Price Support Loan Interest Up

Washington—UPI—The Agriculture Department will boost the interest rate it pays to private lenders for farm price support loan funds to 2½ per cent Thursday. The rate now is 1½ per cent.

The department borrows the funds from banks and other lenders by selling Commodity Credit Corporation certificates of interest. It lends the money to farmers who pledge their crops as security. Department officials announced Tuesday the interest rate was being hiked to bring it in line with the rates paid on similar government and commercial loans. They said they expected the highest interest payments to attract more lenders.

Officials said the interest rate would remain at 3½ per cent for farmers who borrow money under the price support loan program. They pointed out, however, that this interest is paid only on the rare occasions when farmers repay their loans in cash and redeem their crops put up as security.

Clam Digging Aired at Meeting

Astoria—UPI—One of the lead topics at a meeting of the Oregon Fish Commission here Tuesday was the possibility of a revision in regulations governing clam digging on Clatsop county beaches. Robert C. Ayers, an aquatic biologist for the Commission heading an investigation of razor clams, commented on a petition from clam diggers asking a reduction in size of clams from the present 4½ inches to 3½ inches. He said he did not recommend the reduction in size.

Ayers said the change would result in the taking of too many clams before their period of most rapid growth and before the first spawning.

Torrential Rains, Tornadoes Strike In Midwest Areas

A storm center surging across the nation's central section touched off torrential rains and a flurry of tornadoes.

At least four unconfirmed twisters were sighted in the St. Louis area late Tuesday, but no damage was reported. Other tornadoes in the Midwest damaged four buildings.

Heavy rains doused the Middle and Lower Mississippi Valley and Eastern Texas during the night and spread eastward through the Ohio Valley and Lower Lakes region into New England.

Downpours ranging from five to nine inches hit South Texas Tuesday, causing some local flooding and closing roads. The Weather Bureau at Corpus Christi, Tex., warned of possible flooding on the West Nueces river.

A twister spotted near Galena, Kan., Tuesday struck west of Joplin, Mo., damaging two farm houses. The tornado disappeared before reaching Joplin, which was under an alert.

Another twister touched down southeast of Eldorado Springs, Mo., destroying a farm home and other farm buildings.

In the Far West, Los Angeles residents sweltered in 96-degree weather Tuesday and even hotter temperatures were predicted for today. Tuesday's high equalled the highest reading of the year in Los Angeles.

Correspondent Has Shaky Experience Sitting at Controls of Jet Plane

Washington—UPI—What is it like to fly a jet?

I didn't fly one long, and I definitely didn't fly one well. But I did fly one.

The plane was Lockheed's new "Jetstar"—the twin-engine, 10-passenger business jet.

It was not only my first shot at flying a jet, it also was my first ride in one.

We took off from nearby Andrews Air Force Base. It felt more like we catapulted

off. With the first surge of screaming power, we were shoved against the back of the seats. The ground flashed by in a blur.

In 15 minutes, the Jetstar was touching 30,000 feet—and in those 15 minutes, the 10 passengers were flat on their backs. This million-dollar baby climbs almost straight up.

But as we streaked up and the ground fell away, I got my first impressions of what the jet age will mean to the average guy who flies.

No Sensation

After the first sensation of take-off speed, there is really no sensation. Vibration is completely absent. The cabin is somewhat noisy, but remember this is a military utility plane, not a plush airliner; and the noise level is no greater than in a conventional piston-engine aircraft.

At 40,000 feet, the sunlight seems brighter, the sky bluer. Nor are you conscious of your speed (upwards of 550 MPH) once you level off. Only when you bank sharply are you

aware that you're going almost 10 miles every 60 seconds; then your stomach feels like a high-speed elevator.

The Lockheed representative asked me if I'd like to try my hand at the controls.

"Sure," I said trying to be nonchalant. My nonchalance was slightly spoiled when I tripped on the step leading to the cockpit. But once I settled down in the left-hand seat and gripped the controls, the pilot knew he could relax. Or did he?

"You ever flown before?" he asked.

Controls Sensitive
"Viscounts and DC-7s," I said confidently. (I didn't bother to tell him that in both cases the Viscounts and DC-7s were simulators parked safely on the ground.)

The controls were sensitive. It felt like power-steering a car on ice.

"Turn right 60 degrees," said the pilot. I gently turned the wheel. The Jetstar responded easily. But I felt that sinking sensation in my stomach. When we completed the turn, the pilot said, "You have to keep her nose up in a bank like that," he said. "You've lost 3,000 feet in 11 seconds."

Slightly unnerved, I climbed back to 40,000 feet. A few minutes later, an Air Force Colonel tapped me on the shoulder.

"My turn now," he smiled. I went back in the cabin and critically observed the Colonel's flying technique. He did somewhat better.

Hearings Set for Tariff Bureau Plea

Friendly Suit Seeks Bell for Museum

Portland—UPI—A friendly suit was filed Tuesday against the Union Pacific Railroad so the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry can gain title to a black bell which weighs nine tons.

The bell was turned over to OMSI by a wealthy New York woman, Mrs. Juliet Barrett Rublee, who paid \$500 for it at a wire bid in a 1928 auction. She has never seen the bell and Union Pacific has had it in storage since.

It takes a friendly suit in Circuit Court by OMSI against the railroad to make the gift legally possible because Mrs. Rublee lost her warehouse receipt many years ago. Under Oregon law an article cannot be surrendered without a receipt.

The bell, 14 feet high, will be placed in front of the new OMSI building.
