The Medical Roundup

Tay-Sachs Disease, or Hereditary Blindness

Usually, I don't devote much space in this column to rare diseases, but from time to time I like to call attention to efforts that are being made by devoted persons who, because of their great unhappiness over a child who has not developed properly, organize a group of persons who are all facing the same problem. The organization then tries to get in touch with parents of children with the particular disease.

They supply these parents with helpful information, and they take away some of the loneliness that these people feel as they try to find someone who can help their child. The group also solicits funds to help research workers who will then try to learn more about the disease and what might be done to avoid it or cure it. Later, if sufficient funds are made available, the society helps poor people with the financial problems of treating their sick child.

Stanley Isenberg recently told me about the Tay-Sachs Association (P.O. Box 9602, Philadelphia 31, Pa.). They now publish a release, and they are raising money for research. They want to get in touch with all people who have infants with this distressing combination of blindness with mental retardation and a short life. One big reason for getting in touch with all the people in the United States who carry this gene (hereditary determinant) is that these people, in their youth, can be apprised of the great dangers they are likely to run into if they marry a person who also carries the gene. In that case, three in four of their children are likely to bring them nothing but sorrow.

Descendants Traced
I am reminded of what Dr. Geoffrey Dean did in South Africa with the rare disease, porphyria. With the help of a professional genealogist (a person who traces back family trees) he has traced and gotten in touch with practically every one of the descendants, in seven generations, of the Hollander who went out to South Africa about 1700. Either he or his wife was the first person in Africa with the disease. As a result of Dr. Dean's study, now when a persons comes in with a peculiar type of nervousness, plus abdominal pain, a urine which sometimes turns reddish, a tendency to become seriously ill after taking a barbiturate (sleeping medicine) or a tendency to get shallow ulcers on the skin when it is exposed to the sun, Dr. Dean looks up the man's place in the huge genealogical record, and finds that he belongs to one of the several groups descended from the old Hollander.

Often he can warn such a descendant that he must watch for the appearance of porphyria in his brothers and sisters and his children, and must warn them never to be operated on under sodium pentothal anesthesia (a barbiturate). Such an operation is likely to bring a crisis that can result in death. Interestingly, some of the people whom Dr. Dean has traced so that he can warn them only get angry with him!

In 1881, a man named Warren Tay described an unusual type of destruction of the background of the eyes which he had seen in two brothers. Today this peculiar cherry red spot is so well-

known that the minute an eye specialist looks into an infant's eyes and sees it, he makes the diagnosis. Often the parents bring the child in because he (or she) has failed to learn to sit up. The parents also notice that the child's vision is defective, and that he tends to startle easily with any noise. Then he arches his back, doubles up his arms, and stretches out his legs. This alarm-reaction to noise is so characteristic that it alone can make the diagnosis. Commonly the child lies on his back with his arms extended and his legs held close together and somewhat doubled up.

What is so sad is that these children tend to go on down hill fairly fast, and no treatment has yet been found that will do any good. The symptoms are due to a progressive injury to the brain. It is unfortunate that many of the parents of defective children have suffered so deeply that they tend to become overly touchy and on the defensive. Perhaps they feel ashamed of having had an abnormal child; and hence, when approached by the officers of the association and asked to join and help, they become annoyed and even angry. I'm sad to say that this is the reaction of many people who have children with any disease of the brain or the nervous system.

Swimming Classes Underway at 'Y'

Swimming classes for boys and girls began at the Young Men's Christian association on Monday, Sept. 15, according to Herb Partridge, youth director.

Tiny tot lessons for boys and girls six and seven-years-old will be held each Monday at 3:30 p.m. Partridge said. As in all beginning swim classes the lessons will be designed to acquaint youngsters with the water and teach them the basic swimming strokes, he said.

Swimming classes for members eight years and over have been scheduled for twice a week this year. Boys and girls are scheduled to swim together on weekdays after school and will have separate classes on the weekend.

All members are asked to call the YMCA to learn the schedule of the class in which they are enrolled. Free swimming periods will be held each day at 5:30 p.m. and after each of the class periods. Class periods will be 45 minutes long each Saturday.
