

Russia Protests United States Bases in Japan

Tokyo—UPI—The Soviet Union demanded Tuesday Japan deny the United States use of military bases on its territory because of American "aggressive" activity in the Formosa crisis.

A protest note delivered to the Japanese Foreign Ministry accused U.S. forces of openly using Japanese territory for "provocative, aggressive actions" against Communist China. It also quoted news reports to the effect that American forces in Japan

have "completed their battle preparations."

Party To Aggression

Russia warned that even if Japan did not wish to become involved in any outbreak of hostilities in the Formosa Strait area, "it cannot be helped if Japan is considered a party to aggression" should the United States continue to use the bases.

In Tokyo, observers considered the note a skillful attempt to pressure the Japanese government into drastic

action to revise the 1951 security agreement with the United States.

Talks to revise the agreement are scheduled to open in Tokyo shortly.

Yank Tourist's Tale of Amazon Air Crash Probed

Rio De Janeiro—UPI—Brazilian authorities Tuesday were investigating an American tourist's tale of surviving a jungle air crash with two other men who still are missing.

Walter Youngblood, who said he has a wife and child living in Reno, told the story in Belem in the presence of U. S. consular official Robert Hegagan.

Crashed 12 Days Ago

Youngblood said he, Keith Courtney and John MacDonald crashed 12 days ago somewhere in the Amazon jungle near the town of Sao Paulo de Olivenca while en route from Lima, Peru, to Rio de Janeiro aboard a Catalina flying boat.

According to his story, he split with the other two after an argument over the best way to reach civilization. They broke up, he said, even though all three were injured in the crash.

Courtney and MacDonald, whose addresses are not known, have not turned up. The plane has not been sighted by searching authorities who flew over the crash area with Youngblood.

Ran Into Indians

Youngblood said that while attempting to locate the Amazon river in hopes of following its course to the nearest town, he ran into some Indians who took him to a missionary station.

From the station, he said, he was transferred to Sao Paulo de Olivenca, then to Manaus and later to Belem.

Youngblood said he met Courtney and MacDonald in Lima and decided to join them when he found they were flying to Rio. He said that was his only connection with the other two. Courtney was flying the plane, he said.

Youngblood said he was flying to Rio to meet friends connected with the now-defunct Cornucopia Mining company.

Ike Credited With Averting War

Washington—UPI—Army Secretary Wilber M. Brucker declared that President Eisenhower's "no appeasement" stand had averted a shooting war in the Formosa Strait.

Diplomatic officials, commenting on Brucker's statement, said it may be "a little over-stated but there is cause for optimism."

Back from a three-week tour in the Far East, Brucker told newsmen the U.S. government's strong warnings to the Red Chinese had backed up free world allies in the Orient from Pakistan to Korea.

"This thing would have lit up into a shooting war," Brucker said, if it had not been for Eisenhower's "no Munich" speech last Thursday night.

The Army secretary described the Formosa Strait situation as "still tense and serious," but added the President's stand had started a cooling off period.

Knowland Urges Quemoy Defense

San Diego—UPI—Sen. William F. Knowland, staunch backer of Nationalist China's Chiang Kai-shek, Tuesday called for defense of Quemoy and Matsu against the Communist Chinese.

In a speech prepared for delivery before a meeting of the Military Order of World Wars, the Republican candidate for governor of California said:

"There is an old saying that the only way you can co-exist with a tiger is to be inside the tiger."

Knowland asked where the chain of conquest would end if Quemoy and Matsu were not defended.

"There are some who believe that you can distinguish between a Communist assault on Quemoy and Matsu in and of themselves and Quemoy and Matsu as stepping stones for Formosa and Pescadores," Knowland said.

"What nonsense is this?" he asked.

"If our security position in Formosa is lost, the entire defense line, which includes our base at Okinawa, Japan, Korea, the Philippines, Southeast Asia and Australia will disintegrate and will be back much nearer the California shores."

Justice Court System Target

Portland—UPI—Two of the recommendations the Legislative Interim Committee on Judicial Administration will make in its formal report to the state Legislature will be the abolition of Oregon's Justice Court system and abolition of all judiciary functions of county courts, the committee has announced.

The complete report by the committee was outlined here to members of the Multnomah and Clackamas County Bar Associations.

The recommendations are part of a massive revision of the state's judiciary system in an attempt to eliminate backlogging of cases.

Rolling Museum Of State History Starts This Week

Portland — A rolling museum of Oregon history will start a tour of the state this week as part of a joint effort of the centennial commission and the Oregon Historical society to acquaint residents with highlights of the past.

Among exhibits will be the tomahawk that killed Marcus Whitman, the first printing press used in the Oregon territory, Factor John McLoughlin's sword cane and Columbia river petroglyphs, the stones on which Indians made symbolic drawings before the white man's arrival.

The van will provide the first public showing of the diary kept by John Hoskins, supercargo aboard the ship Columbia in 1792 when its captain, Robert Gray, discovered the Columbia river.

Part of the display also will be made up of picture panels, and among these will be one entitled "Barons, Belles and Bosses," describing industrialists, women and politicians of early days. Another panel will show Oregon history by decades.

Local History

One case will be left for displays of local history. The commission and historical society are asking residents of areas visited by the trailer to bring in any historical items they have in their possession.

The van was to be dedicated by Gov. Robert D. Holmes at 4 p.m. today at the McLoughlin house at Oregon City, the territorial capital.

It will be on display Wednesday and go Thursday to Madras, where it will be on display Thursday night, Friday and Saturday. Then will follow visits to 26 other communities in eastern Oregon, Gresham, St. Helens, Rainier, Longview and Vancouver. The van will return to Portland Dec. 2.

Tours of the Willamette valley, southern Oregon, the coast and the Portland area will be scheduled later.

First Centennial Book Being Published

Portland — The first major book of Oregon's centennial period was to be published Sept. 15, written by Giles French, Moro editor and former lawmaker.

The book, "Golden Land, the Story of Sherman County," is being published by the Oregon Historical society and printed by Lawton Kennedy of San Francisco. French is a member of the Sherman county centennial committee.
