

Yankees Clinch Pennant; Pirates Still Chasing Milwaukee Braves

The American League's seven dwarfs have officially conceded to the New York Yankees but the stubborn Pittsburgh Pirates refuse to give up their 100-1 shot pursuit of the Milwaukee Braves in the National League.

The Yankees mathematically clinched their ninth pennant in 10 years under Casey Stengel and their 24th since 1921 Sunday when they beat the Kansas City Athletics, 5-3 and 12-7, in 14 innings. The first-game victory was enough to mathematically eliminate the second-place

Chicago White Sox and the long nightcap which ended at 11 p.m. only delayed the cork-popping.

The Braves, however, saw their N. L. lead cut to six games when they bowed to the Los Angeles Dodgers, 5-3, and the Pirates swept the Chicago Cubs, 5-4 and 6-2. The Braves are still firmly in the driver's seat, nevertheless, because they'll clinch by winning five of their last 11 games even if the Pirates should sweep all their remaining nine contests.

Ties Mack Record
Three ex-Kansas City pitchers combined to win the pen-

nant-clincher for the Yankees, Duke Mass gaining his 10th win with the aid of ninth-inning relief help from Ryne Duren and Art Ditmar. Gil McDougald clouted a homer and a double and Norm Siebern a triple to lead the ninth-inning single tied the Yankees at 7-7 and singles by Jerry Lumpe, Mickey Mantle, Siebern, Virgil Trucks and Hank Bauer, a walk and a double steal comprised the winning rally in the second game.

The 68-year-old Stengel thus tied Connie Mack's American league record of

nine pennants and drew with one of John McDraw's major league mark of 10. Stengel also surpassed the Yankee club record of eight pennants won by Joe McCarthy, who also won one as manager of the Chicago Cubs.

Rookie Don Demeter's two-run seventh-inning homer gave the Dodgers their winning margin after Don Zimmer's single tied the score. Johnny Kippstein picked up the win for the Dodgers while relief pitcher Juan Pizarro suffered the defeat. Joe Adcock homered for the world champions.

Ingemar Johansson Halts Eddie Machen

Gothenburg, Sweden (UPI)—Sweden's unbeaten Ingemar Johansson, fresh from a sensational first-round knockout over American Eddie Machen, challenged today for the world's heavyweight crown.

"I'm ready now," said the European champion-Sweden's new national hero and perhaps Europe's greatest heavyweight since Max Baer. "I want to go to the United States and fight Floyd Patterson for the world title as soon as possible."

At least two independent American promoters—Bill Rosenzohn and Emil Lencebegan negotiating to match the well-built, brown-haired Gothenburg slugger for a "million-dollar fight" with Patterson in the United States next June.

And the International Boxing club wanted a return Johansson-Machen fight at Chicago. But Ingemar and manager Edvin Ahlqvist insisted today there was no return contract.

Sweden still was celebrating Johansson's amazing victory Sunday night at the Ullievi football stadium.

Johansson, 25, weighed at 198½ pounds to 194½ for Machen of San Francisco as he registered his 21st straight professional victory and his 13th knockout against the previously unbeaten Californian. Only a draw with Zora Foley last April had marred Ma-

Casey Stengel Joins Mack in Pennant Total

Kansas City (UPI)—Quote of the day: Casey Stengel, after the Yankees clinched the American league pennant: "I realize I couldn't have done it without the players."

Kansas City (UPI)—Casey Stengel, a local boy who finally made good before the hometown folks, today joins Connie Mack as the all-time winningest manager in the history of the American league.

Stengel's ninth pennant, clinched Sunday when the Yankees swept a double-header from the Athletics, is the same number won by Mack in his long career in Philadelphia. John McGraw set the major league record by leading the New York Giants to 10 pennants.

In 10 years with the Yankees, Stengel's teams have won a total of 970 games and lost 557 for a 63.5 percentage. He won five straight pennants from 1949 through 1953, lost in 1954 when the team won 103 games, and now has put together another string of four straight pennants. His teams won World Championships in 1949, 1950, 1951, 1952, 1953 and 1956.

Brown Interception Run Gives Colts 27-21 Edge

Ray Brown, the hero of the 1958 Sugar Bowl game, hasn't lost his flare for the dramatic since joining the pro football ranks.

