Two Trucks, Car Involved in Crash

Two heavy trucks and a passenger vehicle collided yesterday on Highway 99 about a mile south of Rogue River, state police reported.

A logging tractor-trailer operated by Sidney Miles Pierce, 32, of route 1, box 55, Rogue River, attempted to pass a tractor-trailer operated by Edward Johnson, 41, of New Orleans, La., police said.

At the same moment, according to the report, Herbert Martin Stewart, Bell Gardens, Calif., pulled his vehicle out onto the other side of the highway from a turnout.

Pierce's truck skidded 240 feet, struck Stewart's vehicle and the other truck, then ran off the highway and hit a tree.

Maple Valley, Wash. - (UPI) - Two persons died Wednesday night in a fire which gutted their two-story frame home near Lucerne lake in Maple Valley.

King county sheriff's office identified the dead as Hilliard Reibe, about 45, and his wife, Winnie, 42. Reibe was found lying on the kitchen floor and his wife in a bedroom.

Sheriff's officers said two neighbors, William, Bailey and Jack Murry, were first to arrive on the scene but couldn't enter the home because of the intense heat and smoke.

It was not immediately known how the fire started.
