Rival Machines Pass Surgery Tests With Praise by Doctors

New York—Two rival machines were pitted against one another in substituting for the hearts and lungs of 71 men and women undergoing "open heart" surgery, and it is a mark of a high degree of mechanical perfection that both machines came through beautifully.

The surgical team which conducted the extended comparison of machines capable of taking over the most vital functions of the human body reported the critical question no longer was the capability

of the machine, but the skills of the surgical team using it. The trial was conducted in Stanford University Hospital, San Francisco. The designers of the rival machines—Dr. John J. Osborn of San Francisco and Dr. Denise G. Melrose of London—were members of the surgical team.

One Death Each

In 39 operations performed with the aid of the Osborn machine, there was only one death attributable to the patient's blood not having been properly perfused with oxygen while it was out of his body and in the machine. In 31 operations performed with the Melrose machine, there also was only one such death. It must be kept in mind that patients who undergo "open heart" surgery have a very serious, life-threatening defect inside their hearts. The surgeon goes inside and corrects the defect. If he can see what he is doing, his chances for success are practically 100 per cent—provided the defect is correctable.

The lung-heart machine makes it possible for him to see what he is doing. The heart is "open" because the circulating blood is diverted by a pump into the machine where it receives oxygen, (as it would have received from the lungs normally) and then pumped back into the body. Thus, both heart and lungs are cut out of the blood circuit and the surgeon's sharp eyes and dextrous hands are unimpeded by a flow of blood through the heart.

Melrose Machine Better
After the trial, the surgical team, which was headed by Dr. Frank Garbode, decided the Melrose machine was the better, but not on grounds of a greater efficiency in substituting for hearts and lungs. In that, the machines were equal, but the Melrose machine was easier to maintain in applicable order for use on a routine basis "five times a week."

However, the machine has been rebuilt so all parts which come into contact with blood can be replaced with new ones after each operation. This modified Melrose machine will be the standard machine at Stanford from now on.

Gerbode reported for his team to the international technical journal, The Lancet. Heart-lungs machines of a number of designs are in use in medical centers throughout the United States.
