Jacksonville High Enrollment Same

Jacksonville — Enrollment in Jacksonville high school is approximately the same as on opening week last year, according to Supt. John J. Crabbe.

Approximately 142 pupils have enrolled. A few students who are working in the fruit harvest will enter school next week, Crabbe said.

"The amount of school time devoted to activities has been cut by about 50 per cent," the superintendent said. "The periods for classroom instruction have been increased from 55 to 59 minutes."

By having them do their studying under the supervision of the classroom teachers their grade point averages should be improved, the superintendent concluded.

He has had many jobs in different fields and even now is uncertain about what he really wants to do. He is making a very low salary and hasn't very good prospects in his present job.

Mrs. L. R. — My husband and I are all broken up about Janet's choice of a husband. She is an attractive girl, educated and refined, but she has chosen a man who has nothing at all to recommend him.