The rookie halfback from Mississippi, intercepted a Charley Conerly pass in the fourth period and dashed 66 yards for a touchdown that earned the Baltimore Colts a 27-21 victory over the New York Giants Sunday in a nationally televised exhibition game.

It was the Colts' first victory in five National football league tune-ups, and the Giants' fourth straight setback after an opening triumph.

Brown joined the Colts last month with excellent credentials, having figured in four touchdowns in quarterbacking Ole Miss to a 39-7 victory over Texas in the Sugar bowl game last New Year's Day.

Because of his speed, the Greenville, Miss., youth was transformed into a defensive halfback by Baltimore head coach Web Ewbank.

Scoring Passes
In Sunday's contest, Conerly and Don Heinrich each tossed scoring passes for the Giants in the first half, but the Colts matched those with a 63-yard run by Lenny Moore and a two-yard aerial from Unitas to end Ray Berry.

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TCU Choice by Slim Nod In Southwest Grid Loop

(This is the last of eight dispatches on college football prospects.)

Dallas, Tex.—UPI—It's Texas Christian by a slim nod today in the Southwest conference football wars where everybody but Arkansas and Baylor are given at least an outside chance at a breakthrough to the top.

Two weeks of practice have lent support to earlier forecasts that it probably would be Texas Christian on top with Southern Methodist and Texas the prime challengers and Rice and Texas A&M the "possibles."

TCU's running game has looked exceptionally sharp built around fullback Jack Spikes and halfbacks Marvin Lasater and Marshall Harris. And the Frogs' question mark quarterback, Hunter Enis, continues to show the same proficiency with his passing that both stunned and elated his coach last spring.

Injuries Hurt SMU
If Enis can deliver that long-missing aerial punch, Coach Abe Martin's troubles may all be little ones. His club is inexperienced, despite 20 lettermen, as far as playing time is concerned. But the picture is even darker along the line in the camps of all his league rivals.

While TCU has come through its drills under happy circumstances, such has not been the case at Southern Methodist where injuries have been frequent and a first-string end has been lost because of training infractions. The bulk of SMU's injuries have been to linemen and that is where Coach Bill Meek can least afford any such crippling blows.

He still has a potentially strong offense, however, geared to the precision of passing of dazzling Don Meredith and some swift halfbacks. Three touted sophomore halfbacks aren't listed on the starting lineup as yet, but Glynn Gregory, Frank Jackson and Bill Polk seem destined to figure in a few headlines before the season ends.

Brighter at Texas
Meek gets a week longer respite than the others in which to cure his cripples before barging into Ohio State and Notre Dame on successive Saturdays.

Prospects have brightened considerably during the past two weeks at Texas despite Coach Darrell Royal's moans. The big factor has been the steady improvement in junior quarterback Bobby Lackey to head up a crew of good but not exceptional backs.

Two position switches and sophomores show signs of taking a lot of the sting out of the loss by graduation of the tackle-to-tackle portion of the line.

Things brightened perceptibly at Texas A&M, too, where Coach Jim Myers brought in the single wing when he succeeded Bear Bryant. Myers figures he has three terrific performers in end John Tracey, tackle Ken Beck and blocking back Dick Gay. And he's voiced pleasure with the superb condition of the players, most of them survivors of the "hard-nosed" school run by Bryant.

Crying The Blues
Myers, one of two new head coaches in the conference, gleams at the battle being waged by Charles Milstead and Ed Dudley for the key tailback spot, but he moans about the lack of experience at the guards, who pull out to lead the interference on many single wing plays.

At Rice, Coach Jess Neely refuses to be pessimistic despite the 1957 champions' losses by diploma. Larry Duett, a junior who played halfback a year ago, has stepped into the signal-calling void left by the fine King Hill-Frank Ryan duo. And aside from a tendency to fumble, he has run the Owls' offense creditably while clicking well with his passes.

Frank Broyles at Arkansas, the other newcomer to the coaching ranks, also is installing a new system—the winged-T. He has some of the loop's speediest halfbacks to carry the ball, but up front experience and heft are both scarce and the backs may have tough going.

At Baylor, where Coach Sam Boyd is "on the spot" after his title-favored team flopped into the cellar last fall, things are real gloomy. He has an excellent fullback in Larry Hickman and two or three good linemen. But, on paper at least, his Bruins don't figure to improve their position one bit.
