTATION FOR HONESTY AND INTEGRITY!

Our offer of \$1,000.00 reward supports our statements. The local Teamsters Union says that we are unfair, because we have taken this position. We are a small business, but any business is as big as its principles. We realize that it may be costly for us to stand against the power of the Teamsters officials. It would cost us more to sacrifice our principles!

We feel that the people of our community should know that the Union pressure tactics which have recently aroused public indignation, are being used right here in Medford and Jackson County.
