**Snake River Flow Declared Reduced To Save Chinook**

Salem—UP—Reduction of the flow of the Snake river at Oxbow dam below 2,000 second feet by the Idaho Power company on Aug. 26, was necessary to save the fall chinook salmon run, according to R. P. Parry, general counsel for the power company.

Parry made his statement at a conference called by Gov. Robert D. Holmes after he had received reports that the reduction in the flow of the Snake river had killed many fish. The Idaho Power company's attorney declared that its observers had failed to find any dead fish, and said that the company had forces working night and day to complete the fish trap which had been damaged at one end.

He said this work should be completed within two weeks. Theodore Perry of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, told the governor that he would have to share in any blame for the reduction in the flow of the river. He said he had twice telephoned to his chief in Washington, D. C., who had conferred with Gen. E. T. Itchner, chief of the Corps of Engineers. While no authorization for reduction of the flow below 2,000 second feet was given, no objection was made by either agency due to the extreme emergency then existing.

Albert Day, director of the Oregon State Fish Commission, expressed fear that the fall chinook run in the Snake river would be lost.

However, Lyman Wilbur, vice president of Morrison-Knudsen company, contractors for the dam construction for Idaho Power, said that he had personally been on the job supervising the installation of temporary dams to save the fish run. "Our only concern right now is to save this fall's salmon run," Wilbur said. He also pointed out that pending completion of the fish trap, salmon coming to the foot of the Oxbow dam will be netted and placed in tank trucks and transported to the river above the dam. This is the same method used during construction of the Brownlee dam 15 miles above.

**Pony Express Set To Operate Again**

Portland — Pony express riders will thunder down historic Oregon trails with the mail again next June as part of the state's centennial celebration.

Plans to re-enact part of Oregon's past are being formulated by Centennial Pony Express, Inc., of Baker. President of the group is Stanley W. Thompson and Vice President is Harry Long, both of Baker.

Thompson said the riders will bear real mail and may contend with mock Indian attacks and bandit forays June 7 through 10 as a prelude to the centennial exposition that opens at Portland June 10 for 100 days.

Thompson said pony express booths will be set up in Oregon cities and towns under auspices of local riding groups. Special stationery will be sold to persons who wish to send letters by pony express.
