

Steelworkers Open Convention With Unity Plea

Atlantic City, N.J.—UPI—The United Steelworkers of America opened its convention today with a call to arms from its officers who warned anti-labor forces are out to destroy the union by turning its own members against it.

The biting tone of the report reflected the growing tension between the union and the steel industry which must reach an agreement on a new contract in about eight months.

The report suggested the 1,250,000-member union may be squaring off for a bitter battle with the steel industry next year when its current three-year contract expires.

In a report presented at the opening session of the five-day gathering, the officers said the future of the unions was "seriously menaced" by an all-out attack on labor and a recession which may have been "man-made" to strike a blow at unionism.

Dues Increase Defended

The report also defended the increase in dues two years ago which touched off a revolt that for a time threatened the leadership of president David J. McDonald.

The emphasis on unity also suggested concern about some of the bickering that has plagued the higher echelon of the giant steel union.

"In two short years since the last convention in Los Angeles . . . horizons have darkened to a point where our very future is seriously menaced," the report said.

It charged the labor movement was the target of an all-out drive designed to force unions to accept sub-standard contracts in future negotiations.

It cited particularly what it termed "the old foes of unionism"—the National Association of Manufacturers and the United States Chamber of Commerce.

Holmes Attacks Criticism of Fair

Salem—UPI—Gov. Robert D. Holmes Sunday described criticism of the state fair by two Polk county legislators as an "obvious political contrivance" but welcomed an investigation of state fair operations.

Holmes said State Sen. Walter Leth and State Rep. Joe Rogers were "desperate for campaign issues." The two Republicans last week asked Secretary of State Mark Hatfield to order a study of state fair commission books.

The governor termed "ridiculous" charges that the fair expanded "carnival attractions" at the expense of agriculture. Holmes said the fair was a success and that county exhibits this year were at the 21 mark, the most in recent fair history.

Family Overdue In Airplane Found

Woodland, Calif.—UPI—Three members of a Silverdale, Wash., family, reported missing Saturday night in a Tri-pacer airplane, arrived here via bus Sunday.

Marino Scatina, his wife and his oldest son were forced down by bad weather in Eugene, Ore., Saturday night and continued their trip here by bus apparently without notifying Civil Aeronautics Administration officials of the change in plans.

Scatina was expected to reach Woodland Saturday afternoon on a visit to his mother, Mrs. Emma Scatina, but officials heard no word from him and a search, covering Washington, Oregon and California was instigated to find the plane.

Three other members of the Scatina family were home in Silverdale when the missing plane was turned in by CAA officials in Sacramento.

Cog Train Runs Wild; 14 Killed

Bonn, Germany—UPI—Seventy persons were in hospitals today with serious injuries suffered when a cog railway they were riding careened down a mountainside and overturned, killing 14 passengers.

The cog railway runs from Koenigswinter near Bonn to the summit of the 1,000-foot Drachenfels mountain. About 150 persons were riding the three-carriage and steam locomotive train when it crashed Sunday.

Five of the injured were in critical condition. Many foreign tourists were believed to have been aboard the train although police would release no details.
