Table Rock—The Hull orchards, Red Skin and Table Rock, finished the pear harvest Saturday, and report about an average crop. Only pears that mature fairly early are grown in these orchards, and when ready to pick, the work is rushed through to a finish.

At the finish, some 50 employees were discharged, mostly transients, who scattered to other parts in search of work in fruit and truck crops.

The Modoc orchard, with an average crop of fruit and many varieties of pears, some early some late, and large acreages of trees, will be busy with the harvest for some three weeks yet, depending on weather conditions.
